50 Years Ago In The News

January 19, 1919

With the arrest of a physician, an embalmer and an undertaker at Monroe, La., and an undertaker at Waco the mystery surrounding the shipment of the coffin box filled with booze that was picked up in Fort Worth in the early part of December has been cleared away, Federal officials believe.

The coffin of whiskey was routed to Waco by way of Fort Worth. At Fort Worth it was detected and held up. Later it was discovered that an undertaker at Waco was to receive the "corpse" and dispose of the whiskey.

Three negroes, a doctor and two undertakers at Monroe, La., shipped the "corpse". The two undertakers filled the coffin with booze and the negro doctor furnished the death certificate.

It developed in the course of the probe made by the Department of Justice that in November, the "body" of "Victor Hugo," who died of influenza in Monroe, La., had been shipped to Waco and had gotten by without being molested. "Victor Hugo" was nothing more or less than numerous quarts of whiskey.

All parties implicated, both at Monroe and at Waco, are under arrest.

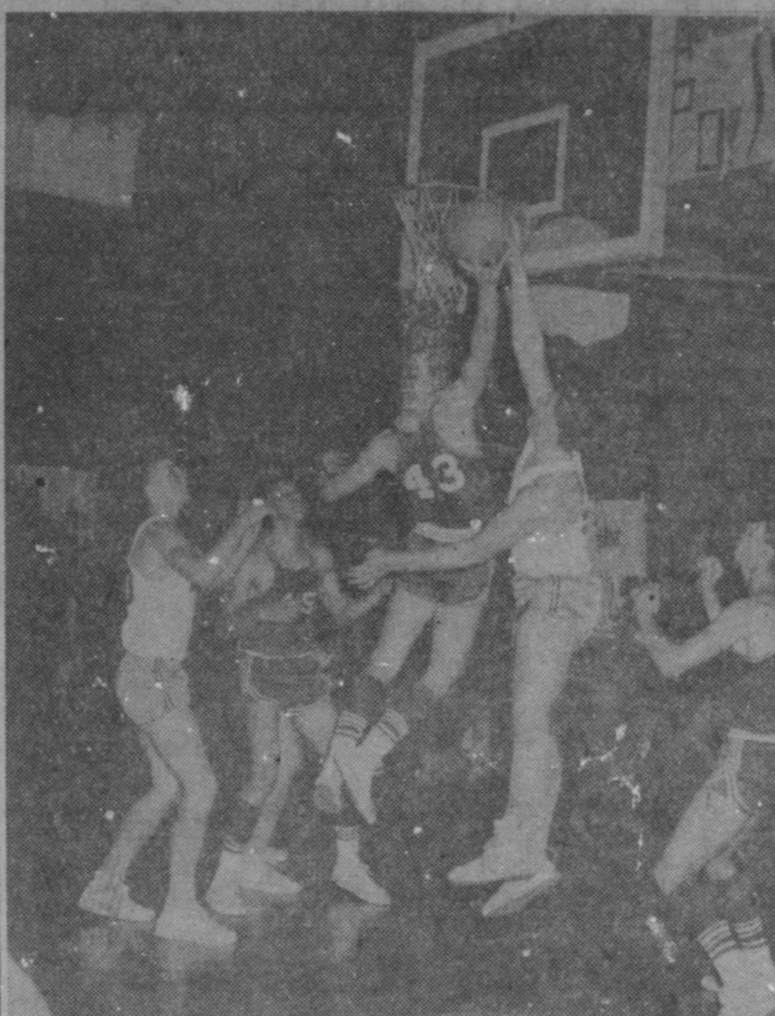
At the El Paso Stock Show last week, Mark Wise was awarded the Showmanship award of the Sheep show.

Fire Department Saves House

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department answered a call last Thursday to the residence of Mrs. Josie Della Rosa just off the Rockwood Highway in the South part of town. Two rooms of the frame home were extensively damaged and the furnishings ruined by the fire and water damage, however the house was saved from being destroyed. Mrs. Della Rosa and several of her grandchildren were at home when the blaze started and summoned the fire department. One truck and seven firemen answered the alarm.

The local fire department has made 18 calls this year, 16 being grass fires. 131 firemen have spent 208 man-hours fighting fires in our community since January 1.

Fire Department Buys New Fire Extinguishers

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department has purchased 35 2 1/2 pound dry chemical fire extinguishers and 25 firemen will be issued one to take in their cars or pickups. These extinguishers are effective on all types of fires—gasoline, grease, wood and electric, and are harmless to those using them.

Ten of these fire extinguishers will be available at cost to associate members of the fire department and will cost the wholesale price of \$7.75. These extinguishers are guaranteed for two years and refills are available if needed. Anyone interested in purchasing one of these should contact W. B. Griffin or any other member of the department.

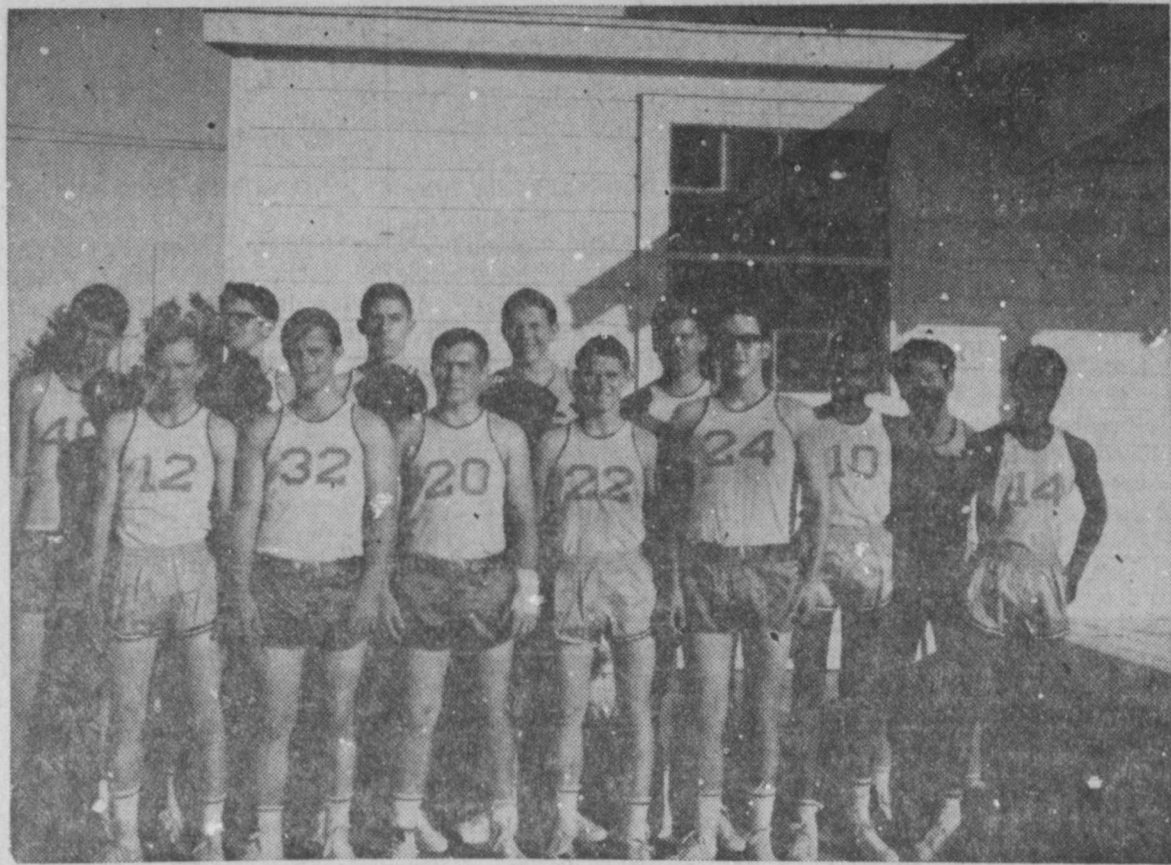

Entrance Fees Are Texas Size Bargains

Austin—The biggest bargain in Texas outdoors is the \$12 annual permit to state parks, according to J. R. Singleton, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wild-life Department.

"With the approach of the outdoor recreation season, Texans will want to take advantage of this 'package deal,'" he said. "For \$12 per year, they can enjoy some of Texas' most beautiful scen-

ery, take advantage of the many free facilities in the park, and have available to them the camping facilities for which there is an extra charge."

Without the annual permit, park visitors must pay \$1 per car per day.

The \$12 permit will admit the purchaser and occupants of his private vehicle to all but three of Texas' 66 state parks.

Thirty of these parks re-quire a \$1 per day entrance fee or the annual permit.

At present, 18 state parks are exempt from fees either because personnel aren't at the site, park facilities are not adequate to warrant the

charge, present visitation rates make it economically infeasible, or operation of the park is on a concession basis.

Duplicate permits for an-nual permit holders may be purchased for \$2.50 each for additional family vehicles.

Entrance fees for Texas' State parks are part of the \$75 million bond program for the acquisition and develop-ment of parks approved by voters in November, 1967. Money from the fees is used to pay off the bonds.

FIRE PREVENTION THEME

The following is one of the Fire-prevention themes writ-ten by Santa Anna High School students.

EDUCATION IN FIRE PREVENTION

Fires annually destroy over one billion dollars worth of property in the United States. Also every year, fire takes the life of approximately 11,000 people. The best way to fight these destructive fires is to prevent them from ever breaking out. And the best way to prevent them from ever breaking out is to edu-cate the public on fire pre-vention.

Fire prevention education is done chiefly during a week in October which the Pres-ident sets aside as Fire Pre-vention Week. During this week, programs stressing the importance of fire prevention, are given by schools, fire de-partments, and other com-munity groups. Fire preven-tion bureaus carry on educa-tional programs through the press, radio, television, and schools. In schools, children are taught fire safety prac-tices, and what to do in case of fire. National organiza-tions such as the National Fire Protection Association and the The Forest Service of the Department of Agricul-ture, also aid in teaching fire safety.

Santa Anna News

Austin, Texas—Texas legislators now are busy with committee hearings on dozens of bills the 181 members would like to turn into laws.

Even though Gov. Preston Smith may not have his budget and tax message ready this week there is plenty of business before the legislative committees to keep them occupied.

Perhaps the most talked-about legislation is that dealing with the public school reorganization plan recommended by Gov. John Connally's Committee on Public School Education.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes joined

Gov. Smith in doubting that the forced consolidation of school districts would pass. And mail the legislators are getting from parents and administrators in the smaller districts leads others to agree that the proposal will have to be modified.

Smith is urging reform of the basis on which state aid is given to local school districts.

PSE Committee's study revealed that a great many school districts are getting beananzas from the state by failing to properly tax their own property. It seems that the less they collect locally, the more they get from the state.

Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr., of Paris and Rep. George Hinson of Mineola have signatures of more than half of the

members of each house on the Texas State Teachers Association pay raise bill for school teachers. This package of changes will cost the state's taxpayers some \$206 million a year, plus \$20 million increased state funds for school operation, maintenance and transportation.

Smith said that he will recommend new taxes to finance projects he will recommend in his spending program. But he is not yet ready to say what sort of tax he will suggest.

WETS ACT FAST

Liquor by the drink legislation received instant action in the Senate.

Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso introduced a proposed constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to legalize mixed drink sales on local option basis, then minutes later, his own senate constitutional amendments committee set it for hearing Wednesday, Feb. 12.

A similar amendment was introduced in the House at the same time by Rep. Cletus Davis of Houston.

Both Lt. Gov. Barnes and Governor Smith gave the amendment a cautious approving nudge.

Barnes said he viewed prospects for approval of liquor by the drink as improving and added he feels "people ought to have an opportunity to decide the issue" by popular vote.

Smith made an almost identical observation and noted the proposal advanced by Christie and Davis gives voters "several checks" thru local option elections.

Constitutional amendments must receive a two-thirds vote of both houses of the Legislature before they can be submitted for approval or rejection of a majority of qualified voters.

The Christie-Davis proposition would delete the old constitutional ban on "open saloons." It would empower the Legislature to "regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a state monopoly on sale of distilled liquors."

A separate bill spelling out the recommended regulations to take effect on passage of the constitutional amendment will be introduced later. If the amendment fails to get two-thirds support, the sponsors will try to pass the bill anyway and risk a law suit challenging constitutionality.

Barnes predicted some of the senators who oppose liquor by the drink will go along with submitting the issue to a vote. One of these, Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, is a co-author of the proposed amendment.

TEXAS AND JUSTICE

Gov. Smith has announced the beginning of detailed studies by the Criminal Justice Council to develop a State plan for improving all segments of law enforcement and the criminal justice system. Such a plan must be submitted to the U. S. Justice Department by June 1 for Texas to take part in the \$1.3 million Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

Smith also announced several appointments to the Criminal Justice Council. He named Hugh W. McLeland, Austin management consultant, as program director for research and development. C. G. Conner, inspector of the Inspection and Planning Division of the Department of Public Safety, was named as program director for Law Enforcement and Crime Prevention. William H. Gaston, of the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville, was selected to serve as program director of post sentence processes.

BILLS AND MORE BILLS

Chief clerk of the House and the secretary of the Senate both were deluged with more bills, many of them of statewide import.

Rep. Temple Dickson of Sweetwater wants to prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion or national origin by barber or beauty shops.

Sen. Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi and Rep. James Nowlin of San Antonio dropped in separate bills lowering the voting age to 19, and Rep. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi, Sen. Joe Bernal of San Antonio and Rep. Joe Allen of Baytown want to drop the age to 18.

A state board to regulate private trade schools was introduced by Rep. John Wright of Grand Prairie.

Fourteen senators are co-sponsoring a minimum wage bill sponsored by Bernal, but 16 are needed to pass the law and 21 to bring the bill up for a vote.

Measures toughening the danger drugs laws were filed by Rep. Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge and Sen. Charles Herring of Austin.

Judges would not be able to grant probation to persons convicted of driving in-

toxicated, under a bill by Rep. Glenn Kothmann of San Antonio. Those convicted would have to go to jail for at least three days.

Freshman Rep. John R. Bigam wants to add investment income of insurance companies to the factors considered when the state Board of Insurance sets auto-insurance premium rates.

Rep. Ace Pickens of Odessa will try once again to create Permian State College in the Midland - Odessa area. He introduced two bills—one putting it in Odessa and the other "in the Odessa-Midland area."

Oral confessions would be allowed in court under another Christie bill.

COURTS SPEAK

The Texas Supreme Court said the Legislature can provide different amusement tax rates for different types of entertainment.

The high courts will hear arguments March 5 between two banks over control of the \$300 million Sarita Kenedy East estate in South Texas pending outcome of will contest.

Harrison County Commissioners Court must canvas result of a justice of peace election even though it had ordered the office abolished, Supreme Court found. J. P. was not ordered reinstated. He will have to go to district court for remedy.

Austin federal district judge once more has held a law student previously granted deferment for an academic year cannot be drafted until the year ends.

APPOINTMENTS

Gov. Smith named Alton D. Ice to succeed Wayne Gibbons as his assistant representing the state in Washington.

Smith appointed Murray L. McWhorter of Austin to the Veterans Land Board.

Lt. Gov. Barnes named Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Sen. Don Kennard of Ft. Worth to the Multi-State Tax Compact Advisory Committee.

FEDERAL RESEARCHERS IN TEXAS-OWNED GULF WATERS

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler telegraphed Secretary of Interior Walter J. Hickel, declaring that oil, gas, other minerals and sunken vessels which belong to the school children of Texas might be jeopardized if a federal coastal survey being conducted is made public. He asked Hickel to work with the state on the lands which are part of the Permanent School Fund and

Sadler's to administer "UNEQUALED PROSPERITY" Dr. Francis B. May of the University of Texas at Austin Bureau of Business Research reports last year was one of "unequaled prosperity in Texas and in the nation." In every quarter of 1968, the index of business activity was above the corresponding figure for the year before. And each quarter pushed the index higher than the preceding quarter. In all but two of Texas' 20 largest cities, business activity showed an increase. Austin led with a 34 per cent increase. Beaumont had the lowest increase—two percent. Houston was up 13 per cent, San Antonio and Dallas gained 1 per cent each and Fort Worth rose 16 per cent. As a whole, business activity for the state was 219.7 per cent of its 1957-59 base level.

FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES Southwest Region Office of Planned Parenthood has now printed its first directory for migrant workers. It includes information on over 700 counties in 34 states.

Directory contains names and addresses of agencies where migrant families may obtain family planning services. It also contains information about schedules, birth control methods offered and fees.

SHORT SNORTS

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin indicated that the state of Texas probably will accept a \$4.5 million settlement of its federal anti-trust suit against five major drug companies charged with overpricing tetracycline.

Jack Ross of Edinburg was elected chairman of the State Board of Pardons and Parole for a two-year term.

First of 1.5 million new 1969 highway maps are being distributed by the Texas Highway Department.

Tyler Junior College will retain 11 trustees under a bill passed by the Senate.

Bill to establish a state regulatory commission over Texas public utility rates and practices has been introduced by Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin.

Senate passed a bill to raise the maximum rate on state and local bonds from five to six and a half per cent.

Second bill passed by both houses this session will increase benefits for retired state employees.

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THE FAMILY LAWYER

Mishaps at the Movies
During the intermission at a movie, a man stepped over to an ash tray to snuff out a cigarette. But as sparks touched the tray, an inflammable liquid — placed there by an anonymous prankster — flared up and scorched the man's hand.

Was the theater management legally liable for his injury? No, ruled a court. For a theater does not guarantee protection against every possible hazard. The judge said the management could not fairly be expected to guard against an invisible, unforeseeable danger like this one.

Nevertheless, simply by selling you a ticket, the management does take on a substantial degree of responsibility for your well-being. For instance, it must maintain the premises so as to keep the likelihood of an accident at a reasonable mini-

mum.
"Thus, when a seat caved in under a woman customer, the management was held liable—even though she happened to be on the heavy side. The court said seats ought to be sturdy enough to allow for the fact that patrons come in assorted sizes.

Furthermore, theater employees have an affirmative duty to keep order.

In another case, when an usher suddenly released the rope holding back a surging crowd, a woman was knocked down in the rush. A court held the theater liable because, with clear signs that the crowd was unruly, the usher should have done more than just "turn 'em loose."

On the other hand, you yourself, by choosing to attend a movie in the first place, assume certain risks natural to the environment. For example:

A woman who stumbled over someone's foot, protruding into the aisle, demanded damages on the ground that the theater was too dark for her to see where she was going.

But the court denied her

claim, on evidence that it had been no darker than it usually is at the movies. If the woman wanted to avoid the danger of darkness, said the court, she should have waited for an usher to light her way to a seat.

Customer Decides On Eggs By Type Of Carton

An egg carton's artistry can influence the customer's decision of whether or not to buy the eggs.

Colors, pictures of hens and farm yards and psychedelic designs appear on today's egg cartons. What type do homemakers prefer?

Dr. David Mellor, Extension poultry marketing specialist, Dr. Fred Gardner and Lionel Lane, of the poultry science department, conducted surveys to find the likes and dislikes of consumers toward egg packaging.

They found that 43 percent of those questioned preferred a plastic foam type carton. Other choices included the standard molded pulp, paperboard cartons, a new see through carton and a sleeve type carton. Homemakers chose the foam carton because it was new, different, eye appealing, strong, easy to open, easy to remove eggs from and for overall cleanliness and freshness.

A majority of the consumers said they opened their egg cartons in the store before buying to check the number, soundness of shell and uniformity of eggs.

Consumers also were asked their preference on carton decorations. The winning carton showed a kitchen scene of eggs in a basket and copper tea kettle on a table. A colorful modern new design followed closely.

Many consumers indicated carton decorations did not make any difference and therefore they chose a plain carton with the mod design egg on it. Cartons with hens in cages or pictures of eggs ready to be served were not among the preferred cartons.

Group Formed To Represent Landowners

A statewide committee to represent rural landowners and others who enjoy living in the country was announced in Austin Wednesday. The group, known as "The Little Red School House Committee" is composed of a cross-section of farmers, ranchers, and rural landowners from throughout the state and will be in force during the expected struggle over school district consolidation in the current session of the Texas Legislature. Charles Schreiner III, a prominent rancher from Mountain Home, is the chairman of the committee.

"We believe the forced consolidation of small school districts, as proposed in the report of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will go a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner declared in a news conference recently. Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recommends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353.

"This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since most rural schools are the primary symbols of community identification," Schreiner said.

"The Little Red School House" committee has been formed to awaken rural landowners and residents of small communities to the unseen dangers of forced consolidation and to acquaint legislators in Austin with the feelings of the rural people of Texas.
