Every month 120,000 Americans reach the age of 65. The soon-to-be-65's are asking these days, "When is the best time for me to sign up for medicare?"

The answer, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., Abilene social se-1 curity district manager, is that; they should sign up two or three months before they reach

If they wait until the month hey reach 65 or the following 3 months, their hospital insurance protection under medicare begins right away, but their overage under the voluntary. loctor bill insurance will not tart until 1 to 3 months after they sign up for it.

Tuley explained that the medicare law provides a 7menth initial enrollment period for the voluntary doctor bill insurance part of the program. This period begins with the 3rd month before the person is 65, includes the month in which he reaches 65, and ends with the 3rd month thereafter.

"The best time to enroll," he said, "is in one of the 3 months before you reach 65. If you do so, your protection starts with the month of your 65th birthday. Waiting until that month start of your protection."

### **Boating Violations** Reflect Increase

Impact of stricter law enforcement on the new statewide boating safety code was reflected in the latest arrest report by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

It included 110 citations for violating various phases of the law passed by the last State Legislature. Conspicuously, 29 of the 110 tickets written involved the requirement that life jackets be provided all boat occupants.

Fishing without a license again was a major infraction. Citations for that cause totaled 366, making 1432 tickets written for that reason during the last three months.

The firearms front was comparatively quiet while water sport prevailed. There were 54 hunting violations, including three for killing deer in closed season, three for hunting with an artifical light, and two for hunting at night.

Seven persons were filed on for killing quail in closed seasson and one for shooting a duck out of season.

One angler got so daring that he was caught trying to catch hatchery fish and three were detected using an old crank telephone set to stun fish.


