NEWS LETTER

was defeated in three votes, and there is little chance of its passing at this session. We all we could get to get the bill passed, but we submissionists have not been able to get a single vote, so far as I can ascertain. I had Mitchell, Ward and by counties exempt operation of the Hidermal Inspection law, at request of citizens from counties, and the bill will be passed as soon as the Governor signs it, as it passed with emergency clause. I visited the San Jacinto field on the 6th. The condition of this sacred and historic spot is a reproach to the patriotism of Texas. If the children of Texas, after having lived so much drilling and instruction from their teachers concerning the great battle fought here, and its influence on the history of Texas and the United States, should see it in its present plight, they would consider all this teaching the most insincere. The land has been purchased but has not been fenced and the cattle lie on the graves of the brave patriots who are there buried and desecrate the same. In our mad commercialism we have lost all patriotism, sympathy and love for our living dead.

When commercialism shall have quenched the fires of patriotism, then will our republic have neared its final doom. The fee bill brought a great hoard of sheriffs here to fight the bill, but I believe it will pass in spite of them. This bill is in the interest of the people and should become a law. It does not interfere with any officer's term and the next session comes the amount to be received under the same is not satisfactory, the present officers can retire to private business and there will be no dearth of competent candidates for every office this bill covers.

The committee on Revenue and Taxation refused to report a bill to prevent double taxation. I am going to bring before it a minority report. We discussed and recorded. The bank deposit a great many banks oppose the bill, but a bill will become a hard and relentless fight is being made.

BACK FROM ARIZONA

T. J. Davis of Loraine Tells of His Trip.

EDITOR RECORD:—

Well, we have had a trip, and as many want to know what we saw, we will give it to you for print. In company with Mr. M. Zellner, of Abilene we started on Jan. 19th westward to south-east Arizona to the town of Wilcox, Cochise county. As our trip from here to Pecos was in the night we shall only take note of our observations from this place westward. The Pecos country did not impress us very favorably. We are aware of the fact that one riding on the train can not give a correct opinion. The country is as level as a floor, with a scant growth of grass and some kind of salt or alkali brush. The Pecos river is rather an insignificant stream. There is no growth or depression to indicate the near by presence of a stream. You just simply ride across a little slough in a flat. The country for miles shows an extended plain of alkali soil. From this place to the Rio Grande valley we saw but little of real interest. Some places indicated good soil and fairly good grass. At Sierra Blanca we reached the highest altitude of our trip. From there on we began to descend until we reached the Rio Grande valley. This river is a disappointment to the tourist. It's name carries with it the idea of highness, when in reality its bigness consists only in its great length. In the valley we saw much land susceptible of irrigation and would be in cultivation were it not for the scarcity of water. We must confess that we were somewhat disappointed in this place, as crops and trees did not come up to the expectation, which may be charged up to insufficient moisture, even the parks did not show up as well as one would expect. El Paso is a hustling city, and a stranger is put to wondering where such a place gets sustenance. We spent a short while in the land of another nation. Here we saw Mexico for the first time. The Mexican life was nothing new, so we wended our way back to the land of the stars and stripes. Our trip through New Mexico, after getting out from the hills on the river, was principally through valleys, more properly extended table lands. Distance here is very deceiving, mountains seemingly near by are many miles away. On soils in most places a good coat of grass exists. Deming presents the appearance of being a good town and should the farming interests develop, it will be a hustler. Far as we could see there was but little done in an agricultural way. We saw a few home-steaders' huts, but out side of the huts there was no sign of life. The water at this point is said to be good and abundant, but rather deep for a profitable irrigation project. Beyond Deming and the Arizona lines we ran through quite an extended alkali lake. The alkali lakes in the west are barren of vegetation and the soil looks white as if covered with salt, when it rains the water stands in the lakes until it evaporates. We crossed the line of Arizona, at Stein's pass and began to descend into the valley of Sulphur Springs. The trend of this valley is north-east and south-west, reaching over hundred miles in length and from ten to thirty miles wide. Stock raising and mining have

been the industries of the past. The man with the hoe is appearing on the scene. Enough in a small way has been done to demonstrate the possibilities of so great a country. They have an elevation of over four thousand feet, with a rain fall of sixteen inches, falling principally in the summer months. Most of the soil is good, and some of it extra good. They have an underflow of water that is good and sweet, in some places very shallow and abundant. In other places the soil is good but no water has been found. In the shallow belt an irrigation project seems feasible and profitable. The water is raised by centrifugal pumps. One pumping plant we visited is said to cover nine acres one inch deep in water in twelve hours. A great deal of the land needs no grading, it being perfectly level to the natural eye. We saw water carried around in a circle to the place of beginning. There is a good growth of mesquite on some of the lands. These mesquite lands are the most level and are hard to clear up, but the wood will amply pay for clearing. In the way of farming only small plots of ground have been farmed giving results that are encouraging. We saw some sub-irrigated land that is equal to the valley of the Nile. This particular place is in a draw that makes out from the foot of the Graham mountains. Fort Grant is situated at the foot of the mountains and the government still holds in reserve part of this rich land. We saw farming done here in a crude way that gave astonishing results, corn making fifty bushels per acre without any plowing and other crops in proportion. The water gathers from the watershed and flows over it similar to the Nile. In many places in this draw the water is very shallow.

Fort Grant is twenty six miles from Wilcox, the nearest point to the railroad. The mountain at this Fort rears its head skyward fourteen thousand feet.

At Wilcox they have shallow water ranging from twelve to fifteen feet deep, ranging a little deeper as you go back from the center of the valley. Right around the town of Wilcox there is a hard pan eight to twelve inches below the surface that is very hard. It is two to three inches thick and when broken up trees do exceedingly well, after the first years irrigation. They have fine shade trees, cottonwood and willows that are growing without irrigation. We saw small orchards and patches of alfalfa that seemed to be a success. They think they have a good thing in the apple, pear and grape as these are sure croppers, and quality very fine. The smaller fruits come in for their share, also potatoes, cabbage, onions and etc.

As to the climate everybody is loud in its praise. The nights are cool, frosty in winter time. The climate is free from great extremes. This is government land and is open for settlement. The soils of the homestead claims and desert claims are the same. The requirements are different. What do we think of the country? We think there is a great future for it. There is only one thing to cause its downfall and that is the diminishing of the water supply, this may not be possible. There will be many failures and disappointments many do not count the cost. The country will develop and pay. It will

cost one hundred dollars per acre to develop it and yet it will pay. Some of the bad things they have rattlesnakes, rats, rabbits and sometimes drouths and earthquakes. We have tried to give a report without coloring.

In this particular county was old Geronimo's stampingground. We talked to men who said they had camped with the chief and also whistled bullets at his highness. We visited the place where "Billy the Kid" killed his first man. As we are not upon desperado history we will not proceed further to detail.

AN EARLY MORNING FIRE

Tuesday morning about three o'clock fire was discovered in the meat market of Ellis & Broadus. At the time the alarm was given however, the part of the building occupied by the tailor shop of Mr. Cheek was also burning fiercely, but owing to the greater headway of the fire in the market, the general supposition is the fire had its origin there. The fire bell was rung very little, and very few people were waked by the alarm. By the time the hose had reached the scene and the water turned on from two nozzles, all of the one-story building between Gilbert & Singleton's market and the alley east was burning, but in thirty minutes the fire was practically extinguished.

The sections occupied by the market and Cheek's tailor shop were burned entirely out, being separated only by a thin board partition. Between these and Burk's Temple of Economy there is a brick fire wall, which confined the encroachment of the fire to the roof and front.

The other two sections of the building occupied by Burk and the Western Telephone Company with their contents, were damaged interiorly more by smoke and water than by fire.

But for the effective work of the boys who turned out the entire block would have been consumed. The flames were licking the Gilbert building and the stairway to the rooming house about it, so hot and filled with smoke, that some of the occupants were compelled to escape by way of the windows and awning.

The building belonged to C. W. Simpson and was valued at about \$2,500 with an aggregate insurance of \$1800.

The firm of Ellis & Broadus in fixtures and stock lost about \$1000, for half of which amount they carried insurance.

M. F. Cheek, tailor, lost something like \$200 stock, with no insurance.

F. A. Burk, lost half of his

\$200 stock with no insurance.

The Western Telephone Company's loss has not been estimated at this time, nor do we yet know whether insurance was carried or not.

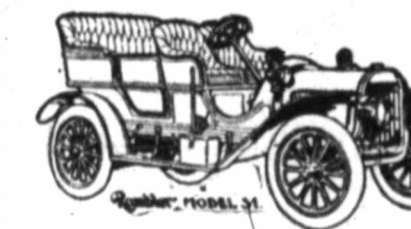

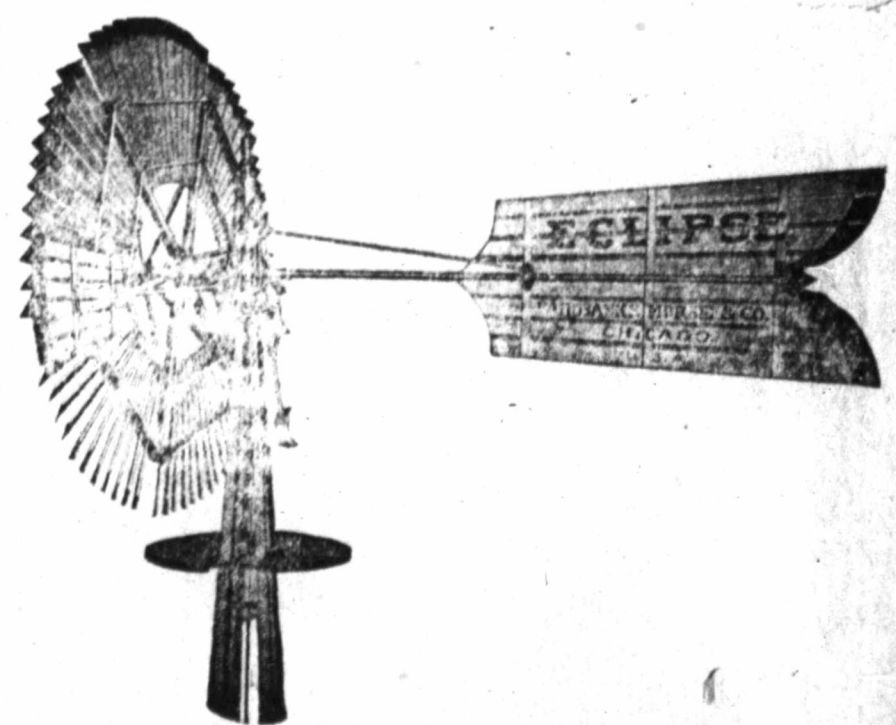

Tuberculosis—Continued

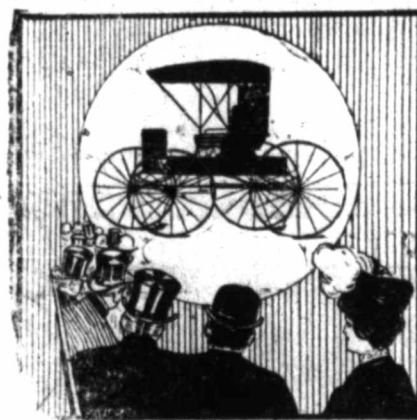

COUNTY COURT NEWS

(Delayed.)

The first case disposed of was that of the state against C. A. Arbutnot for selling intoxicating liquors, to wit: J. R. Ginger. The trial was warmly contested by council for both state and defendant and resulted in a verdict of guilty, assessing the punishment of the defendant at \$25.00 and 20 days in jail. Appealed.

State vs T. A. Morrison Sr. for breach of the peace. The trial resulted in a verdict of guilty and fine of \$10.00.

State vs. M. Carter for drunkenness in office; verdict not lty.

State vs. Pat Murphy for carrying a pistol on and about his person. The trial resulted in a hung jury. The same case was tried on the following Friday and resulted in an immediate conviction with punishment assessed at \$100.00 fine.

Wednesday the case of the state against J. W. Francis for selling intoxicating liquor, viz.: Hiawatha, was called. Verdict of guilty which assessed the defendant's punishment at \$25 fine and 20 days in jail.

After a fair and full hearing this is what an honest jury of Mitchell county thinks of Hiawatha as an intoxicant. This would be a warning to all who in the future dare to disturb the peace of Mitchell county citizens by introducing and selling such supposed "soft drinks." County Attorney Leslie, in this case, demonstrates his ability to convict in such infractions of the law, and he seems fully determined to do so.

Thursday was tried the case of the State vs. Earl Lovelady for disturbing the peace. Verdict of not guilty.

On same day was tried the case of the State vs. C. M. Sparks for permitting an unsanitary outhouse to remain on premises in his possession. The defendant was found guilty and his punishment fixed at a fine of \$10 and costs, amounting in all to about \$50. This case was appealed from a conviction in the city corporation court, and the citizens of Colorado will do well to look about themselves to see if they are not violating the law in respect. This sanitary should and will be forced.

A file was given to the motions for new trials were overruled and some few appeals taken.

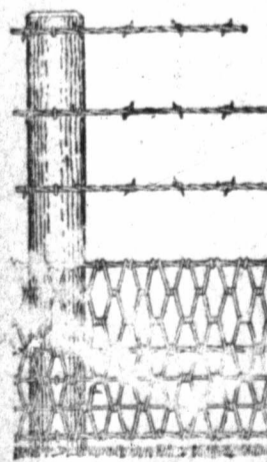

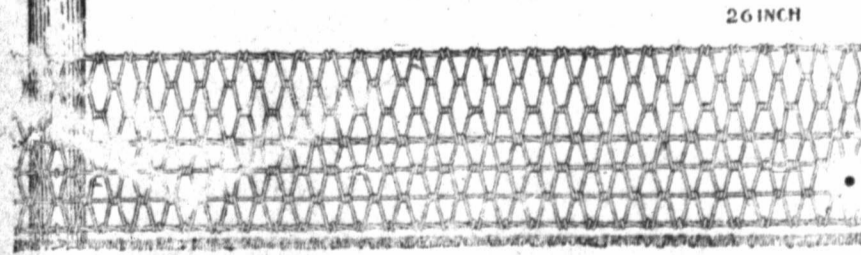

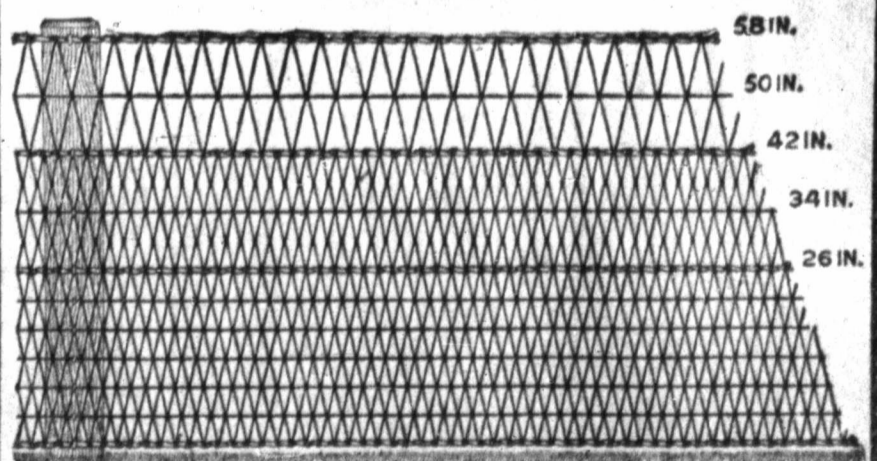
