

Many of us think of gamblers and racketeers in the Hollywood fashion of gruff but warmhearted bumblers who wear loud ties and possess funny nicknames, but you may dismiss that idea right now.

And we could go on and on with shocking acts of brutality that is common among the hoodlum crowd in the bigger cities.

Fortunately, organized crime is receiving more and more exposure. This is good, for it helps to dispel some of the myth that has grown up about mob life in the past. But we still have a long way to go.

Although federal, state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the nation are engaged in a constant struggle against the underworld, little headway will be made without the full cooperation of an alert and dedicated people, and that people will never be dedicated as long as they think of organized crime as a "harmless, streetcorner bookmaker" and the 25-cent numbers bet.

Only when we view organized crime in its proper perspective will the campaign against it proceed, with everyone united in a determination to clean up this evil as rapidly and effective as possible.




