Veterans New Educational **Benefits** Listed

Approximately 28,000 veter-ans in the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office Area are expected to apply for educational benefits un er PL 89-358 during the first year, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Regional Office,

The first payments have now been issued to veterans enrolled in summer schools and these payments were for attendance during the month of June. Payments may be made only after the VA re ceives a certificate of attendance submitted by the veteran at the end of each month he is in attendance.

Coker cautioned that stu dents reporting for school this fall should have sufficient fund in addition to enroll ment costs to support themselves for at least two months, since it takes approximately that long before the firt VA chleck may be issued. Stu-dents should be prepared also to supplement educational allowance payments, as nor mally these payments will not be sufficient to cover all of their educational expenses.

Veterans applying for benefits will receive a certificate of eligibility showing the school and the training objective they have a locted.

These are pricented to the schools which in turn will cer-tify veterans' enrollments. Coker urged that veterans be

Good General Rain Leaves Area With Bright Peanut Prospects

Rainfall that measured from 1.5 to more than 3.0 inches fell over this region last Wednesday to brighten the outlook for an outstanding peanut crop in Eastland County.

Rainfall reports included 2.9 inches in Cisco, 2.0 at Cross Plains, 3.2 in Eastland, 1.5 at Gorman, 1.8 at Moran, 2.6 at Putnam, 3.2 at Rising Star, and 2.0 in Ranger.

The late summer rain dropped temperatures to the low 60s at night and to the 70s during the day, bringing welcome relief from heat that had been in the middle 90s for several days. Forecasts called for showers and cooler weather to prevail for the weekend.

The rain was general over sure that they meet entrance requirements and that they will be accepted by their chosen school before filing an application for educational benemuch of the state, causing flood conditions in far West Texas and New Mexico.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said that he could not remember when the county's peanut fields, both irrigated and dry land, looked better. The peanut acreage in the county is approximately 33,000 this year, Mr. Cooper said. This was a little over last

year's acreage. Mr. Cooper attributed the good crop outlook in part on use of a new dusting idea for leaf spot. This poision has after a high crop yield, poor tronic duster that gives the sulphur base material an e-lectric charge as it leaves the machine. The pecan crop will be about 15 per cent of normal this fall, Mr. Cooper believed. This was attributed by the veteran orchard specialist to a tendency of trees to "rest" after a high crop yeild, poor pollination, and the fact that case bearers (insects) hatch-


Each project will add from 30 to 40 people to the payroll, bringing total employment to about 200. The plant has been



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






Getting tips on how to select show calves and how to care for them at the Saturday 4-H Calf Field Day in Gorman were 4-H'ers from Cisco Risin Star, Morton Valley and host club, Gorman,

Twenty-six calves were exhibited.

Buck Wheat, adult 4-H lead er from Morton Valley, told the yonugsters what to look for when selecting show calves. He said how calves place in shows depends a great deal on the judge's discretion. He suggested that anyone

choosing a show calf should look at the animal as a whole instead of picking out the goo points or bad points.
