Financial Planning Helps Achieve Goals

COLLEGE STATION - Make your family financial spending plan based on a simple set of fundamental principles. This is the recommendation of today's money management experts regardless of the total family income, says Extension home management specialist, Mrs. Wanda Meyer of Texas A&M. University. Gain a better idea of where

your money goes by keeping a record of your expenditures for a month or so. Then record all the fixed major items of expense you must meet. This would include rent or mortgage payments, heat and utility costs, insurance, car payments, contributions, real estate taxes, and installment payments. You must provide for these obligations first.

Plan your daily expenses, such as feed, clothing, and clothing care, car expenses other than monthly payments, and medical and dental expenses. You'll find this area of your budget flexible. Day-to-day expenses are adjustable. For example, your family's tastes, size, number of times you eat out, and your cooking and shopping skills have a bearing on the amount of daily expenditures. Next, establish an emergency

fund to take care of the unexpected. A frequent recommendation is an amount equal to your income for 3 to 6 months. Do you believe that the idea of setting up a family spending and saving plan may seem to limit your spending options? Actually, says Mrs. Meyer, many families find that financial planning helps them reach their lesired goal and still be financially independent.







How much - Most ponds require from 6 to 12 applications of fertilizer each year. You can fertilize any pond correctly by testing the water with a simple gadget you can make yourself. Nail No. 303 tin can lid on the end of a stick that is marked at 6, 12, and 18 inches above the disk. If disk goes out of sight below 12 inches, fertilizer may not be needed. If a pond is and Mrs. P. 


Santa Fe Hospital **Changes** Procedure

A private hospital at Temple, which for 75 years was devoted to the care of Santa Fe Railway employees, has been changed into an institution which today will permit care of public patients.


The new name adopted by the Trustees for the institution is the Santa Fe Memorial Hospital. The Board announced there would be no change in the method of handling railway employees.
