Mistruth Number 1: $\$ 4,000$ For City Taxes?
One of the leaders of the movements to unseat the three incumbent Councilmen told a prospective voter that if the three incumbents stayed in office, her city, taxes, on her dwelling, would be from " $\$ 3,00$ to $\$ 4,00$," No taxpayers in the city, including businesses, pay this much tax, and it is more than the value of the property concerned. Actually, the bond issue will have no effect on taxes, according to state law. Don't be fooled!

## Mistruth Number 2: Health Or Conscience?

One of the stories being circulated says that the reason Mr. Joe Baker is not serving as election judge is because he was asked to condone crooked election practices. Mr. Baker's comment on this story: "Hogwash!" As many people know, Mr. Baker is recuperating from a serious illness, is not taking part on doctor's orders. Even a sick man is not immune to the lie machine.

## Mistruth Number 3: Sale Or Donation?

The opposition group is spreading the story that the site of Ranger Park Inn was 'given away' by the City. They could have learned the truth by checking the files in the County Clerk's office. But they don't seem much interested in the truth.

## Mistruth Number 4: This Is Economy?

Those trying to get onto the City Council state that they are interested in civic economy, yet their group has cost the people of Santa Anna thousands of dollars in legal fees by the foolish fight against the results of the bond election.
Mistruth Number 5: Tax And Reven"e Differ
Those opposing the present city government keep on telling people that the bond issue will raise their taxes. They must not know much about city government if they confuse revenue bonds (like those to be issued by Santa Anna) which cannot, by law, be paid from taxes, with other types of bonds. Either they don't know, or they don't want to know, neither of which is very good in someone who wants to run the city affairs.

Mistruth Number 6: The Magic Trick
The group trying to take over City Hall promises all sorts of special programs, and at the same time, takes a stand for more economy in city government. Don't they know you can't get something for nothing, or do they think they can fool the voters with wild promises?
Mistruth Number 7: A Change Of Heart?
Younger men should run the city, say those trying to take over the City Council, yet they fail to mention that one of their candidates was elected to the City Council, and then resigned. Or that another was asked on two different occasions to serve, and refused, saying he was not qualified. The voters can judge for themselves the motives behind their current desires to be elected.
Mistruth Number 8: On Providing Jobs
The group that plans to take over your city talks about providing more jobs for Santa Anna people. Yet by blocking the start of the water and sewer projects, the have blocked jobs for more than 75 Santa Annans. Which speaks louder in this case, words or actions?
Mistruth Number 9: This Is Cooperation?
"We believe the citizens of Santa Anna can and will work and cooperate with one another," says the campaign material of those trying to take over the city. Yet their bitter opposition to progress, their refusal to reason and cooperate, has caused more dissension than anything in the history of our city. They are willing to cooperate, as long as they have their way.
Mistruth Number 10: The Solid Gold Sewer Line
Did you know that if the sewer project goes through, it will cost homeowners $\$ 300$ per foot for their connecting lines? Stupid? Sure, but this is what the group that is trying to take over our city have been telling people, particularly elderly people on pensions. At prices like that, we should all become plumbers. Could you feel secure with representatives of this group running your city government, spending your tax money?
