ACCENT ON HEALTH

An annual inspection is routinely required for all motor vehicles in Texas, but the human body doesn't get the same consideration.

Also, new diagnostic aids and medicines are now available which the doctor may want to prescribe.

Perhaps you had an illness and overcame it. It is possible the condition could recur

One big advantage of a complete physical examination at regular intervals is the knowledge that you are in fit physical shape. If you have an illness, it is consoling to know that everything possible is being done to keep it under control.

There is no set schedule of how often you should have a check - up, but it should be regular. Let your doctor set the schedule for you. At the end of the examination he can suggest the time for the next check - up.


