Most experts expect a booming adult toy market to make this a record year for manufacturers and sellers of toys and games. For several years, toy makers have been catering to the hobbyist and the "over 65" age group and now they find themselves with a toy market that is brisk at both ends of the age group.

Today's adult who works, and the elder who has retired, have plenty

of leisure time on their hands and each year hundreds take up such hobbles as miniature shipbuilding, model railroading, or the less strenuous word or card games.

Some of the grown-up items on the market for the last year's top toy selling Christmas season included a \$10 scale model kit of the liner S.S. United States, "HO" gauge electric trains, model power boats, pool tables, shuffleboard sets, and an endless list of word

Biggest volume item in the adult toy field are the word games and the increased popularity has been so marked that within the past year two manufacturers doubled their plant capacity for producing games. The toy makers have no intention of forgetting the nearly 50 million youngsters under 14 who are their principal market, but they are cultivating the "over 65" group—and their reasoning is simply that

the older age group has more money to spend and is more interested

in finding ways to occupy time.

Some manufacturers of "do-it-yourself" tools and gadgets are cashing in on the adult toy market by putting models of their products on the toy counters. Among items in this category last Christmas were a "mobile" loudspeaker, an intercom set, and a hand drill. Plenty of these were sold to grown-ups who put them to practical use.



Christmas Carols Have Long History

Christmas caroling is almost as old as Christmas itself-although not in the form we know. An early historian wrote that in the second century, the Bishop of Rome urged his people to sing "in celebration of our Lord." Christmas hymns go back to the fifth century, when most of them were written in Latin. St. Francis of Assisi is regarded as the father of caroling as we know it. In 1223, St. Francis placed a creche-a miniature Nativity scene-in a hermitage in Grecchio, Italy.

After many churches began displaying a Nativity scene at Christmas, soon the people be-gan acting out the Christmas story. The actors composed Carols to sing with their Nativity plays, and after the plays they would stroll down the street. singing. In this way, street caroling was born.

Joseph Mohr, a pastor in Oberndorf, Austria, composed the most popular of the Christmas carols sung today, "Stille Nicht," or "Silent Night." It was composed on Christmas Eve, 1818. Franz Gruber, the local schoolmaster, and the church organist, composed the music the same day, and the hymn was sung for the first time that night at midnight Mass.

Charles Wesley, brother of John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, wrote "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing!" in 1739 Phillips Brooks, a Boston clergyman, wrote "O Little Town of Bethlehem" in 1868, after visiting the city of Bethlehem.

Although not a carol, Han-del's noble "Messiah" is a Christmas tradition. It was first performed in Dublin, in 1742. The carol "Joy to the World" written in the early 18th century by Isaac Watts, and was set to the music of a segment of the "Messiah." "While Shephedrs Watched Their Flocks by Night" was written in 1703 by Nahum Tate.

No one knows who wrote "The First Noel." It first appeared in print in 1833, in a book called 'Christmas Carols Ancient and Modern," and is believed to be very old.

The author of "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" is also unknown, but it is known that he lived before the time of Shakespeare.
