City caps tainted well

The City of Muleshoe is permanently capping one of its wells after a random test indicated it was contaminated.

The well, located near the Muleshoe Co-op Gin, was primarily used as an emergency backup well, according to City Manager James Fisher. He said it had been used only once in the last five to six months.

Tests conducted by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission in February indicated high levels of nitrate. Tests indicated a nitrate level of 11.6 parts per million. The allowable limit is 10 parts per million.

"This is a concern, but it isn't anything to get alarmed about," Fisher said. "The well that we're abandoning is not part of the water system and has not been for some time."

"We've got a good water

supply and good water, we're just taking steps to avoid any future problems with the water system."

Nitrates are a by-product of fertilizers and could be coming from runoff from neighboring fields, Fisher said.

The City pumps all its drinking water from the Sanderosa wells located just south of Muleshoe.

The contaminated well was only source used to supply water to the 110,000 gallon storage tank located at West 9th Street and West Avenue B.

The City is exploring the possibility of piping water from the Sanderosa well field to the Ninth & B storage tank, which would serve as an emergency backup to the one million gallon storage tank located south of Muleshoe, Fisher said.

The City uses an average of one million gallons of water a day.

The Sierra Club is back. Seeking more funds! I've got to give them credit. They don't think small. Now they want to drain Lake Powell and reclaim Glen Canyon.

When it's fourth down and twenty-five yards to go, you're behind and time is running out, a drastic play is necessary! The Sierra Club, as well as many other "Anti" groups have experienced a decline in membership and income over the last several years. "Chicken Little Overkill" has numbed the public.

But, what better way to shock the wallet out of people's pants than with a giant Goliath. Some cause so great, and so insurmountable that it can become the symbol of fund raising campaigns for generations beyond our time. Granted, enthusiasm may wear thin over the years but it is a great marketing strategy for a business in decline.

This cynical view of the motives of the Sierra Club leadership does an injustice to those members and others who harbor an idealistic view of nature and man's interference thereof.

There are many farmers and ranchers who would prefer to keep power stations, nuclear reactors, airports, malls, landfills, city limits, strip mines, freeways, testing grounds and toxic waste dumps from being built next to them. But they have had little luck getting them dismantled after the fact. Civilization is a mighty force.

This "back to nature movement" falls on

deaf ears when you start affecting people's cost of living. Skyrocketing electric bills, water shortages, and declining livability are things people take personally.

The Glen Canyon Dam backs up the Colorado River for 186 miles and forms Lake Powell, the 2nd largest man-made lake in the U.S. It now supplies power and water to six million rate payers in six western states and recreation for 400,000 boaters each year. The price of civilization.

If the Sierra wanted, they could start smaller. Take the face off Mount Rushmore, for instance. Restore it to its natural beauty.

The land under Washington, D.C. was originally a wetland with habitat for birds, reptiles and plants. Now it is overrun with predators.

The Golden Gate Bridge mars the grandeur of the San Francisco Bay.

All those unsightly locks and dams that disrupt the natural flow of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers could be removed to restore their ancient ecosystem. Then move on to the Tennessee Valley Authority.

But the Sierra Club has declined these options and picked an area that they consider more practical as a fund-raiser. And they're right, regardless of their motives. Most potential donators don't even know where it is. They can rally to the cause without thinking because, after all, it will never affect their own cost of living. Bein' green is easy when it's not personal.

wife, the official navigator, wakes from a nap and asks, "Dear, what direction are we going?" To which query the harried helmsman replies, "I don't know, but we're making great time!"

It's a good question, you know. What direction are we going? It's important that we know. Could it be that one of the reasons our society refuses to ever slow down, to ever sit still, to ever be quiet, is that we're frightened of the thoughts we might think if we just had time to think them-thoughts about our purpose, our direction, our values? I can well understand why our culture might be frightened of such thoughts, but should Christians?

It's been anything but quiet this week in my life-and probably the same thing is true for yours. And don't get me wrong, I thank God for the gift of life and his blessing in productive activity.

But at this moment, Lord, thank you for the stillness. Give me the wisdom to avail myself of it more often for in stillness is true wisdom born. As your Presence hovering over the vast pool of possibility at this world's dawning brought forth life and beauty, may your Spirit give birth in this stillness to worthwhile and meaningful depth of thought and of being so that when the time comes to speak, to act, our words and our actions carry with them depth of meaning and wisdom and love. 


nated hitter. Hitting left-handed for the first time, Wheeler batted .281 with five doubles and two home runs. He also was 4-5 as the Mules' second starter.


Wedel farms about 1,200 acres of white, yellow and blue food corn and yellow feed corn and 1,500 acres of cotton. He has both conventional and organic production.


