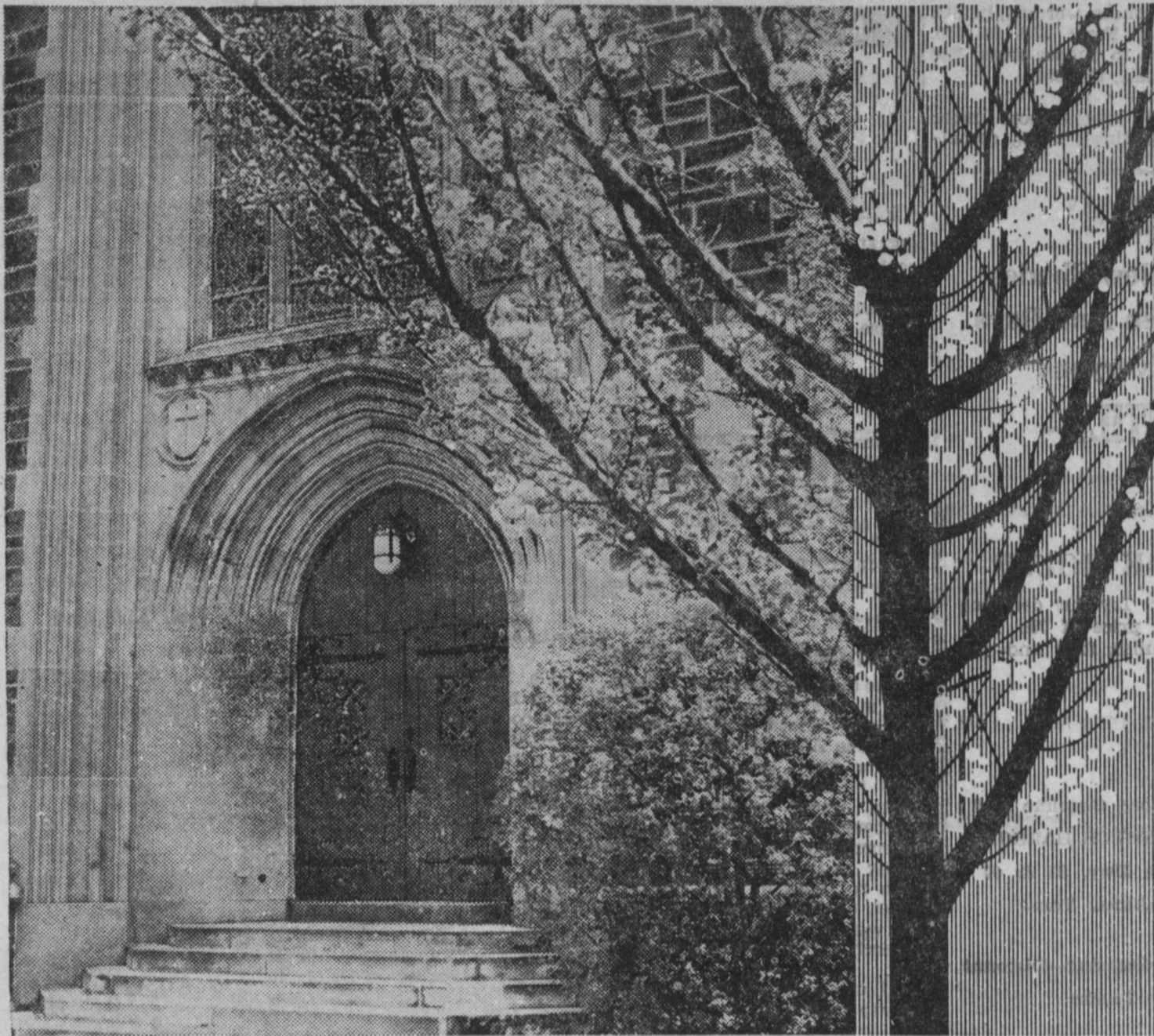

RESULTS, not Promises:

Here Is What Your City Council Is Doing For YOU

- The present administration obtained an additional firetruck for the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department, and remodeled the fire department's portion of City Hall so that all three trucks could be garaged there (previously, one had to be kept in a metal shed).
- The administration cooperated with the Santa Anna Housing Authority to obtain the 16-unit housing project, adding to the local economic situation.
- The present administration installed two-way radios in City Hall and the city's vehicles, saving time and money for the city, and providing faster service for its citizens.
- The current officeholders were responsible for remodeling and modernizing the City Warehouse Building, and the Water and Street department headquarters—all paid for.
- When the present administration took office, the city was employing three secretaries. With the addition of modern booking machines and systems, only one fulltime secretary is now needed, saving the taxpayers of the city the salaries of two fulltime workers.
- The city had no vehicles or machinery in good repair when the present administration took office, costing the city large sums in repairs. The city now owns three trucks, two pickups, a grader, two tractors (one with a mower attachment, one with a frontend loader), and in good repair, and all paid for.
- And all of this has been accomplished with one of the lowest tax rates of any city of this size in Texas.
- The present City Council built the water tank on the East Mountain, with a capacity of 5000,000 gallons of water.
- The current administration provides maintainance for the wading pool each spring, and furnishes water for the pool at no cost.
- When the present administration took office, the only streets that were paved in Santa Anna were Avenue B, Wallis Avenue, and Bowie Street near the cemetery. Santa Anna now has the highest percentage of paved streets of any city in Texas.
- Santa Anna had the highest per capita investment in construction of any city in Texas during 1964.
- When the present administration took office, the city did not have enough funds in the treasury to pay the city employees. During this administration, the city has operated entirely in the black, has never delayed payment on any bill, and now has one of the best credit ratings possible for a city of its size.
- City Hall has been completely renovated, and a new roof added, during the tenure of the present administration.
- The present members of the City Council were responsible for providing new siding and roofing for the City Library, for the landscaping, and for the sidewalks. The City furnishes utilities at no cost for the Library building.
- Many new businesses have come to Santa Anna, encouraged by the progressive city administration—A nursing home, a motel, a medical center that will be a multimillion dollar asset to the city, and many more.
- The administration participated in the county labor survey, providing facts to help obtain new industries and businesses for the area.
- And many, many more improvements.

Farmers' Commitments On Grain And Cotton Plantings To Be Made Soon

A. V. Bullard, chairman of the Coleman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, points out that only growers who participate in the 1966 Feed Grain, Wheat, and Cotton Programs will be eligible for price support on their 1966 crops of corn, barley, grain sorghums, wheat and cotton. As last year, the support is made available through loans, purchases, and price support payments.

Besides qualifying for price support loans, purchases, and payments, the participating grower also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use; the payment does not apply to the first 20 percent diversion except on farms with small bases. The price support payments may be earned on the projected production from an acreage up to 50 percent of the total feed grain base for the farm by planting one or more of the feed grains corn, grain sorghums, or barley.

Farmers who sign up and then carry out provisions of the 1966 voluntary wheat program will be able to get domestic marketing certificates in addition to price support loans and purchases for their wheat crop. On the "domestic" part of the projected production, the support available through loans and certificates will be at 100 percent of parity as of the beginning of the marketing year—July 1, 1966. (The February 4, 1966, wheat parity was \$2.53 per bushel.)

Cotton farmers on the larger farms take part in the program by reducing their cotton planting by at least 12.5 percent below the farm's effective allotment and meeting other program provisions. As much as 35 percent of the allotment may be diverted for payment.

Cotton growers who do not want to plant any cotton this year may sign up for 12.5 percent reduction, comply with intention and release to the county committee the remaining cotton allotment.

Farmers operating more than one farm and complying on any one of these programs must comply on the same program on all

the farms which they operate. In other words, a producer who over plant his feed grain base on any other farm. This is true under the wheat program and he cannot exceed the allotment under the cotton program.

All producers are reminded that Friday, April 1, is the final date to sign an intention under any of these programs.

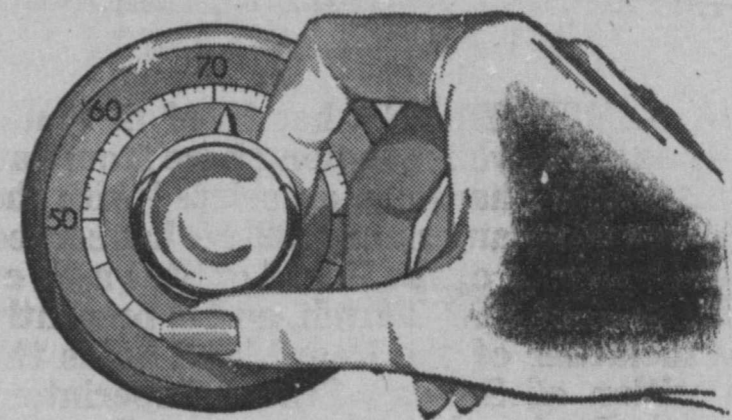

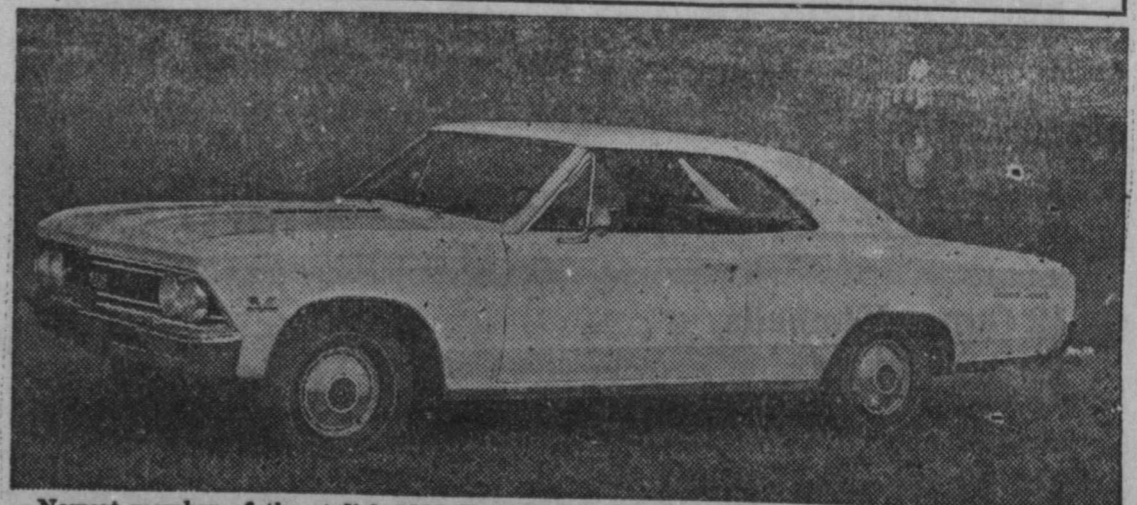
