## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REPORT

MR. CITIZEN: Has it ever occurred to you that your Chamber of Commerce is a very important organization in your town and community? Do you know of the many things that they have done and what they plan to do in the future? Let's take a look at some of their activities over the last decade. You will find they have worked closely with the City Commission and other community organizations for the progress of our community.

\* The Chamber of Commerce has made it possible for the Chamber manager to work with the City full time.

\* They have worked with the town of Rockwood, assisting them in getting their present water system.

\* Assisted the Santa Anna Schools in getting the buildings from Camp Bowie that are now used for the School Gymnasium and Agriculture Building. They also helped secure sixteen buildings which were converted into dwellings, one of which is now the City Library

\* Worked with the City Commission with the paving of the streets in Santa Anna.

\* Helped get the water line to Santa Anna from Lake Brownwood.

\* Responsible for getting the Santa Anna Hospital re-opened, and assisted in getting doctors to staff the Hospital.

\* Worked with the hospital authorities in getting a nursing home in our community.

\* With the help of the City Commission, the Chamber of Commerce worked to get the Ranger Park deeded to the City.

\* Helped organize the Santa Anna Livestock Association that produces the annual youth livestock show.

\* Sponsors Christmas programs and parades, worked with the decorations and other activities that take place during the holiday season.

\* Worked several years getting a Telephone Cooperative established in Santa Anna.

The Chamber of Commerce is presently working for the improvement of our schools. Although not in complete agreement with the Governor's Committee on Public Education, they are supporting some of the proposals. They are keeping the Legislators informed of the opinions of the local people.

The Chamber of Commerce has information about our community available when requests are made. New industries for the community are being sought by the Chamber of Commerce.
