Mr. and Mrs. Valentine and children, Jona and Leslie are moving to Tahoka where he has purchased the Lynn Co. News. The family plans to move to Tahoka this weekend. They have lived here the past two years while he published the NEWS.

Barbara Kingsbery will continue as Editor of the NEWS and to return to the staff will be Grady Sten, printer, and Mrs. Billie Gregg, advertising manager. The paper will continue in operation as in the past, with job printing and office supplies also available.

A native of Bowie, Mr. Hays attended Texas A&M after graduation from high school. He was with student publications at Texas University before coming to Bangs as a partner of the late Mr. Forrest Kyle. Mr. Hays became sole owner of the Brown Co. Gazette two years ago.

The new owner stated that he is looking forward to working in Santa Anna and making friends with the people here. He plans to be here this week getting acquainted with residents of our community.

Swimming Class To Start Monday

Santa Anna children will begin the summer swimming classes next Monday, June 30. The Summer Recreation Association is sponsoring the program for local children with Mrs. Bruce Cammack as chairman.

Mrs. Delma Blair will be driver of the bus that will take the children to the Coleman Pool each week day for the three week session. Both boys and girls will be included in the group at a cost of 15c a day each. Children who have completed the first grade and who have not finished the eighth grade are eligible to attend.

Five Coleman athletic coaches will be instructors for the classes which will be from 11:00 to 12:00 each morning. The bus will leave Santa Anna High School at 10:30 each morning for the trip to Coleman.

Mrs. Glen Scarborough is in charge of getting chaperones for the daily trip and mothers available to go one or more days are asked to contact Mrs. Scarborough.

Although the Summer Recreation Association sponsors the swimming program each year and makes arrangements for the classes, much of the financial assistance comes from the Precinct 2 Community Chest fund. The cost of the transportation and instruction is paid by the fund, with the 15c charge paying for the use of the pool.

All community children are invited to take part in the swimming lessons beginning next Monday morning.

The Texas Highway Department is proceeding with plans for the reconstruction and widening of US 84, etc. from Coleman, Southeast to US 67 in Santa Anna along its existing location. It includes minor relocation for new overpass structure to replace present AT & SF Rwy Underpass for railroad grade separation. Additional right-of-way is being secured throughout the 7.2 miles limit of the project (the added strip being mainly on the west side of present roadway and a new strip for overpass and approaches). Plans provide for rebuilding of the highway to modern design requirements for two paved lanes 13 feet wide with 9 feet paved shoulders alongside. Work is to be scheduled such that a portion of present or new pavement or paved detours will be provided for use of traffic throughout the duration of construction.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Coleman, Texas.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displaces and the relocation assistance office as well as information about the tentative schedules for the acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before Friday, June 27, 1969.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.
