PEANUT MARKETING CARDS READY AT LOCAL ASC OFFICE

The 1966 peanut marketing cards are ready and may be picked up at the ASCS office, according to J. G. Meredith, office manager. Cards will be mailed out upon request. The cards must be returned when marketing is completed.

Meredith also stated that requests for cost-share for peas, vetch, and rye cover crop practices may be filed at the office at any time. The request must be filed before beginning the practice.

The 1966 domestic payments on cotton will be completed shortly. Mere dith said, "We are in the process of completing 1967 allotments and yields, which will be

mailed about October 10. Requests for reconsideration of yields must be filed not later than 15 days from the date of notice. 1966 cotton marketing cards will not be issued. When you gin your cotton, give the ginner the farm serial number from which the cotton was produced."

Meredith also stated that farms with excess peanuts are reminded that the excess must be properly disposed of before harvest to avoid a marketing quota penalty and to be eligible for a within quota card. Individual leters of instruction have been mailed to all producers having excess peanuts.

Fire Prevention Observance Being Urged All Over County

Observance of Nation a l Fire Prevention Week, October 9-15, in Eastland County is being urged by both rural and city fire prevention leaders.

Cisco Fire Chief H. L. Ferguson and Jack Cozart president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, urge citizens of Eastland County to pay special heed to the observance this year by taking steps to prevent costly fires.

County Man In Training Class Of Game Agency

AN EASTLAND COUNTY man is among 20 Texas game warden trainees undergoin g 20 weeks of training at Texas A & M University. He is K. R. Stewart, Route 2, Box 138, Rising Star, Texas. The students game wardens study wildlife management, fish conservation and management, public speaking, first aid and physical education.

Other topics include driverseducation, records and reports, public relations, boat and water safety.

School Director Bob Evins said A & M faculty members and Texas Parks and Wildlife officers teach the course. Evins is conservation supervisor for the Texas Park and Wildlife Department.

Also included in the curriculum is a one-week light duty Civil Defense Resc u e course taught by A&M's Firemen's Training School.

Trainees will be assigned in February ah game wardens throughout the state.

"We urge everyone to develop good fire safety habits which include such things as care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them," the local fire chief said. He added that fires killed about 12,000 people and the cost exceeded \$1.76 billion in the United States last year.

The local Farm Bure au president said the Fall and Winters months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is 3 to 6 times greater than in the average city fire," Mr. Cozart said

greater than in the average city fire," Mr. Cozart said.

Mr. Cozart said that Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The local organization, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen at the annual Firemen's Training School each July in College Station. The state and local Farm Bureau organization also pay \$75 to local fire departments for each call made in rural areas involving fires of Farm Bureau insured property.

In addition to these programs, county Farm Bureau sponsor a graphic 45-minute fire prevention demonstration presented over one hundred times a year before schools, civil clubs and other groups by the TFB Safety Department. More than 10,000 dry chemical fire extinguishers have been sold to Farm Bureau members as a continuing program of rur al fire protection.


