



The cotton harvest reached season high last week. Harvesting was slowed for about

The Cotton Classing Office ocated at 248 Leggett Drive in Abilene, reported its busiest week of the 1965-1966 cotton harvest. Samples classed for the week ending January 7, total-ed 38,400, which moved the season mark to 376,100.

The cotton market remained sluggish with the bulk of the crop going into Cooperative

Grades of District 2 cotton processed at the United States Department of Agriculture office last week were: Middling, one percent; Strict Low Middling, five percent; Low Middling, two percent; Middling Light Spotted, 56 percent; Low Middling Light Spotted, five per-cent; Middling spotted, five percent; Strict Low Middling Spotted, four percent; and Low Middling Spotted, one percent. Grades dropped compared with the previous week, when 35 percent of the saamples were Middling Light Spotted, an 45 per-cent were Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. The amount of cotton reduced in grade because of bark increased from four to Six percent.

Micronaire readings showed little change in the fiber fineness and maturity of cotton.

Staple lengths were longer, with one percent, 7/8 of an inch; 16 percent, 29/32 of an inch; 80 percent, 15/16 of an inch; and and longer.

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
