

## SPS merger gains Texas approval

Two federal hurdles are all that remain in the way of a merger between Southwestern Public Service and Public Service Company of Colorado.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas Wednesday approved the merger to create New Century Energies. The Texas approval was the final in a series of okays from other utility commissions in affected states. Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Kansas have all given approval. Oklahoma's public utility commission has said it will not oppose the merger.

It was the fourth time the merger proposal had come before the Texas PUC for approval.

The final steps in the merger come at the federal level, where an administrative law judge for the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has recommended approval. The companies are waiting to appear on the commission agenda. Pending approval by the FERC and by the Securities and Exchange Commission, the merger is targeted for completion in May.

The Muleshoe SPS office is among 17 in Texas and New

Mexico that will be closed between May and November as a result of the merger. The remaining 26 SPS offices will cease all bill payment and regular office functions.

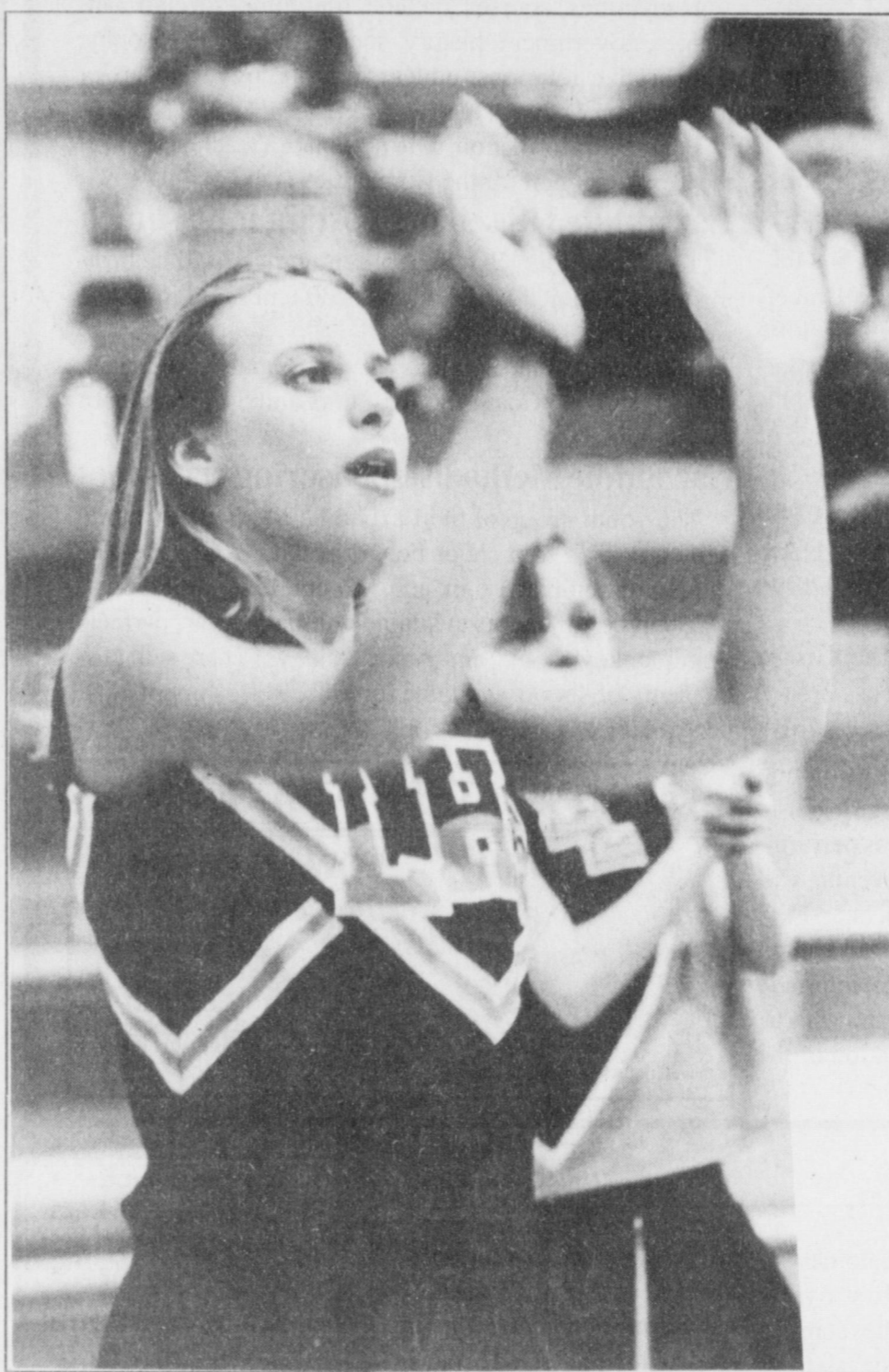
SPS provides electric service to about one million people in a 52,000-square-mile area covering eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Public Service Co. of Colorado is a Denver-based electric, natural gas and thermal energy utility that serves a 32,000-square-mile area and a population of 2.8 million people in Colorado and the Cheyenne, WY area.

The merger will result in an overall reduction of 1,457 jobs; or 19 percent of the combined total workforce. The reduction in the SPS service area with 418 jobs; 249 of which are still to be cut.

Muleshoe SPS manager Mike McDearmon and office employees Dolores Garrett and Kim Neinast, with a combined 53 years of service to SPS, are

## Shaw faces second charge in neglect case

Authorities have filed a second charge against the live-in caregiver of Ella Mae Osbend, a mentally disabled Bailey County woman who apparently died Jan. 18 of neglect.

Andrew Lee Shaw, 42, the common-law husband of one of Osbend's daughters, faces two counts of injury to a disabled person: one in connection with the death of the 54-year-old Osbend; and one for her 49-year-old brother, Bobby D. Raybon, who is also mentally disabled.

Shaw was arrested and charged with the first count Jan. 23. He is being held in the county jail on bonds totaling \$75,000.

Shaw "intentionally and knowingly" neglected Raybon, which led to the second and more serious charge being filed, according to Benny Clifton, a criminal investigator with the Bailey County Sheriff's Department.

The second charge is considered a first-degree felony, which is punishable by 5 to 99 years in jail and a \$10,000 fine. The original charge is a second-degree felony.

Investigators are still waiting for an autopsy report.

The case will be presented to a grand jury Feb. 10 and investigators did not rule out the possibility of additional charges being added.

Bailey County Sheriff's deputies found Osbend and her brother the night of Jan. 18 in their home a mile west of Muleshoe after Shaw asked a neighbor to call 911 and report a possible stroke, Clifton said.

## St. Clair inks with Midwestern State

Lazbuddie—Justin St. Clair hasn't played 11-man football since junior high.

The Lazbuddie High School senior has since grown to a sturdy 6-foot-2 and 205 pounds and become one of the top six-man players in the South Plains.

But few noticed.

St. Clair often wondered if his dream of playing college football would die in the tiny football stadiums that dot West Texas. Six-man games are the heartbeat of many cotton gin communities on Friday night, but draw little interest from college recruiters.

But somebody did notice.

St. Clair officially signed a national letter of intent Thursday to play football at Midwestern State, a NCAA Division II school in Wichita Falls.

"I'm just excited," said St.

Clair, who also considered an offer from Angelo State.

St. Clair said he felt Midwestern was an up-coming program and he'd get a chance to play sooner. He said he also felt more comfortable.

St. Clair accounted for 2,573 yards and 32 touchdowns while leading Lazbuddie to a 10-2 record and the state playoffs in 1996.

St. Clair was a two-year starter at quarterback before moving to running back this year, where he rushed for 1,238 yards and 14 touchdowns.

The strong-armed senior also completed 67 of 131 passes for 1,091 yards and 15 touchdowns and caught 15 passes for 244 yards and three touchdowns.

It was his versatility that landed St. Clair on the Lubbock Avalanche Journal's All-South Plains team and on a few recruiter's lists.

St. Clair was recruited as a tight end. Midwestern State said they might give him a look at quarterback in future.

"I just want to play," said St. Clair, although he later admitted he'd like to give quarterback a shot.

Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson was happy his star player is getting a chance.

"I just love it," Scisson said. "There are kids in six-man who can play. You just have to look."

Scisson sent highlight films

of St. Clair to the schools he wanted to attend.

"Coaches aren't exactly knocking on six-man doors," Scisson said. "But Justin is real versatile and he's got great

## Any moisture good news for farmers

After a day of drizzling rain, Muleshoe residents woke up Friday to a light snow.

Muleshoe received three-tenths of an inch of moisture over Thursday and Friday, including a half-inch of snow early Friday morning.

Area farmers should benefit doubly from the cold, wet weather, according to County Extension Agent Curtis Preston.

"The cold weather has probably killed a lot of bugs," Preston said. "The moisture was good, its just not enough."

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation estimates that Bailey County farmers need between two and eight inches of rain to bring their fields to optimum capacity.

Preston said farmers would also benefit more from one good downpour rather than a lot of little spurts of rain.

"It's hard to get a whole lot of good out of two-tenths and three-tenths at a time," Preston said.

Robert Barritt, a forecaster for the National Weather Service in Lubbock, attributes the light moisture to a weak storm system.

Residents won't have much time to get used to any weather, according to Barritt, who forecasts alternating periods of

## Muleshoe Chamber searching for part-time manager

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture is looking for a part-time manager.

**Sandhill cranes are sight at sunset**

A few thousand lesser sandhill cranes are roosting nightly on Paul's Lake at the northeast side of the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, but they will soon be leaving the South Plains on their annual northward spring migration.

The spring crane migration normally occurs between mid-January and mid-February. The largest number of cranes observed this year was 9,000 on Jan. 23. Sunset is the best time to observe the cranes. Most will be gone after the first week in March.

### 'Horns survive multi-win game

FARWELL — So far, the fight between Lazbuddie and Farwell for the second District 3-1A playoff berth is a split decision.

Lazbuddie evened the Parmer County grudge match Tuesday, beating Farwell 53-48 — in all likelihood setting up a third and final winner-take-all game.

The win gives Lazbuddie (19-6, 5-2 in district) a one-game lead over Farwell (19-6, 4-3) with one game remaining. But the Longhorns had to beat top-ranked Nazareth at home Friday to secure a playoff berth.

A loss would have eliminated the Longhorns.

Nazareth (24-4, 7-0) has already clinched the district title.

Farwell plays at 20-game loser Happy Friday.

If Lazbuddie and Farwell finish in a tie, a playoff game will be held at a neutral site next week.

Farwell edged Lazbuddie 75-74 in the first meeting.

Lazbuddie, which trailed 44-40 entering the fourth quarter in Tuesday's game, scored the last seven points of the game.



*Make new friendships.* Friendship. It's one of God's best blessings. The time it takes to have friends, to be a friend, is time well-spent that will bring rich dividends.

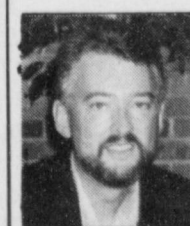
*Seek guidance when you need it.* It may seem ruggedly independent never to seek help or advice from friends, relatives, ministers, or counselors. But it's not very bright.

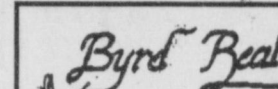
