able weather and is believed to be some three weeks ahead of schedule.

"In the peanut patch" h a s been the location given for most county farmers and the workers for weeks as raisers take advantage of the fine maturing weather.

County peanut production could top 55 million pounds, estimates indicate.

Yield this year is topping even the most conservative estimates: going as high as 48 bushels per acre. The estimated yield for 1966 is 1,740 pounds per acre, with some 32,000 acres planted.

The average yield for the five year period between 1961 and 1965 was 608 pounds per acre, or 20.3 bushels per acre.

Last year's yield was 757 pounds and 25.2 bushels per acre. And although irrigation is

certainly getting its credit in the county, the artificial watering hasn't been a major factor this year because natural watering in good rains has benefitted the dry-land farmer just as much.

Contracts Let For Highway 36 Development

A contract for 4.425 miles on Highway SH 36 in Eastland County has been awarded to an Amarillo firm, it was announced in Austin by the State Highway Commission

Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$142,160.60 on the project which will include flexible base, asphaltic concrete, pavement and one course surface treatment on shoulders. The work is expected to take 180

working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brown-

R. P. Haun, Resident Engineer at Eastland, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction. Haun stated that Cooper and Woodruff already have one job underway in the county and that estimated starting date for the new project is after December 1 Haun said that the contractor has several families living in Cisco and Eastland at this time, but the company is short - handed and is experiencing some difficulty in finding local men to work.
