



# **Deposits Increase**

Both deposits and total assets in Santa Anna National Bank rose during the three months since the last bank call, according to figures released this week. Total deposits in the local bank rose from \$1,767,589.67 as of April 26 of this year, to \$1,866,-041.62 as of June 30. Deposits of individuals, partnerships and corporations rose from \$1,696,-268.22 three months ago, to \$1,-794,799.36. Other deposits making up the total deposits include those of the United States government, and those of the state and political subdivisions within the state.



## **Of Time And Taxes**

A frontpage story in this issue of The Santa Anna News tells of the work of the Board of Equalization set up by the Santa Anna Independent School District to bring property evaluations within the District up to an equitable level.

It would be nice if we could get something for nothing. It would be nice if we could even get something in 1965 for what we paid for it in 1935. The facts of economic life are such that neither is possible, however, and just as we pay more for an automobile today, so we must be ready to pay more for an adequate educational system.

The 1965 model automobile is a much more complex machine than the 1935 model, with many additional improvements and refinements. Few of us would be satisfied with a 1935 car today. Likewise, educational requirements today are much more complex than they were 30 years ago, and they therefore cost more, due both to the increase in overall costs and to the increase in complexity in the school system. It is unreasonable to expect our schools to provide a 1965 education while being operated on a 1935 budget, and few of us would be satisfied with the educational opportunities such a system would offer.

Yet this is what the Santa Anna Independent School District tion of farm goods to farmers to help provide the many other has been trying to do, since it has been operating on evaluations originally made in the 1930's.

In 1935, a high school education was more than ample to provide good employment opportunities for young people. Today, a high school education is barely adequate, and in fact a national magazine recently reported that a bachelors degree is not adequate to insure good employment potentials in many fields today.

So our schools must do a much more complete job in 1965 than they did only one generation ago.
