EDITORIAL

#### **Two Thirds Gone**

This week, Santa Anna lost two of its three physicians. Our city has been blessed with an abundance of excellent medical doctors during the past few years, although many residents remember that it was not too long ago when the city had none.

The fact that two thirds of our medical practioners are leaving points out a fact that communities sometimes tend to overlook until it is too late. And that is the fact that every city needs adequate medical facilities. Although we realize that both of the doctors who are leaving are doing so in order to better prepare themselves for their profession, it is still with a slight sense of shock that we realize that within one week Santa Anna has come to the point where it is only one doctor away from being a

doctorless town. Although Dr. Charles Henner has no intentions of leaving Santa Anna, despite some rather foolish rumors that have been circulated to the contrary, still we must realize that a doctor, like all of us, must go where opportunity and need is greatest.

Santa Anna has been offered one of the greatest gifts any city our size could receive, in the proposed Santa Anna Medical Center. Many cities, much larger than ours, would pay great amounts to obtain a facility like this. Brownwood and Coleman are both trying to increase their hospital facilities, obtaining the funds required through donations and increased taxation. Yet Santa Anna is being offered such a tremendous asset at no cost death. The sheriff bends over to to the city or its people.
