Mr. A. L. Jones, representing the peanut factory of Denison, was here yesterday after contracts for the farmers' peanut crop. The people of Denison have induced the factory to locate there under promise of supplying all the peanuts it could handle. Its capacity is six cars per day, and in order to make their promise good other sections of the state have to be called upon. O. M. Mitchell is purchasing agent at Colorado. He will not only buy all the peanuts the farmers of Mitchell county will raise, but pay the same price—the factory pays at Denison. The highest market price is guaranteed here. Roughly speaking, there are about 500 acres planted to peanuts in this county now, which if brought to Colorado, will command the top price, and go far to sustain a great and growing industry in Texas besides laying the foundation for such an industry in west Texas. Bring on your peanuts to Mr. Mitchell.

TEXAS STATE FAIR

Greatest Offerings in History of Fair Secured.

Dallas, Texas, (Special): With the lowest railroad rates and the finest attractions in history, the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the State Fair of Texas, which begins in this city Saturday, October 16, will undoubtedly be the most successful and the most brilliant ever offered to the thousands of patrons of the institution. Everything is in readiness. All the improvements contemplated have been completed. The entries in the livestock department have taxed the splendid accommodations there to the utmost. With forty-four counties exhibiting their farm, orchard and garden products, the agricultural development of the Southwest will be measured even better than last year.

All the latest devices in the scientific world will be demonstrated. The famous Curtiss aeroplane—the same type with which the American aviator won glory in the European contests—will be at the Fair. The Strobel dirigible, another type of the airship, will also be there. Aerial navigation will be demonstrated for the first time in the South.

Every evening Pain's peerless pyrotechnic drama will be given. This drama introduces fighting airships, aeroplanes, armored autos, aerial torpedoes, etc. There will be a gigantic outdoor stage for 250 performers. There will be acres of realistic scenery a military band, novel marches and sports. There will be a whole circus of acrobats, gymnasts, clowns, high wire experts and sensational specialties. The depicting of this thrilling pyrotechnic drama and battle will necessitate the most gigantic display of fire works in the history of the South.

In the matter of the rates the railroads have treated the management better than ever before. For the first and second Saturdays of the Fair a long distance rate of \$4.30 has been made from Galveston, Houston and San Antonio. The limit of tickets of this kind is the Monday night following, so that patrons will have an opportunity of spending Saturday, Sunday and Monday at the Fair. The same low long distance rates will apply from all points in the Southwest. Season tickets will be sold for one and one-third fare for the round trip from all points within ninety miles; beyond that distance one and one-fifth fare the round trip sale. Sale of these tickets will start October 15, with the return limited to November 1. A rate of \$1 for the round trip will be made to Dallas during the three Sundays of the Fair from all points within 100 miles. For points within 150 mile the rate will be \$1.50. A special two days' fare of one fare plus ten cents has been made for points within 175 miles of Dallas. A visit to the great exposition will be within the reach of all.

The idea, as just now developed, is to give every man in Colorado a most cordial invitation to meet with the Brotherhood on the designated night. The ladies of the town will also be specially invited, to assist in the music and to grace the occasion in general.

The prime object of all this will be to get closer acquainted in such an atmosphere and amid such surroundings, besides to fix the idea that the purpose of the Brotherhood is to help, develop the best, the cleanest and highest there is in the manhood of Colorado. To the ladies, we of course, must look for help, knowing they will not fail us in any good work.

When the matter is fully settled and details arranged, further announcement will be made.

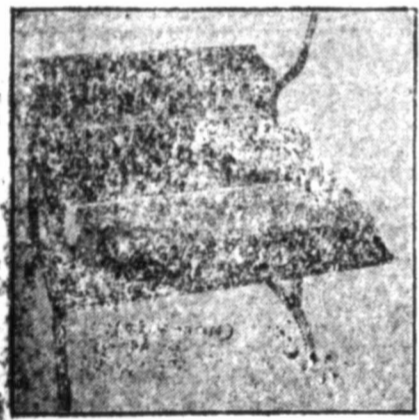

Bit of Ancient History.

West Texas Stockmen Win Quarantine Fight.

With one victory already won in securing the suspension of the six months' quarantine provision, Texas cattlemen expect now to work toward a friendly compromise with the government, and to induce Dr. Rice P. Steddom at the Colorado City conference to modify Dr. Leslie Allen's rulings over the provisional quarantine belt in Texas.

The movement to secure the suspension of the six months' provision began in Midland, when the West Texas Stockmen's Association was formed. It was constituted at two different conferences in this city between the stockmen and members of the state livestock sanitary board. Finally a delegation was sent to Washington, where Dr. Melvin was interviewed and consented to the suspension of this six months' provision while it would be investigated. The cattlemen's grievances against Dr. Leslie Allen of Oklahoma, will also be investigated.

The suspension of the six months' provision is one of the greatest victories ever secured by Texas cattlemen. Under Dr. Allen's quarantine ruling, six months had to elapse before cattle which had been in an infected district could be moved to points above the line. It was the claim of the west Texas stockmen, especially those in the neighborhood of Midland that this would work a terrible hardship and extra expense upon them in moving their cattle.

The further claim was made that the constant changing of the quarantine line was resulting in great expense to the border cattlemen.

It seems with human interest, unmarred by scientific data. It will stand cheek by jowl with the great masterpiece of Defoe as a perfectly told story. Whatever Cook may miss in glory of discovery, he has more than gained in literary fame and dollars. We had rather have written Cook's story than have gotten to the pole first. Its value to the literature of natural history is incalculable.

That Bond Issue.

The most optimistic Wilkins Micawber, can not fail to appreciate the self-evident fact that the crops of Mitchell county are exceedingly short. Neither can he fail to appreciate the consequent fact that this shortness will seriously effect the prosperity of the county. The farmers will have to buy feed with which to make the next crop. The merchants will sell less goods. There will be less money circulating, and every business, every individual will feel the depressing effects of the failure of the crops.

Further: This condition must necessarily continue and grow worse until another crop is made and gathered. In other countries and sections, this condition has often been met by the institution of public works—chiefly road building. If this precinct would now vote a bond issue for, say \$50,000 to improve the public roads, it would afford work for hundreds of the very citizens, on whom the crop failure will fall heaviest. It would go far to relieve the situation and hold many of our good people. What burden would \$50,000 in twenty year bonds be to the present generation, compared to the depression in business and work during the coming year? Think of these things, neighbors, and let's do something to relieve the situation. A bond issue is the surest, safest, cheapest and most permanent solution the Record can see. Speaking of Broom Corn.

Since the Record has been preaching the gospel of broom corn and factories, we have noticed in five papers of West Texas and the Panhandle that broom corn has been tried in their respective counties and proven a success. With this condition what argument can be adduced against the establishment of three or four factories throughout the Panhandle of Texas?—Colorado Record.

It has been demonstrated here years ago that broom corn is profitable crop and as good brooms have been made near Brownwood as anywhere in this country, and yet it seems difficult to get our people to quit \$10.00 an acre cotton for \$60.00 an acre broom corn.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Broom corn reached a high mark in Oklahoma during the past week. The quality of the brush this year is much better than in previous years on account of the favorable weather to cure it. The high price was reached at Sayre, when A. A. Kahon sold his entire crop of five acres for \$150 a ton. This is realizing \$120 an acre off of \$15 land. It is claimed that brush was sold at the same price at Woodward.

At Guymon the price reached \$140 per ton and a large amount of it changed hands during the past week. The poorest quality sold for \$80 and \$90 a ton, which is about the highest it had ever reached for the best grade in previous years.

Shattuck which for two seasons held the world's record for the largest yield from any single point, and when produced a lot of the brush this year marketed a large amount of excellent brush during the past week for \$140 a ton. It is believed by the producers there that the highest mark has not been reached.

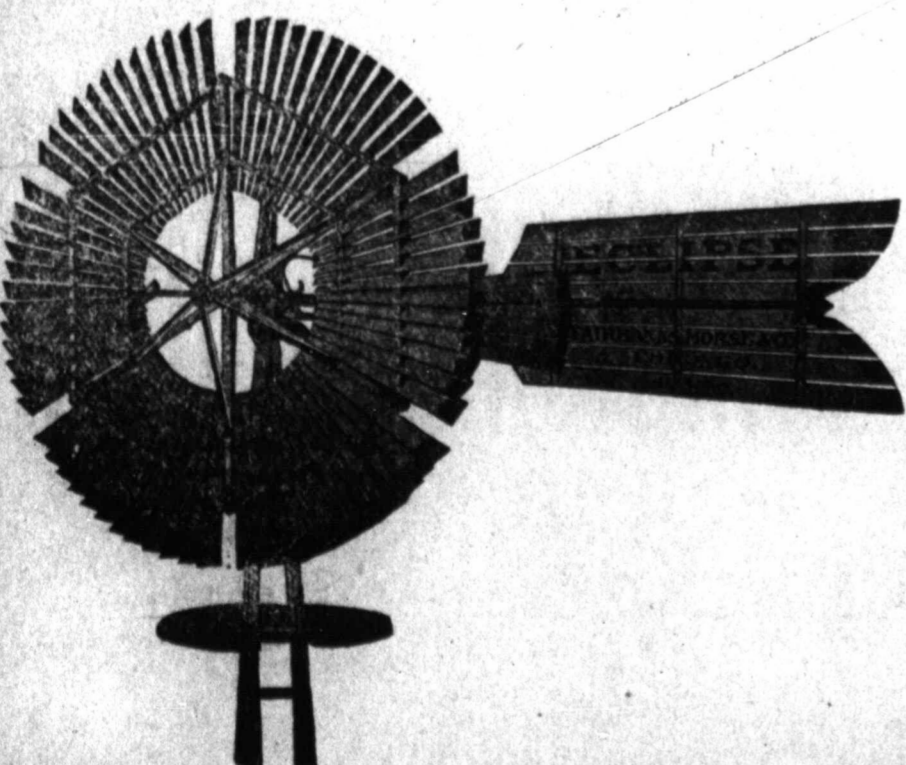

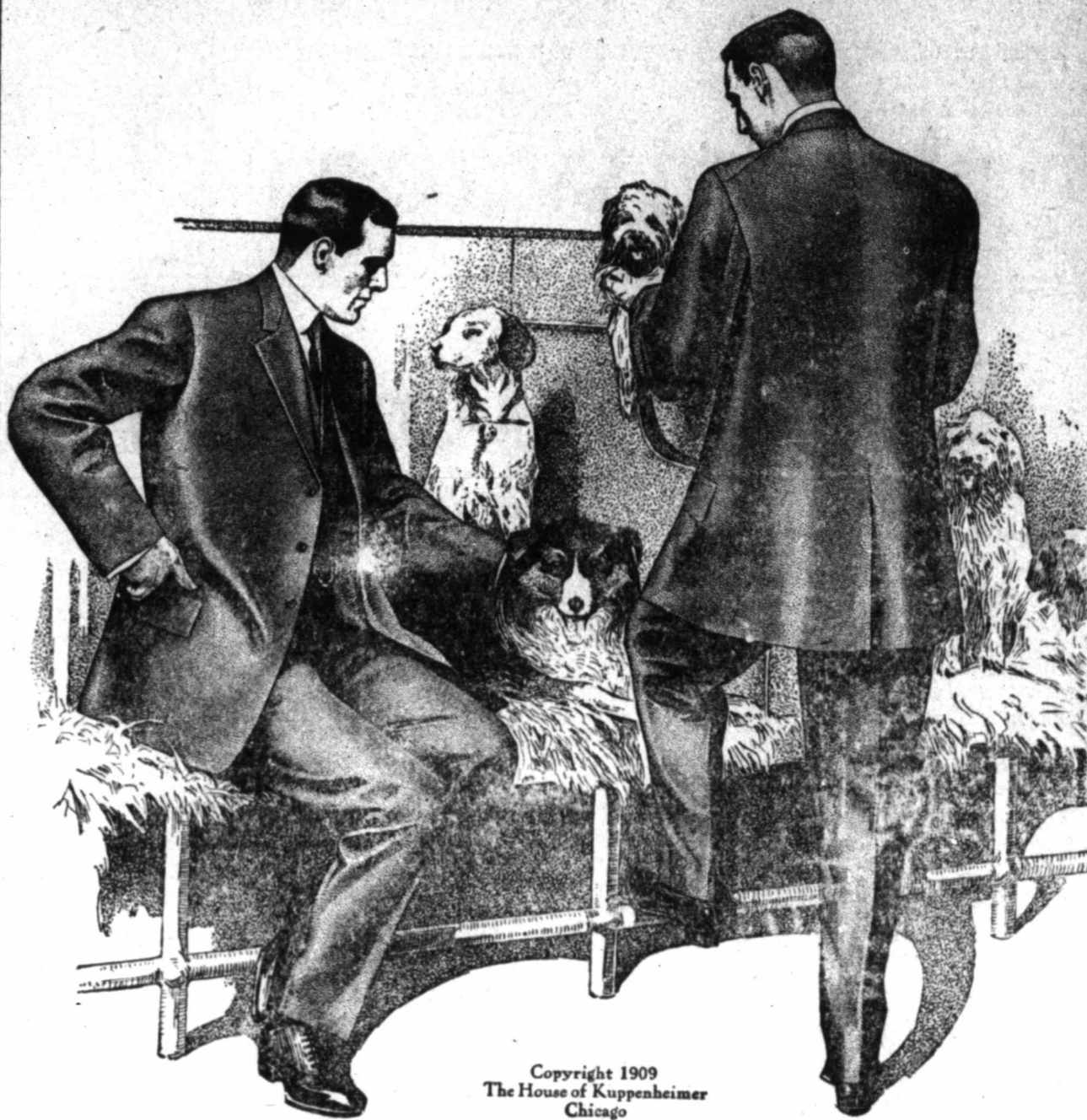
