
Last week, on the editorial page of The Santa Anna News, a "Letter to the Editor" suggested that Santa Annans look into the possibility of developing a camping facility near the Mountain City to accomodate the growing numbers of motorized campers that are filling the highways of our nation. more business? We doubt it. And more business means more obs, which in turn means more purchasing power for local idents, to be spent with local businesses.

Let's look at a few of the advantages that Santa Anna enjoys in the matter of attracting this sort of business. First, it is not too large. A larger city has problems providing adequate camping facilities close enough to make them handy to the tourist and still benefit the city.

Second, Santa Anna has a dramatic and easily recognized. and remembered landmark in Santa Anna Mountain. Many communities have made tourist attractions of much less impressive physical features.

Third, Santa Anna has an important historical heritage, and history is one of the major drawing cards for tourism. A local service station proprietor has mentioned that many travelers have stopped at his station to inquire about museums or other historical facilities in town. The very name of the city itself is dramatic and carries a connotation of history. The tourist would much rather camp in a community named "Santa Anna" than in one named, for instance. "Brownwood." This is particularly true of tourists from the more eastern regions of our country, who are seeking western atmosphere on their vacation.

Governor John Connally has spearheaded a big new push aimed at gaining for Texas a larger share of the millions of dollars spent by tourists each year in this country. The Governor has suggested that local communities join in this effort. Santa Anna could do this. The only real question is this: Do we have the initiative, the get up and go, the spark of progress to take a new step into the future.

The men and women who built our part of Texas carved a society out of wilderness by having the foresight to take advantage of the new opportunities offered by this new land. Do we have the quality to become modern pioneers, and carry on the tradition of our forebearers? This is a chance to find out.


