Son of Carbon Residents Dies In Carrier Fire

James Kenneth Gray, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus T. Gray of Carbon, was one of 43 persons killed in the explosion and fire aboard the aircraft carrier Oriskany off the coast of Viet Nam last Wednesday.

Funeral arrangements have been pending since the parents were notified of their son's death by military telegram.. The telegram informed them that the seaman, who had completed three years of a four-year collstment, had been axphyxiated.

Young Gray was born in McAllen and had lived in Lubbock and in Happy, Tex. His family moved to Carbon about two years ago. He is survived by his parents; three brothers, Ray, 19, also in the Navy stationed in San Franciso aboard the USS Delta: Blaine, 27, of Gorman, and Wayne, 30, pastor of a church at Aztec, New Mexico.

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TEXAS IS ON THE MOVE!

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272 Students Learn by Night At Local College

Handling the night load are one full-time faculty member and eight part-time instructors. Each instructor has either a bachelor's or master's degree.

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County Historical Group Has Meeting on Markers for Towns

The Eastland County His torical Committee met Thursday afternoon in the Lake Leon cabin of Mrs. Arthur Murrell, Eastland represen tative.

County Chairman Mike Collins reported on the official Texas Historical town markers which have been applied for by the committee. One will be erected in Rising Star and one in Eastland, if the applications are approved. The committee plans to obtain a Town Marker for each town in the county when possible. Each Town Marker will contain information on the organization and history of the town. These markers costs several hun dred dollars and Collins pointed out that, at this time, the Committee is working on a \$500 annual budget. This money is an allocation from the County.

Berry Greenwood of Car-bon, Mrs. Alex Spears of Cisco and Mrs. Murrell presented reports from the Workshop on the Organiza-tion of Small Museums, which they attended in Woodville,

They stated that there is absolutely no easy way to start a museum and explained that, although the musthe work connected with it is not small or simple. Professional help would be required.

Collins said, "At this time, the Committe is just ex-ploring the possibility of a museum for the county. This is not a definite project yet. A museum is not something built by a committee; it would require the entire county's enthusiasm and support. This building of a museum would take many years and we play to investigate it from every angle before making any decision."

The Committee also discussed the State Historical Convention, which will be held the first week in December in Fort Worth. East land County representatives will distribute packages containing items from each town, as well as historical data maps, and up-to-date information about the county.

The next meeting will be at 3:30 p. m., in the County Commissioner's Courtroom on Nov. 10.

Texas Farmers Get Most Money At Their Banks

AUSTIN - Texas banks were serving farms and ranches with more credit and other financial services than any other lenders at the beginning of this year, according to Walter F. Johnson, president, Texas Bankers Association, and president, First National Bank of Abi-

During 1965, Texas banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services. Based on the 25th annual farm and ranch lending summary of the agricultural committee of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Johnson reported that at the begin ning of 1966, Texas banks were helping farmers and ranchers with \$708 million in loans, 7 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$591 million in pro-duction loans and \$117 million in farm and ranch mortgages. At the same time, \$521 mil lion in farm and ranch loans was held by life insurance companies; \$375 million by the Federal Land Banks; \$159 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$88 million in non-real estate loans, plus \$56 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 71 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Texas farmers banks.

Mr. Johnson said that "bankers in Texas are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers and ranchers.

The increased use of credit by farmers and ranchers, according to Mr. Johnson, has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm and ranch families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers and ranchers contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm and ranch families have \$212 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 84 per cent of the total capital requirements of

farmers and ranchers.
Mr. Johnson stressed the importance of farmers, ranchers and bankers working closely together to improve farm and ranch financial arrangements. He reported that nearly 89 per cent of the banks in Texas were extending credit to farm perople.
