## Rehabilitation Or Revenge?

The Ablene Reporter-News came out editorially this past

system of punishment in criminal cases should be motivated b

tdea of "an eye for an eye" went out with the beginning of the
Christian era (Matthew 6:38-39). Yet how can we honestly say Christan era (Maernew with the rehabilitation of the individual
that we are concerned when we would condemn him to an absolute punishment, with
no hope for improvement of his situation if he does become reno hope for improvement of his situation if he does become re-
habilitated? Hope is the greatest of all forces in human nature, and if we take away hope, we condemn the individual to an
animallike existance. In Dante's poem, "The Inferno", the doorway to Hell is described as having the words "Alandon hope, all ye
who enter here" engraved above it. This is what makes it Hell, who enter here" engraved above it. This is what makes it Hell,
the fact that there is no hope. To engrave, symbolically, this message over the gates of our prisons would be to turn the
The Abllene paper seems to feel that making the life term absolute, without hope of parole, would serve to decrease the
amount of crime, due to the severity of the penalty. This position doubt, that excessively severe penalties do not cut down on the arime rate, but in many cases, for some strange reason, actually
tend to increase it. Adjoining states, one with the death penalty with capital punishment for murder has a higher murder rat than the state that does not. If severity of penalty was a real
factor, the reverse would be true. A famous illustration of the ineffeetiveness of severe penalties occured in England in the 18 th
Century, when pickpocketing was a capital crime. There was public hanging of several pickpoekets as a warning to others in
that illegal profession. Great crowds turned out, and so did the pickpockets, for there were more than one hundred complaint
iled with police by members of that crowd who had their pockets picked while watching the executions.
It is a documented fact that a very large percentage of the prison riots are led by prisoners who have no hope of parole
And tin most of the cases in which guards have been killed durin escape attempts, the killers have been prisoners who have no hope of paroie. Ther feel they have nothing to 1
