### Larry Purdom Joins Air Force

Larry D. Purdom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther D. Purdom of Carbon, Texas, en-listed in the U.S. Air Force on Wednesday September 14. T-St. Robert Sanders, local Air Force recruiter in Abilene, stated that Larry will have six weeks basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, and then enter the mechanical area for technical training.

Sgt. Sanders also stated that enlistment slots in the Air Force are hard to get at this time due to a waiting list and that young men nearing draft age and interesting in going into the Air Force should contact him several weeks ahead of the time they expect to receive a draft notice.

Young men who do get their draft notice and are not on the waiting list usually find that their opportunity to enlist in the Air Force is gone. Young men who contact Sgt. Sanders today can expect to wait up to 90 days for an elistment date.

Sgt. Sanders also emphasized that being placed on the waiting list does not obligate the young man to actually enlist when his name comes up.



## County's Peanut Crop Looks Like A Winner

Virtually all of the irrigation pumps in Eastland County are shut down as peanut farmers watch maturing crops, and hope for that "bumper crop" that the vines now indicate.

Generally the "above ground" crop has never been heavier, in both irrigated and dry-land fields, an inspection of farms indicated this week.

There's surely going to be an abundance of hay, and if maturing nuts come along as well, 'there's going to be a lot of peanuts made in Eastland County this year."

The informal tour included the Flatwoods, Kokomo and north Gorman area, Monday afternoon by new County Agent Dee Gordon and ASC Gilbert Meredits.

The Jeff Harbin dry-land crop near Flatwoods looked especially good, as did those of Wayne Eaves, Guy Lyerla and J. R. Morrow.

At Kokomo, the 39 - acre
tract of Ted and Gene Syn-

der, looked very good, and should be a Heavy producer by mid-October. It's the first year of irrigation for the Snyder brothers.

Norman Park, who lives about four miles northeast of Gorman on FM 571, has high hopes ("Maybe 100 bushels an acre") for a 60-acre patch at his home place, and he is jointly interested in a 20-acre and 93-acre spread nearby, all under irrigation.

He made 76 bushels last year, his first to irrigate, and watered over twice this year, putting down from two and a half to three inches each time. The good rains have been very beneficial. He finished planting June 4.

Stacked in the field were the early crop of Claud Fuller near Gorman, who planted in April and came out with about 80 bushels per acre.

D. B. Warren's 150- acre tract, near Gorman looked real good from the road. Mr. Warren was president of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association recently.

The county yield average last year was 757 pounds, which was a record production, and guesses are that 1,000 or better pounds might be reached this year.

At this time, it appears that the nuts under the vines "have quite a ways to go", and there's some blight being seen through the area visited, but all in all, the prospects are bright for a good yield this year.
