Several years ago, we had a rather shocking experience.

This was during the summer of 1957, while we were home from college. Some friends from across the street were visiting, and the television set was on. Suddenly, the 13 year old daughter turned to us and said, "Gee, you can remember back before television, can't you?"

Believe us, it is quite a shock to be classed as an antique before you are even out of college. We realized, upon a little contemplation, that the young lady who posed the question couldn't remember back before television.

We were reminded of this incident the other day while watching a television special about the history of broadcasting, including the giants of the golden age of radio. And we were glad that we could remember back before television.

Remember the way in which certain programs became family institutions? Three fourths of the programs weren't cancelled at the end of each year, as is the case with television, so that certain programs became identified with certain days, or nights, as the case might be.

Remember the comedy shows, Bob Hope, with his familiar theme of "Thanks For The Memory"? And there was Red Skelton, and "mean widdle kid." And Jack Benny, and his vault. Fred Allen, and the denizens of Allen's Alley—Senator Claghorn ("I say, that's a joke, son!") and the rest. And the great Fanny Brice as Baby Snooks. And the Aldredge family. And a host of others. Each comedy program followed a definite format, with the various characters being introduced in a fixed pattern that never varied. Had Jack Benny or Bob Hope changed the formats of their programs, there would probably have been a revolution.

Who can forget Fibber Magee and his hall closet, or the great Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll, better known throughout the country as Amos and Andy?

Then there were the dramatic shows—the Lux Radio Theatre, with dramatizations of current motion pictures, and several others of similar nature.

The programs available in the afternoon for the grade school crowd makes the cartoon offerings of television seem pale by comparison. There was Jack Armstrong, the all American boy (sponsored by Wheaties), and Captain Midnight and his Secret Squadron (Ovaltine), and Hop Harrigan, also an airborne type. And there was Tennessee Jed and his adventures on the Wilderness Road in pioneer Kentucky (don't know why he wasn't named Kentucky Jed).

Of course, there were the soap operas in the afternoon, and the radio versions had a strong advantage over their TV successors, because the housewife could sweep or sew or wash dishes, and still not miss a bit of the current agonies of Ma Perkins or Young Widder Brown. And there was Helen Trent and Stella Dallas and good old Lorenzo Jones, who was an inventor, and who had a wife named Belle and the classiest themesong of any of the afternoon epics.

The weekends were the times when radio blossomed forth in all its splendor—the whole family was home all day, and the radio tubes were kept warm from morning to night. Saturday morning started off with a couple of offerings for the younger generation, with "Let's Pretend," dramatized versions of fairy tales, notable primarily for the lousy acting, and then Buster Brown ("I'm Buster Brown, I live in a shoe...") We would have classified Buster as a fink, had the term been invented then.

Following Buster Brown and his dog, Tige, there was one of the better dramatic shows—"Grand Central Station," which the announcer introduced each week with the words: "Grand Central Station! Crossroads of million private lives. Gigantic stage on which is played a thousand dramas daily." Remember?

Later on came the Shadow ("Who knows what evil lurks in the heart of man? The Shadow knows. Heh, heh, heh!"). The Shadow was supposed to be a good guy, but we could never convince ourselves that anyone with such an evil-sounding laugh could be all good.

Sunday evening was the time for the comedy shows—The Nelson Family, Jack Benny, Phil Harris, Fred Allen, in an order as immutable as the setting of the sun.

To hear just the theme songs of the great radio shows brings back a feeling of nostalgia. The radio was always playing, a background theme for all of life during the golden age of

School District Transfers In May

The month of May has been designated by the Texas Education Agency, and by state law, as the period during which transfers must be made from one school district to another, according to Santa Anna Superintendent of Schools Cullen Perry.

This applies only to students who will not attend school in their home districts during the 1966-1967 school year.

Students must be listed annually on the census roll of their home school districts, and a transfer must be made if any student plans to attend a school other than his home school, in order that the receiving school may count average daily attendance for that student, and receive state and Federal funds due.

Forms for transfer in or out of the local district are available at the local school office, and at the office of the county school superintendent.

Letting Of Contract For Santa Anna Sewer And Water Improvements Set

The delay was due to the slowness of the Supreme Court of Texas in deciding on the appeal of the election contest suit involving the election that approved the bonds for financing the project. The contest suit was decided in favor of the City in both 35th District Court and the 11th Court of Civil Appeals and was then appealed to the high court.

Original date for opening the bids on the project was Friday, April 29.

A spokesman for the firm that is serving as the City's financial agent said that the delays caused by the contest suit have cost Santa Anna between \$25,000 and \$30,000, due to legal costs and because of the increases in prices of construction materials between the time the bonds were approved by the voters and the present time.

Mountaineer Band Sets Final Concert

The Santa Anna High School band will present the final concert of the season on Thursday, May 12, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

This concert will honor the senior members of the band, and will feature short concerts by the beginners band and the junior high school band, prior to the concert by the senior high school band.

Tickets are available from all band members, and are priced at 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

The surprise announcement of a new written candidate for the position of justice of the peace in the local precinct sparked interest in the primary election this coming Saturday, May 7.

Wednesday, Mrs. Modora Gilmore announced as a written candidate for the peace justice office, in Justice of the Peace precinct number 7, which comprises the same territory as County Commissioner precinct number 2. There is only one candidate listed on the ballot for this position, the incumbent, W. Earl Irick, Sr.

In an interview with The Santa Anna News, Mrs. Gilmore stated that her decision came after repeated urging by a number of friends. She said that she felt that her experience in assisting her husband, Earl, in his duties as justice of the peace of the one of the largest precincts in Fort Worth, where he served for six years in the office, would be of great value in giving her the background to handle the local justice of the peace duties.

Mrs. Gilmore's announcement gave local voters two races with strictly local candidates. The other involves the county commissioner race, in which incumbent Thomas Wristen Jr. is facing a challenge from two opponents, Glen F. Pope and Byron (Lefty) Gilbreath.

Winners in the Democratic primary Saturday will be almost assured of election, since the Coleman County Republicans have no candidates listed in their primary for local and county offices, and no races for nomination to statewide offices. The state GOP will field a slate of candidates for state offices, but will be concentrating on the race between incumbent United States Senator John Tower and his Democratic opponent, who will be named in the primary.

In Coleman County, several races have developed for the Democratic nomination for various offices. In fact, the only county office up for grabs that does not have a race is that of District Clerk G. A. (Tode) Hensley.

County Judge Frank Lewis has drawn opposition from Erman Miller, of Coleman, who recently retired as manager of the J. C. Penney store in that city.

County Clerk Lee Craig will be opposed for renomination by Barney Ransberger, Coleman service station operator. Monte Gideon, incumbent county treasurer, will face a bid from Bob Browning, who recently sold his service station business in Coleman.

With the current officeholder not running for reelection, two candidates are vying for the Democratic nomination to the office of county school superintendent, D. H. Williams, now in the contracting business, and T. Knox Campbell. Both candidates have teaching and school administrative experience.

Nine candidates for state and national office appear on the primary ballot without opposition. They include Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White, Comptroller of Public Accounts Robert S. Calvert, State Treasurer Jesse James, Robert W. Calvert for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, Clyde E. Smith for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, Joe Greenhill for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas (Smith is candidate for place 1 and Greenhill for place 2 on the Supreme Court), Cecil C. Colings for Associate Justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, David Ratliff for State Senator from the 24th District, and Ben Barnes for State Representative from the 64th District.

Bidding for a third term, Governor John Connally faces opposition from Houston businessman Stanley C. Woods, of Houston, and Johnnie Mae Hackworth, a self-styled prophetess from Brenham.

Incumbent Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith will be running against State Repre-

sentative Bill Hollowell, who is a team entry in the campaign with gubernatorial candidate Woods.

Seeking the opportunity to oppose incumbent US Senator John Tower in the November general elections are State Attorney General Waggoner Carr and Houston advertising man John R. (Jack) Willoughby.

The hottest statewide race is for Carr's present post, with three well regarded candidates running neck and neck for the nomination, including State Senator Franklin Spears, of San Antonio, the liberal candidate, State Senator Galloway Calhoun, who calls himself the only real conservative in the race, and former Secretary of State Crawford Martin, of Hillsboro, generally considered to be a

ler is presently blocking in disagreement with Federal officials over mineral rights.

Byron Tunnell, former speaker of the State House of Representatives is facing his first elective campaign after being appointed to the Railroad Commission. He is opposed by P. S. (Puss) Ervin and Paul B. Harling, with the latter, a member of the Texas Senate, as the strongest challenger.

Judge W. T. McDonald of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is running for reelection against District Judge John F. (Jack) Onion, of San Antonio.

In a race that is generating a great deal of local interest, long time United States Congressman Omar Burleson, of Anson, is facing a determined challenge from Abilene attorney and radio



executive Eldon Mahon. Coleman attorney Don Johnson is seeking reelection as the county Democratic chairman, without opposition.

All qualified voters can participate in the primary elections but only in one. The polls, located in the Santa Anna Lions Club Building, in downtown Santa Anna, will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Election judge will be Glen Copeland.

Local School District To Offer Classes In Commercial Subjects For Adults

Classes in certain commercial subjects will be made available to adults in the Santa Anna Independent School District if there is enough demand, according to Superintendent of Schools Cullen Perry.

Included would be courses in typing, shorthand, and bookkeeping. These courses will be developed according to the individual's requirements, both for learning new skills and for polishing skills already learned.

No credit for high school will be given for the completion of these courses, but a record will be kept showing successful completion.

Tuition charges for the courses will vary, depending on the number enrolled for each subject.

Anyone interested in attending such courses should indicate this in writing at the Santa Anna High School office, listing name, address, telephone number, and the subject or subjects desired. Time and place of the classes will be determined in a meeting of the students in each course, Saturday, May 30 is the deadline for signing up for any of these courses.

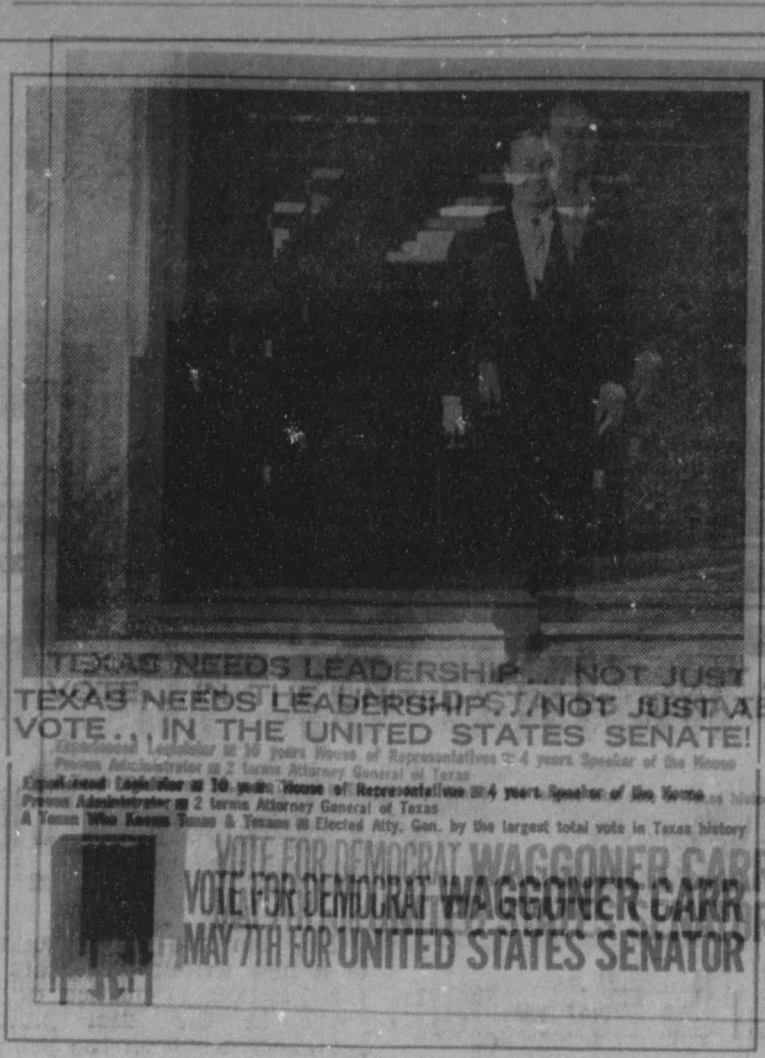

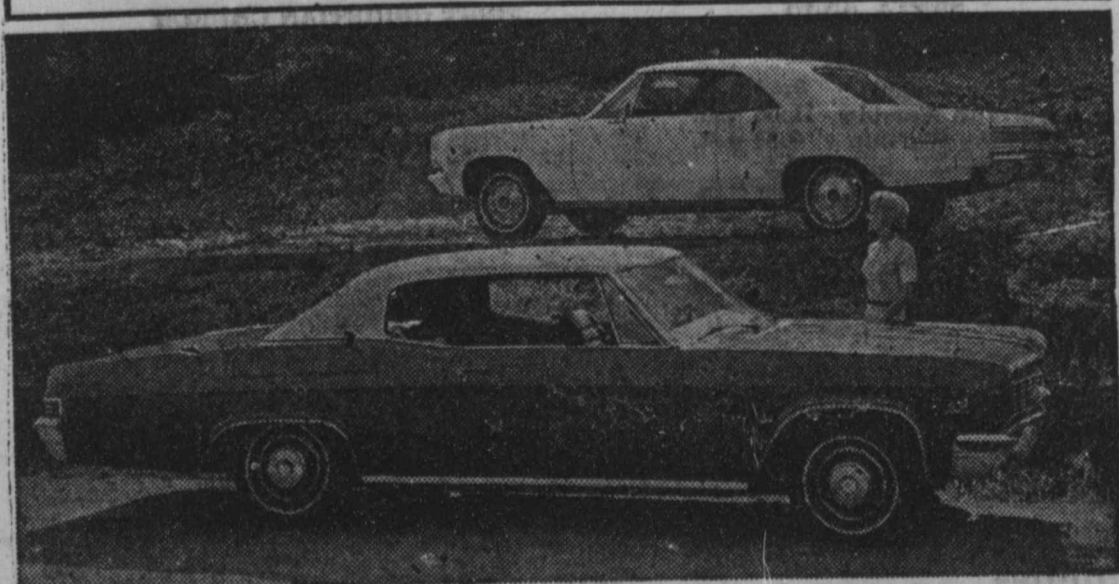
