"While innocent victims are daily maimed, molested and massacred by fanatic terrorists, the so-called liberals commiserate not with the unfortunate victims, but rather with those who kill, torture, and terrorize."

When there is such a relationship, and an emergency arises en route, the law generally does impose an affirmative duty to give aid.

That doesn't mean the passenger can hold the carrier liable under all circumstances. For one thing, before there is any duty to help, there must be some clear sign that help is

Thus, a railroad was excused for not aiding a seriously ill woman, when the only sign of her affliction was that she had rested her head on her hand. But once the peril is apparent.

In a medical emergency involving an expectant mother on train, a court held that the train should have been halted at the next town, rather than at the next regular stop.

In one case, a bus rider who had suffered a severe eye injury was left in the station, alone and helpless. The bus company was later held liable for not making sure the victim was placed in responsible hands. Summarizing the law, the court said:



Your physician may find that the hearing loss is due to impacted wax in the ear canal or some other obstruction, says a pamphlet of the American Medical Association. be an infection of the nerves of hearing. Certain drugs and industrial chemicals can affect hearing; mumps or scarlet fever. a cold or acute sinusitis frequently cause swelling of the mucous membranes associated with the ear. A loud noise or sharp blow may damage the

The physician can determine by a variety of tests whether loss of hearing is due to nerve damage or to an interference with the transmission of sound waves. If there is obstruction he can tell whether it is due to infection or another cause. He will determine whether treatment will help or correct the hearing problem. Several surgical precedures are used to help the deaf to hear, and there also are medical treatments.

many cases however treatment cannot restore hearing, and a hearing aid may be types of hearing aids on the market. Your physician will guide you in finding the aid that gives best results for you. Or he can advise you that a hearing aid will be of little or no help in your case.

### **Worst Teacher** Shortage In 25 Years Faces Texas

Texas is facing its worst teacher stortage in 25 years, according to the Texas State Teachers Association.

Results of a survey were released Sept. 29 by TSTA Executive Secretary, Charles H. Ten-

A need exists for some 5,500 fully qualified teachers throughout the state, he said.

The survey was conducted to include every one of the some 1,303 Texas school districts, of which 82% have replied.

Tennyson said that tabulation of the survey returns showed that by September 28th, 1,069 school districts reported a need for 5,492 fully qualified teach-

More than 10,000 teachers are teaching in Texas this year with only emergency permits, Tennyson said.

### **Education State's** No. 1 Problem **Barnes Says**

Education is the No. 1 problem that will face the next legislature, says Ben Barnes, speaker of the Texas House

Addressing the 40th annual meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration recently, Barnes said "we will spend twice as much on education in 1966 as

He emphasized that "we are already experiencing an enrollment problem. By the year 2000, our population will double, from 12 million to 24 million," Barnes

Another major problem in edncation, he said, is the high percentage of students who do not complete high school. "Only 54 in every 100 students graduate from high school ,and only 36 go to college. Then only 18 get bachelor degrees, and only 1 of the original 100 gets a master's degree or Ph.D."

Barnes emphasized that Texas schools are providing only 11 percent of persons with graduate degrees needed by indus-

Yet more important, said Barnes, is the problem of the 46 who do not graduate. "Here, vocational and technical training is needed to help them increase their income.'

Tourism, highway safety and water resources are other matters that will face the legislature next session, Barnes told the Texas homemakers. More laws concerning safe roads and driving are expected to come before the 60th Legislature, Barnes
