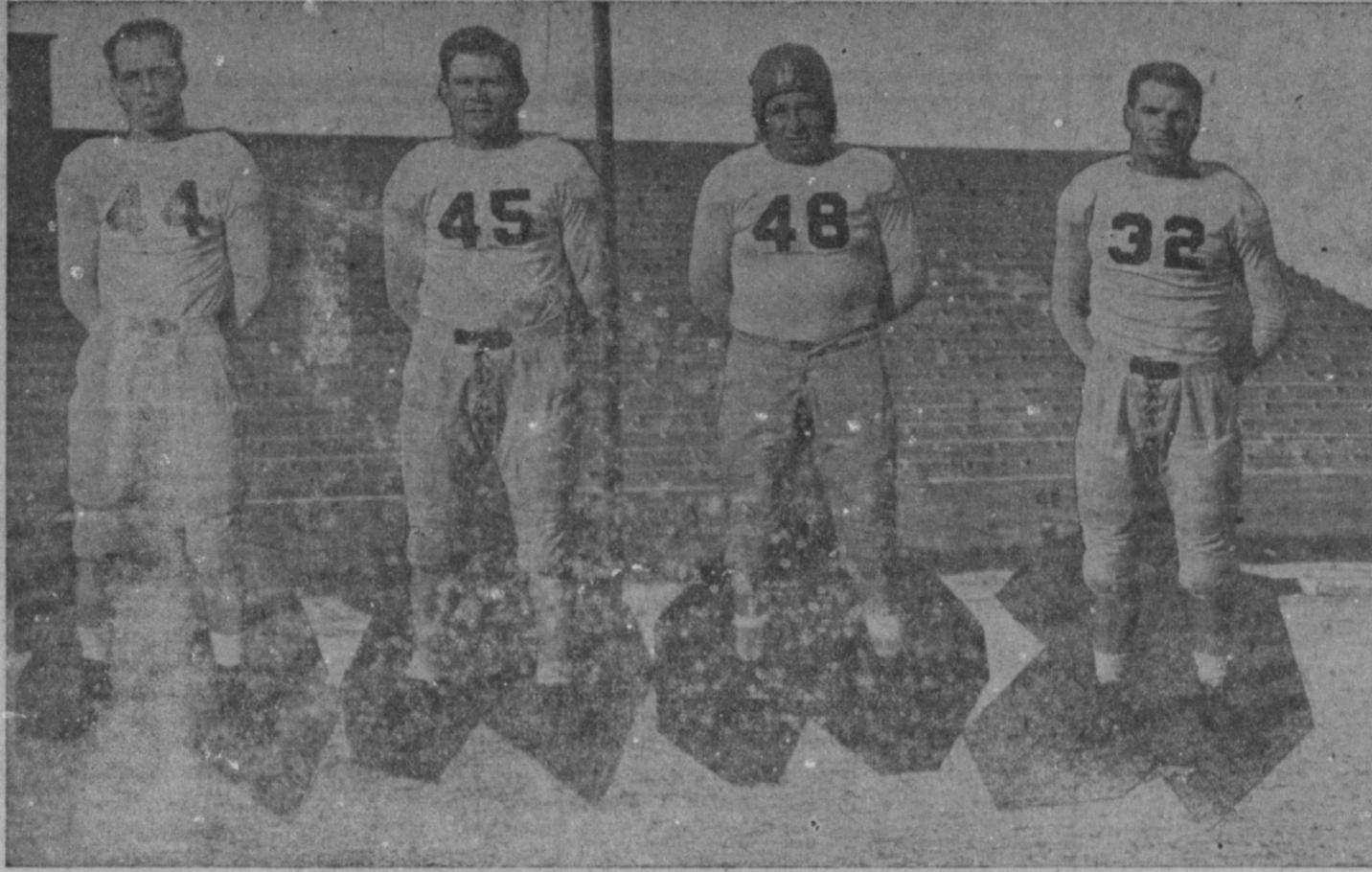
Junior Teams Split Pair

Picture Still Is Mystery

The mystery still remains--how did a metal cut of a 1937 Daniel Baker College annual picture get in the NEWS office? Johnny Valentine found the old cut recently and we had no trouble identifying the men pictured -- but the first identification was partially incorrect. The fellow on the extreme left was said to be Ross F.escott, a coach at Santa Anna during the 1930's. The man pictured on the right was supposed to be Dow McBride, a former coach who was in Santa Anna during the early 1950's. However, in seeking more information about the old picture, we asked Supt. Cullen Perry of he knew where the picture originated, and he certainly did! He was Editor of the college annual in 1937 and did the lay-out of the picture, and even brought his annual to prove it.

Mr. Whitaker was football coach at Santa Anna in 1947. He left here for a coaching job at Crowell and still remains in the coaching profession in north Texas.

Johnny Little, now deceased, was Principal at Killen High School after leaving Santa Anna where he coached during 1938-1940.

Mr. Conger and Mr. Chrane, both natives of Brownwood, never were associated with the local schools. Mr. Chrane is now a teacher in the San Saba High School.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Protecting Fish and Game
Lawmakers in a coastal state, worried about overfishing in tidal waters, passed a law forbidding the use of large nets. Fishermen duly challenged the law on the ground that there were "still plenty of fish in the sea."

But the court held the law valid.

"No resource is inexhaustible," said the court. "We think the protective hand of the state may be extended before the danger is imminent. The state is interested not merely in preservation of specimens for museums, but in perpetuating a constant supply."

Fish and game on public property belong to the public as a free-for-all, the state—as trustee for the public—has broad powers of regulation.

For example, the state has wide discretion in imposing penalties. In one case a man arrested for illegal possession of 2,000 ducks drew a fine of \$20,000—\$10 per duck.

"That big a fine is unconstitutional," he protested in appealing to a higher court. "It amounts to cruel and unusual punishment."

But the court held that the state was merely making the punishment fit the crime. The judge said the severity of the sentence was "the fault not of the law but of the infractor."

Furthermore, in proving its case, the state does not necessarily have to catch a violator red-handed. Thus, it may make the mere possession of certain types of fishing and hunting equipment "prima facie" evidence of illegal fishing or hunting, shifting onto the defendant the burden of proving his innocence.

Nevertheless, if the evidence is too flimsy, the court will dismiss the case. Take this situation:

Game wardens, halting a car near a lake, found four men with fishing licenses and a fifth man without. The four said they had indeed been fishing, but they all insisted the fifth man had not.

Was his mere presence in the car enough to convict him of fishing without a license? The court said no, because that would be punishing him on the basis of highly circumstantial evidence.

In other words, the fisherman and the hunter must accept the law's restraints in the spirit of public interest; but the law, in turn must apply those restraints in the

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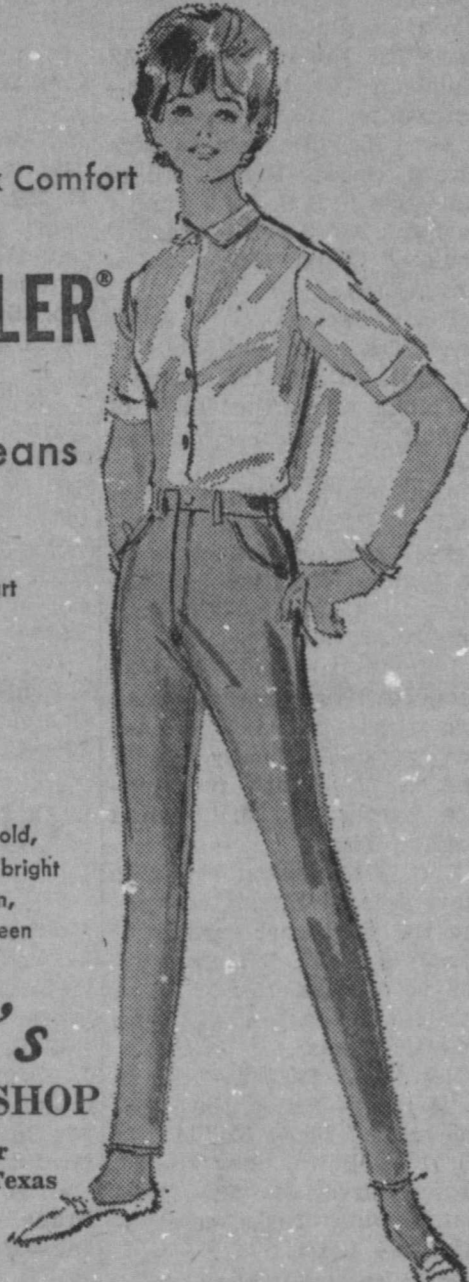

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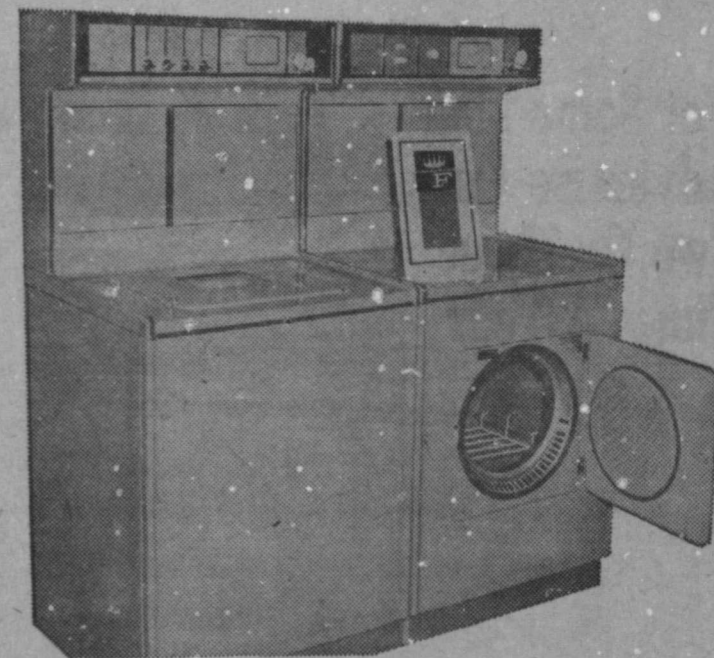

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WEST TEXAS UTILITIES
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Austin Texas — Immediate implementation of the Texas Water Development Board's \$70-billion water plan (to take water to every part of Texas) lowering the voting age to 18, lifting the constitutional ceiling on state public welfare contributions, and a gradual revision of the State Constitution were some of the surprises Gov. Preston Smith offered the Legislature.

All 181 Legislators had been pacing themselves for the first two weeks of the session, waiting to see what their new governor wanted from them, and now they know his aims. But he has yet to reveal his budget and tax recommendations, which will have tremendous bearings on whether his programs are enacted.

Governor Smith lauded the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System's plan to provide upper-level senior colleges in Mid-

land-Odessa, Corpus Christi, Houston and Dallas and a 4-year college in San Antonio, but he did not adopt it specifically. However, he did embrace the board's recommendation for new state medical schools in Houston and Lubbock, a new dental school in San Antonio, and state participation in Baylor University's dental and medical schools.

He called for a state police certification program for prison parolees, an "implied consent" D. W. I. test to cut down on traffic accidents involving alcohol, "enlarging" the Parks & Wildlife Commission to obtain better geographical distribution, and raising workmen's compensation benefits from \$35 to \$45 a week.

Gov. Smith endorsed the 1968 State Democratic platform (which had his approval), but he added: "I have read the Texas Republican Platform. I think you will

find the two quite similar." Smith's message to the Legislature left unanswered the question of spending and taxing. He called for economy, but conceded that new taxes may be needed. His recommendations as to what should be spent and where it should come from will follow in another message.

His legislative program was very extensive. Rural legislators who have been getting objections to the proposals for school consolidation made by Gov. John Connally's Committee on Public School Education were glad to hear Smith call that plan impossible to pass. He did agree with the committee that there should be some school consolidations, but he felt they should be voluntary.

Attracting much interest was the fact that the new governor did not mention in his list of proposed constitutional amendments the one to allow local option liquor-by-the-drink. Instead, he merely gave legislators a copy of the Democratic platform which called for a statewide vote on the question.

When Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes took office, they gave the Capitol the first West Texas team since 1947. West Texans were prominent among those in Austin to cheer for the men from Lubbock and DeLeon.

TUITION HIKE PROPOSED

Finance committee of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System found tuitions of students must be doubled to help pay the expected \$404.2-million biennial operating cost of the higher education facilities by 1975-76.

The committee also proposed \$165 a year student building fee to float bonds for a \$401-million college construction program. Fee would apply only on six new campuses recommended during the next decade.

Tuition suggested by the committee would be \$7 per semester credit hour for Texas residents and \$20 per credit hour for nonresidents. This would raise an additional \$22-million a year. Present tuition rate, unchanged since 1957, is \$50 a semester. It is one of the lowest in the nation.

The committee strongly re-

commended a uniform building system and standardized construction components for new campuses, as well as new procedures to cut down operating costs.

The report will be acted on at the February 10 Co-ordinating Board meeting, together with a request to merge South Texas College of Law at Houston with Texas A & M University.

DIES SECRETARY OF STATE

Gov. Smith's first official appointment was his secretary of state. He selected former Lufkin Sen. Martin Dies, Jr., and Dies was immediately confirmed by the Senate.

Smith described Dies, who did not seek re-election in 1966 after eight years in office, as one of the most popular senators in recent history. His main work has been in the areas of retardation in children and parks development.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Freshman Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood plans to introduce a proposed constitutional amendment to allow the state to give aid to private colleges and universities.

In the proposal, a committee would determine what it costs to educate the average student at state-supported schools. State then would deduct from that the tuition students pay at state institutions—now \$100 per year—and send the rest to the private schools as credit toward the educational costs.

System would be complicated at those private schools which teach religion courses. Some state aid would have to be deducted for that, because of the constitutional provision on separation of church and state.

ETHICS CODE

Rep. Jim Nugent of Kerrville is making another run with a bill he has carried for 10 years. It is designed to improve and strengthen the Code of Ethics for state officials. Every session, Nugent's ethics bill has been passed by the House, but failed in the

Senate. He is optimistic this time, since so many senators—and Lt. Gov. Barnes—are former House members who have voted for the proposal in past sessions.

COURTS SPEAK

A San Antonio Negro got a new trial for robbery because the prosecutor asked a witness if the defendant was a Black Muslim. The Court of Criminal Appeals said a mis-trial should have been granted.

The State Supreme Court of Criminal Appeals said a turned down a suit for damages by a man who claimed he developed cancer from handling radioactive material at the nuclear weapons assembly point at the Medina Base.

The high court threw out the state's appeal from an Amarillo court finding that the guilt of juvenile offenders must be proved beyond a "reasonable doubt" as is the case with adults.

AG OPINIONS

Texas Tech College may create a medical school on the Lubbock campus without passage of implementing legislation, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said in an opinion requested by Gov. Smith.

Martin warned, however, that the legislature, through its control over appropriations of funds, has the power to "accept or reject this method" of creating medical facilities.

In another opinion he also ruled that a school board has the authority to expel a student for violation of a published policy against drug use, after fair hearing. But he said an indictment alone is not grounds for expelling.

REGISTER

Auto registration regulations will be enforced tighter due to computerization, the Highway Commission and Department of Public Safety warns.

Highway Department says that many motorists have cars registered illegally in counties where they do not reside. Others who live in cities show only a post office box number instead of the required residence address.

Computerization also will aid in law enforcement, and reduce the waiting-in-line time to obtain a license. Motorists will get forms to fill out in advance, saving typing time at busy license distributing points.

SDEC EXPANDS ACTIVITIES

The State Democratic Committee, which took in a tidy sum from its inauguration - eve victory dinner, has approved plans to expand the work in three fields and to publish a monthly political magazine.

New committees were authorized on youth activities, woman's organization and communications. Later department will supervise the magazine.

SHORT SNORTS

Rep. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi and Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston will handle the legislative program for the Governor's Committee on Public School Education.

The Texas Farm Bureau unveiled a legislative program which includes opposition to minimum wage and compulsory collective bargaining for farm workers.

A fire insurance rate hearing is scheduled for February 10 by the State Board of Insurance.

December's activity in Texas unemployment - claims increased over the previous

month by 7,684 due mainly to unfavorable weather conditions, says the Texas Employment Commission.

Thirty Texas colleges will share a \$818,531 federal grant for laboratory and special equipment, including closed-circuit TV gear.

The House Water Study Committee headed by Rep. Bill Cleyton of Springlake has recommended that Texans support a \$3.5-billion bond issue to help finance the \$10-billion Texas Water Plan.

The Texas Liquor Control Board announced that 1968 saw an all-time high in the number of juveniles arrested for possessing or buying alcoholic beverages - some 14,186 above the 1967 arrest figures.

Rep. John Hannah of Lufkin plans to introduce a bill to set up presidential primary elections for Texas whereby delegates to national party conventions would be elected and instructed as to which candidate they like.

Rep. Charles Fennell of Holliday has introduced a resolution inviting former President Lyndon Johnson to speak to a joint session of the Legislature and House Speaker Gus Mutscher says the former chief executive is "interested."
