The Santa Anna High School Girls basketball team will meet the Bangs girls in a play-off for the District 9-A crown on Thursday night of next week. Both girls teams are tied with a 7-1 record in conference play. The game

will be played at the Brownwood High School Gymnasium. In the District games, Bangs defeated the local girls in the first game, then Santa Anna won over the Bangs girls on the home court later in the season. The play-off game will decide who will meet the 10-A Champs, Dublin, in the District tilt.

In the final scheduled game of the season last Friday night, the Santa Anna girls gave the Early team a sounding defeat by a 75-20 score. Vicki Jo Neff was high point player with 34 points, Sue Kingsbery scored 25.

## Local School To Show Increase In Enrollment

The Santa Anna School will show an increase in enrollment next year according to the 1969 Scholastic Census recently completed. The new list includes 361 students for the coming year, an increase of 25 over the 1968 figures of 336. The increase in number of students is shown all through the grades and there will be larger first grade class this fall than during the present term.

All schools in the county are showing a gain in enrollment except Novice, which will be decreased by only a few students.

## Jack Wristen Dies Of Gunshot Wound

Justice of the Peace Walter Holt of Coleman ruled accidental the death of Daniel F. (Jack) Wristen who died last Thursday night of a bullet wound in the head. The accident occurred about 11:30 p. m. at the Wristen home in the Liberty Community, and according to Mr. Holt, the victim had been apparently working on the gun at the time of the incident. The gun fired when the butt of the gun hit the floor.

Born October 29, 1925, in Santa Anna, he was an oil field worker, a veteran of World War II and a Baptist. Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. Dan F. Wristen of Santa Anna; one son, Tommy Joe; four daughters, Dixie Lee, Theresa Ann, Teddy Gayle, Jackie Sue all of the home; three sisters, Mrs. Clea Nicholson of Corpus Christi, Mrs. James Hipp of Odessa, and Mrs. Doyle Lee of Tatum, N. M., three brothers, Max of Abilene, Clyde of Chicago, Ill, and Wayne of Santa Anna.

Funeral services were held in Coleman Saturday with burial in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

The suspect who is from Brownwood, is out on bond and will be bound over to the grand jury.

## Two Automobile Accidents Are Investigated

Two automobile accidents were investigated during the weekend by Sheriff's Deputy Rongoe Horton and Highway Patrolman Dan McGee. In the first accident Saturday night, S. M. Fellers of Trickham had a one-car crash on the Trickham Farm Road about four miles South of town. The accident occurred when he failed to make a curve in the road and the car went out of control.

About 5:00 a.m. Sunday morning, the 1967 Ford Mustang driven by Ted Ford was completely demolished in a multiple turn-over on the Rockwood Highway about 12 miles south of Santa Anna. Young Ford went to sleep at the wheel and the car went out of control, turning over about five times. He was not injured in the accident.

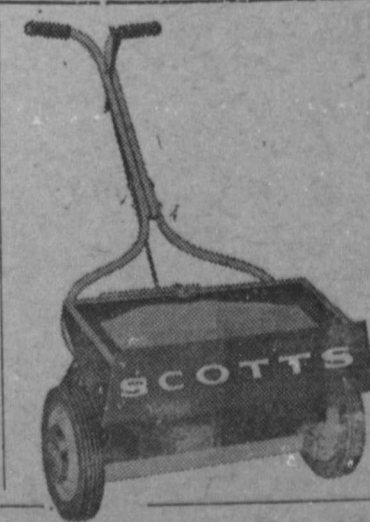
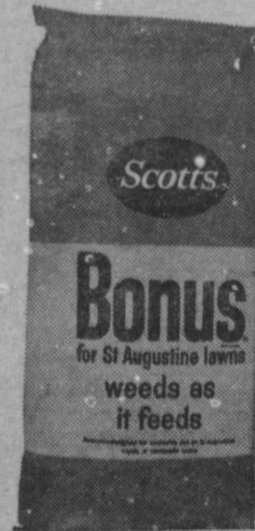

## Santa Anna News

# 38 Years Ago In The News

from the Feb. 27, 1931 News  
**EARLY DAYS NEAR SANTA ANNA**  
 by Mrs. Henry Campbell  
 On October 12, 1879, my father, Thomas E. Kirkpatrick, accompanied by his wife and three brothers namely George, Andrew and Robert, arrived at Santa Anna, after having been on the road four weeks coming here from Ennis in Ellis County. They brought with them a herd of cattle and had to let them

graze along the way. They traveled in a covered wagon, except those who drove the cattle. My father was the only one of the brothers who was married, but in the autumn, Uncle Robert returned to Ellis County and married Miss Mary Lightsey, who he brought back with him in a covered wagon.

When we first came, we camped near the Bob Campbell place for four weeks, then we moved to what is known as the Live Oak neighborhood, south of Santa Anna. The Rendlemans were living in that neighborhood at that time. Also Judge J. O. Woodward, and his father and brother with their families. Judge

White's father and mother lived there too. Judge Woodward lived in a picket house having one large room and a shed room. His house was near where Mrs. Caton's farm house now stands. (Ed. note, the location is near the Emzy Brown home.)

When Christmas arrived Judge Woodward and his wife invited the neighbors to eat Christmas dinner with them. Mrs. Woodward is a fine cook and she surely did her best at that time, for the table was heavily loaded with good things to eat. The house in which Judge Woodward's father lived was a long house, 60 feet long. There were three 18 foot long rooms with a stack chimney and there was a shed room along the north side of it. The lumber in this house was hauled from Fort Worth on Wagons. After the Woodwards moved away, my father bought the place and we lived there many years.

The first house we lived in in the Live Oak community, was a one room house built of rock and had a dirt floor, after this the put up logs beside it and stretched a tent over the top that was our dining room and kitchen.

The first summer we were here Judge Woodward taught school in a little log school house near where Mrs. Ferguson's home is now.

At this time there were no fenced pastures, range was free, and herds of cattle covered the prairies. Sometimes the cowboys would be gone from home for weeks at a time rounding up the cattle. Sometimes the cattle would stray off fifty miles away. There were not as many trees here then as now and in the spring the prairies were covered with wild flowers. Later when Mr. Mahoney had his

large pasture fenced the wire cutters cut the fence down, cutting the wire in short pieces. Mahoney afterward had it repaired and hired men to ride all around the fence which was a distance of 28 miles to see if it was in good condition. I remember Mr. J. D. Simpson had that job awhile.

In 1879 Mr. Lewis Taylor kept a few groceries to sell. He kept them in his dwelling which was east of the road that comes through the gap of the mountain. Frank and Lewis Brooke's father, kept the post office in his home. He later built a new house and kept a hotel. Soon after this the Wofford Bros. put in a dry goods store west of the road and Dr. Mathews had a drug store beside it.

In February 1886 the first railroad came to Santa Anna. After that the town was moved to its present site. The old Brooke's house was moved to some where near the place the Corner Drug now stands and Mr. George Harrison used it for a hotel.

The first school house in Santa Anna was a small one, a few years later they built a larger one where the grammar school building now stands. It was used for all purposes. The church services were held in it. We had a union Sunday School and enjoyed it very much. The Methodists were the first denomination to build a church, and they were kind enough to let the ministers of other denominations use it in their services part of the time. The Baptists were the next to build a church then the Christians and Presbyterians.

There have been two flour mills in Santa Anna. The first burned down and the second was moved to Brownwood.

Santa Anna has gradually grown until today we have a nice town.

## Medicare Patients Reminded Hospital Deductible Now \$44

Increased hospital costs of over 13 per cent have resulted in a 10 per cent increase in Medicare costs to elderly patients, beginning 1-1-69. This comes as a reminder from R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office.

Tuley said, "The average Medicare inpatient hospital daily costs rose, nationally, from about \$38 in 1966 to about \$43 in 1967 and continued upward in 1968. Keeping pace with these rising costs required that the deductible be increased from \$40 to \$44 in each benefit period.

"The patient's share of the cost from the 61st to the 90th day rises from \$10 to \$11. If he has to draw on his "lifetime reserve" from the 91st day to the 150th day in one benefit period, his share during that time has gone up from \$20 to \$22. Insured care in a skilled nursing home now costs the patient \$5.50 per day after the first 20 days instead of \$5."

These increases became effective Jan. 1, Tuley emphasized. A person who entered a hospital or skilled nursing home before January 1, pays the old rate throughout his stay even if it extends into 1969.

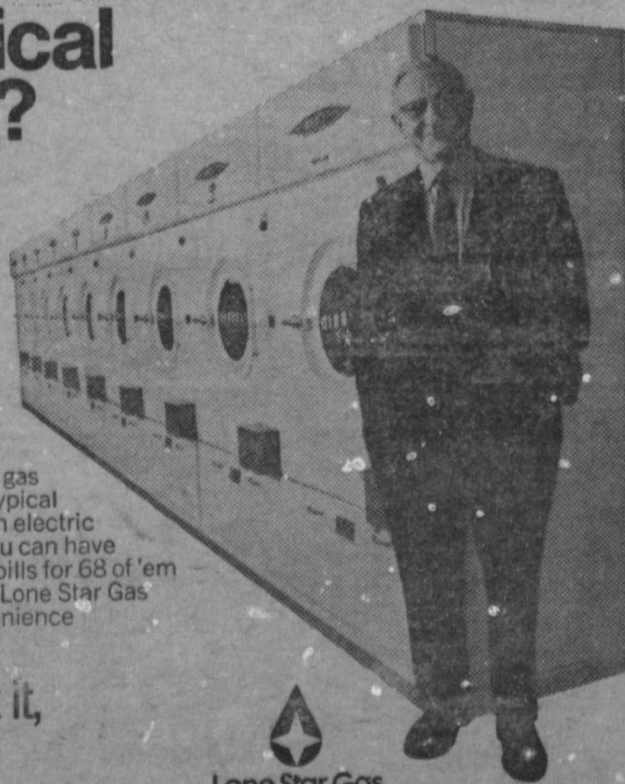
