



Mail Madness

According to all the propaganda out of Washington, we are on another "operate the Post Office on a profit" kick, also sometimes one billion dollars since it is a called the "cut out the Postal deficit" bit. This type of recurring madness enters its violent stage at periodic times, somewhat as the fever of a malaria patient comes and goes in cycles. The only known cure for this strange malady is time.

However, the latest outbreak of this plague, which so far, through timely work by the public health authorities, has been confined primarily to Washington, DC, and the surrounding suburbs, where insanity, temporary and otherwise, is more the rule than the exception, the result of this latest contagion has been to bring to mind the logical question: "Why should the Post Office operate at a profit?"

What makes the Post Office so different from the other departments? No one clamors for the Department of Agriculture to make a profit, or even break even. We have never had reams of material issued from Washington on the subject of making the Department of Defense selfsupporting. No one asks that the Weather Bureau turn in a profit at the end of the year. Why then single out the poor Postal Department (which has problems enough with dogs biting Postmen and vice versa), and expect it to make a profit? What other than the benefits of free publicity to whichever political party happens to be in power. This form of madness strikes members of both parties, by the way.

What does all the talk about raising Postal rates really mean? It means that you, the taxpayer, will have the privilege of paying for Postal service twice. Since this is one of the services we have the right to expect the Federal government to furnish, we pay for this service, just as we pay for all things that we receive from the government, with our taxes. We all pay these taxes expecting that we will receive in return the services we have a right to expect. And then we are told that in order to let the Post Office operate at a profit, we must pay more for the privilege of using the mails, and all of this is supposed to be logical!

Strange form of madness, isn't it?



Under what circumstances will the court approve a debtor's application? There are two main tests:

1) Financial-The debtor's earnings must be large enough, in proportion to his debt burden, to give a reasonable chance of success. As a rule, the court will approve only if his debts can be paid off in not more than three years, using not more than 25 percent of his income.

2) Moral—The debtor must have an earnest desire to make nave an earnest desire to make good on his obligations, even at the cost of prolonged belt-tight-ening and penny-pinching. And in most cases, his wife must share that desire.







Local Postal Group To Be Named Here

Postmaster John C. Gregg announced recently that all Santa Anna Post Office employees will be asked to take part in the new Postal Efficiency Plan announ-ced Wednesday, July 22, by Postmaster General John A. Gron-

"The Postal Efficiency Plan includes comprehensive grams for improving postal service and reducing costs", Gregg said. "It is our way of helping President Johnson fulfill his pledge to provide more effective and economical government

In Washington, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski termed the plan's twin objectives of economy and service better-ment "a matter of highest priority" and called for total involvement of all employees through the Post Office suggestion pro-

Semiannual reports will be made to the President, Mr. Gronouski said, and realized savings will be reverted to the Treasury or applied to improving postal service.

A local committee will be organized to fulfill the two purposes of the plan: (1) Reduce costs; and (2) improve services. Postmaster Gregg will be chairman of the local committee to

implement PEP. Ideas generated by individual employees will be taken up by the committee. Accepted ideas will be passed on to Washington for possible application on a national level. Employees whose ideas are adopted nationwide will be given national awards. The Postmaster General will personally oversee the programs. Attend church regularly.
