

As a result of the recent Cassius Clay-Sonny Liston fiascos the sport of boxing has come into even greater irrepute than previously. These fights have pointed up the underlying fac-tors that are working to destroy a sport that was once one of the most vigorous and popu-

lar in this country.

It is unfortunate that the sport of boxing must suffer because of the assorted fastbuck artists, crooks, conmen, and irresponsible persons who have infiltrated the business end of the opera-tion. Boxing, in itself, the sport of pugilism, is one of the finest that we have. The sport teaches selfreliance, sportsmanship, and courage, things that add to anyone's character. And amateur boxing, removed from the unsavory taint that permeates the professional end of the sport, is as fine an athletic event as we could wish. Unfortunately, amateur boxing has suffered by association because of the nefarious manueverings in the professional

And despite what some of the "ban boxing" fanatics say, boxing is one of our safer sports.

During a ten year period selected for study recently by an inter-national commission looking into safety in sports, more people died throughout the world as a result of playing tennis than died as a result of boxing. Now, if we really want to get ridiculous, we can ban tennis, and all other sports, because they contain the element of physical hazard, but then so does crossing the street in traffic. In fact, if we really want to eliminate sporting fatalities, we will ban boating and fishing, the greatest single area of sporting fatalities (from drowning), football (more peo-ple died last year in the United States alone from playing football than died in the entire world from boxing), and auto racing.

Besides, outlawing boxing has been tried, and it doesn't work. Around the turn of the century, many states (including Texas) had laws against boxing, but bouts were either staged on the sly, or just across the boundary in legal territory (such as Mexico. And these bouts could not be held with proper supervision, be-cause, since the sport was outlawed, no supervision organiza-tion could be set up.

where they can be avoided, but in Brownwood. if boxing is to regain its posiprofessional boxers are to be-come the national heroes they once were (remembering men like Jack Dempsey and Joe Louis), several steps are going to have to be taken, one of the most important of which will be establishment of a national boxing commission, with a national commissioner who has real po-wer to control the sport, and who has the courage to use that

Then the racketeers and quick money men can be eliminated, the sport can be returned to the boxers and to the fans, and can again become a sport, and not a farce and an exhibition, as wrestling is today, and as boxing is rapidly becoming (following the most recent Clay-Liston fight, the Dallas Morning News announced that they would no longer carry boxing news in their sports section, since it was becoming obvious that boxing was no longer a legitimate sport).

Perhaps then boxing will be properly supervised (the current boxing commissions of the various states, and such organizations as the World Commission, have no power to actually regulate the sport, and if they had such power, they have so abused them as to make them of no

A valuable additional asset to the return of boxing to a place of honor as a sport will be an increase in interest in amateur boxing. Very few colleges have boxing teams anymore, where 20 years ago there were many. Interest and entries in the famous Golden Gloves program have been dwindling.

Boxing is a good sport. It is too bad that a bunch of unscrupulous men have been allowed to take over, and it is to be hoped that the Federal givernment will act to put the sport back on its feet.

Experimental System For Making Up Failures To Be Tried This Summer

Special remedial classes, for mathematics and English courses high school students who failed math and English courses during the past school year may take these courses. They may not ing the regular school year, are be taken by students seeking ing the regular school year, are to be offered here this summer under a new and experimental program recently authorized by

the state educational agencies.

The new program will be set up in such a way as to allow the instructor to test each student to discover the exact areas in which he is lacking, and then to concentrate just on those areas. This approach will avoid much of the duplication and time waste of the standard summer programs, which require that all the course failed be cov-

ered in the makegood classes.

The math class, for students from grades 9 through 12, will be taught by Rufus Cobern. The English course, for students from the same grades, has not been assigned a teacher yet, but one is expected to be obtained shortly, according to Superintendent Cullen Perry.

A meeting of all persons interested in these remedial courses will be held Monday, July 12, beginning at 7:30 p.m., in the Santa Anna High School Office. Any student interested in taking these courses is urged to attend this meeting.

The opportunity is the Peace tion as a national sport, and if Corps Placement Test, which is not passed or failed and you can't study for it. It measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language. If, for example, test scores indicate limited language acquiring ability, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking area. The test is used by the Peace Corps only as a tool in the matching of Volunteers and jobs. The Peace Corps applica-tion is the most important indicator of suitability for Peace Corps service. It must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted.

Applicants should plan on about one and one half hours at the testing centers, unless they wish to take Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.



ACT OF GOD

Ask an atheist what is an act of God and he will say: "Nothing."

Ask a fundamentalist and he may well say: "Everything."

But in law, the phrase "act of God" has nothing to do with religion. The law sits in judgment only on the acts of man. Calling an event an act of God it is not an act of man.

This distinction can be important indeed.

Suppose, for example, that a bolt of lightning strikes a tree in your back yard, toppling it onto the neighbor's garage. Obviously you did not hurl that ightning bolt. Nor could you have prevented the harm it in-

Having played no role in the vent, you are not legally liable for the damage. "Act of God" is a good defense.

But suppose the tree fell not precautions.

Surely, if God caused the lightning in the first case, He caused it in the second case as well. But now your own negligence played a key role in the outcome. Therefore, "act of God" is not a good defense. You could be held liable.
