

The aluminum manufacturers raised the prices on their product, which Lyndon Johnson did not like, so he ordered some of the stockpile of aluminum held by the Federal government to be sold at prices lower than those on the open market, forcing the aluminum companies to reduce their prices to the old level.

Then the copper companies, faced with rising costs, put a

price increase on copper into effect. Lyndon didn't like this, either, so he ordered some of the Federal stockpile of this metal sold, at undercutting prices, forcing the copper people to rescind their price hike.

This is all well and good, we

suppose, but it poses a problem for us. We have some beagle puppies that we had originally offered for sale at \$25, but the pups are looking so good that we had decided to raise the price to \$35. Now we are not so sure. We know that Lyndon raises beagles, too, and if he decides he doesn't like our price increase he may order the market to be flooded with LBJ beagles, and heaven knows, the darn things are hard enough to get rid of as it is, without competing against the Federal government.

What we would really like to see Lyndon do is release the government's supply of dog food, and force the price of that commodity down.







It is one of the more constant attributes of human nature that man is always seeking for the easier way to do things. In some ways, this is good. and it has resulted in many advancments. But in the arens of man's struggle for freedom, there is no easy way. Those that have thought otherwise, down through history, have either lost that freedom, or they have been forced to face an even greater struggle than if they had faced up to reality in the first place.

The characters who are burning their draft cards or themselves in protest over the necessity of the United States' effort in Viet Nam, sincere and dedicated though they may be (often the more sincere and dedicated a man may be, the more damage he may do if he is wrong), are repeating an ageold error-that you cannot placate force with reason. Many of us learned this lesson on the school playground—we learned that you cannot satisfy the bully by giving in to him. Is peace so dear as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery for the people of Viet Nam?

"Any man's death diminishes me, for I am involved in mankind," wrote John Donne, 300 years ago. Just so, any man's slavery diminishes our own freedom. "No man is truly free, as long as one man is a slave," said Voltaire. We cannot insure freedom for ourselves and our children by abandoning another people

Some people have called those members of our population who have been agitating against our country's position in Viet Nam, "traitors." A more accurate description would be "fools." For with all the weight of hisory staring them in face, proving the ridiculousness of their position, they go blithely on their way, ignoring reality and living in a pink cloud world that has little in common with the real world. 
