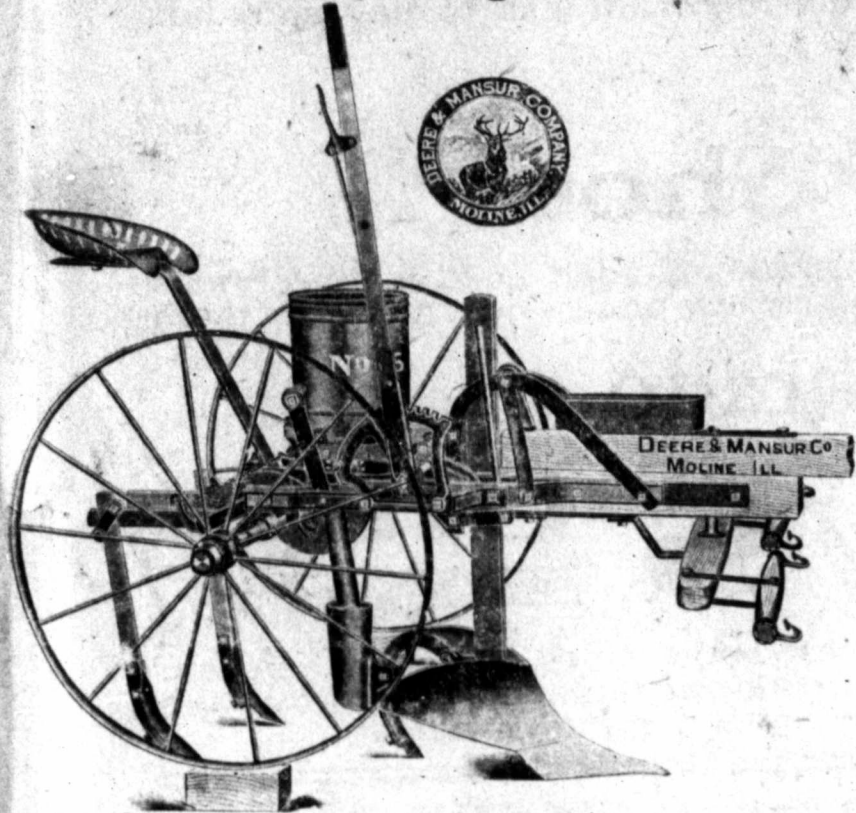

A WORD ABOUT THE RAILROAD.

There is scarcely a day but some one asks "what about our railroad; ain't nothing been done yet?" This may be a perfectly natural question, but the majority of people do not understand how slowly these matters move. Enterprises like railroads are not arranged in a day, and good time will be made if active operations begin within six months after everything is arranged from a financial standpoint.

The following from the Robert Lee Observer shows that the people at that end of the line are also anxious to learn something as to when the work will begin:

"It seems that some of our people are becoming impatient in regard to the railroad. Don't get impatient, it takes time for such gigantic undertakings. Mr. Hammock has written the Railroad Company secretary that he will be here at an early date to close up all matters and begin the actual construction of the road. He will bring a bunch of capitalists with him who are interested in the road. These men are at considerable distance apart and it takes time to get them together. Mr. Hammock has exercised a great deal of patience with the committee in giving them plenty of time to raise the bonus. Don't worry. The bonus is all up and there is not the slightest doubt but that Mr. Hammock will fulfill his part of the agreement.

We hoped this week to publish the entire bonus list but the committee is of the opinion that it would be better to wait until all contracts are signed up to build the road before it is published. We are a member of the committee and are in their hands.

There are yet some of these notes to be secured. If you are one of those who have not secured your note, attend to it at once.

We expect Mr. Hammock and party to arrive in the next ten days and take over the bonus and arrange everything to begin the construction. As soon as all deals are signed up and secured we will publish the full list of all who helped in raising the bonus."

The Record has not the slightest doubt as to the building of the road, and did not expect the financial arrangements to be made as soon as they have been. Compared with other enterprises of the same kind, as good progress has been made as could be expected. Mr. Hammock wants to get everything in ship shape before a lick of work is struck, so that there will be no delay when once the work of construction is fairly begun. Let us exercise patience; a two-year-old calf can't be made in a minute.

For the benefit of those who are inclined to attribute the quiescent state of the projected railroad to inability to finance the enterprise, the Record will say that the town has every assurance that the delay is not because of any inability on the part of the promoters to fully finance the road, but there are hundreds of minor matters that must be attended to in regular form, which take time. We are naturally impatient because the building of a railroad is a rare occurrence in the history of the town. With the promoters and builders, who have built dozens of roads, and perhaps have other projects on hand the building of this particular road does not appeal with such demand for quick action as it does to us and the people of Robert Lee, who have waited twenty-five years for a railroad. The limit of time in which work is to be commenced, is June 1st, so there is ample time for everything to be done in due form and the company comply with their contract. Promotion companies which do these things every day do not appreciate the natural impatience that possesses a town that builds only one road in its lifetime. Let us possess our souls in patience, the railroad will be built all right.

CHANGES IN SOUTHERN CATTLE QUARANTINE REGULATIONS

Arsenical Solution as well as Crude Petroleum to be Employed for Dipping Cattle for Destruction of Ticks.

The Department of Agriculture will soon issue new regulations governing the movement of cattle from the area under quarantine on account of Texas or tick fever. These regulations will be effective about April 1, and will permit the movement of cattle from the quarantine area provided they are properly dipped under government supervision. The new regulations differ from those hitherto in effect in that they provide for the employment of an arsenical dipping fluid as well as for crude petroleum which has heretofore been used for the destruction of the ticks that transmit the disease. Experiments by the Bureau of Animal Industry in dipping cattle in an arsenical solution indicate that this method of treatment is sufficiently effective to be permitted for cattle intended for interstate movement for purposes other than immediate slaughter.

The vats in which such dipping is done under supervision shall be approved by the Department; they shall have, at their maximum working ca-

capacity, a length of not less than 40 feet at the dip line, a width of 34 to 40 inches, and a minimum depth of 5 1/2 feet; the sides shall be perpendicular instead of sloping, the only slope below the dip line being that at the end from which the cattle leave the vat. The slide board shall be 5 to 5 1/2 feet long, with a slope of not less than 45 degrees. Vats that are already installed, which have a length of not less than 35 feet at the dip line, otherwise conforming to the above requirements, except that they may have sloping sides, may be approved, provided, of course, that they were well constructed, water tight, and in general good condition. The vats shall be covered when not in use; shall be so constructed that water from rains and overflow cannot run into them, and that the drainage into the vats from the drainage

troughs shall be cut off when they are not in use. In order that the dipping of cattle may be facilitated, the Department of Agriculture desires to secure immediately the names of manufacturers who can furnish cattle owners or others interested a standard grade of white arsenic which must be finely powdered and guaranteed to be at least 99 per cent pure. The Department wishes the manufacturer to place upon packages intended for use in dipping a statement guaranteeing that the arsenic conforms to the standard of purity indicated. Communications on this subject should be addressed to the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. Copies of the new quarantine regulations when issued may be obtained on application to the Bureau.

The territory under quarantine for Texas fever embraces the whole states of Louisiana, Alabama and Florida, and parts of California, Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia. The area under quarantine has been reduced by more than 80,000 square miles within the last three years as a result of the campaign being waged by the federal and state authorities for the extermination of the ticks, and as this work progresses the quarantine will be removed from additional territory.

In Japan where the government owns its own railroads, the passenger rate is fixed according to the distance to be traveled. Under 50 miles the rate is eight-tenths cent a mile; up to 100 miles, it is seven-tenths per mile, and one tenth off for every additional 100 miles up to 300 where the minimum is four-tenths cent per mile. It costs in Japan \$10,000 to build and equip a mile of road. On this basis the rates are fixed so that the roads can earn a dividend of 7 to 8 per cent. There is no watered stock in Japanese roads. The freight rates are one cent a mile per ton. Privately owned roads in Japan have same rates as the government roads.

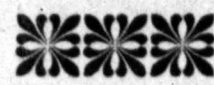

There have been many curious ways by which men have forged to the front ranks of celebrity, but Horace Fletcher literally chewed his way to fame and fortune.

The convention of Cattle raisers at Fort Worth this week was the best attended and in every way most successful the Association has ever held. The attendance from west Texas was very large.

If you meet a stranger these latter days, no need to ask him but two questions to locate him and his business. If he isn't a prospector, he's certainly a townsie lot salesman—sure.

The average run of newspaper readers will be greatly disappointed if the recent Cuddeback scandal is not aired in the courts. They want to know just where and how the banker was cut.

Everybody has a day but Father. There's Children's day, mothers' day, labor, arbor, all-fools and dog days. He must be contented with pay day.

Eight car loads of blasting powder and dynamite will be used in blasting the deep cut through the cap rock on the Santa Fe road, 25 miles east of Lubbock. The cut will be 80 feet deep.

Think of hogs selling in Chicago at \$11 and in Fort Worth at \$10.60. If it keeps on this way much longer, the average editor of a country paper can't afford to even graze his mouth with a bacon rind on Christmas day.

Down at San Angelo, a night watchman found the doors of five business houses unlocked during one night. Is such apparent carelessness due to the local brand of honesty, or the rural habits of small places? In some places even locks, bars and patmen are but small protection.

When President Roosevelt has recovered from the fatigue of his African trip, he intends to come to Texas and tour the state for data from which he will write a history of the state and Gen. Sam Houston. While here he will be the guest of Chairman Lyon, and will make a few political speeches.

The career of T. C. Platt, is a striking illustration of what a naturally weak man can do when the political machine is in his hands. When he attempted the accomplishment of anything solely upon the strength of his assertive individuality, he failed signally. His effort to sidetrack Roosevelt was a glaring example of his personal weakness.

If West Texas is not blessed with an abundant crop this good year of Grace, it will not be because conditions are not favorable. There is a confidence among both business men and farmers in the prospects and conditions that means much to the general prosperity of the country—a spirit of cheerful optimism.

We shall not fall out with any candidate for the legislature because of his belief that Bailey is, or is not bigger than the democratic and republ-

can party (whichever he claims to be of), because of his church or lodge affiliation, or because he may make soap in the wrong sign, but will oppose him unless he promises to carry out,

so far as his influence goes, the wishes of the people who send him to Austin. If democracy means anything, it means that representatives shall carry out the platform demands of the people in convention. Such repudiation of plainly expressed demands as the last legislature gave the voters, is subversive of the principles of even party autonomy.

The Dangerous Man.
If a man has not in him the root of righteousness, if he does not believe in the practice of honesty, if he is not truthful and upright, clean and high minded, fair in his dealings, both at home and abroad, then the stronger he is, the abler and more energetic he is, the more dangerous he is to the body politic.—President Roosevelt.

There seems to be universal satisfaction over the passing of the curfew ordinance—a feeling that had such an ordinance been in force the past few years, much trouble would have been prevented. And it may be said in passing that the age limit might be raised to a pious end. There are many adults who have as little call to prout at night as their boys. Example is stronger than the law in questions of this kind.

The man who prates loudest about his "liberties" is usually a helpless slave, bound body, mind and soul by some habit or ignorance. Liberty to most of us, is like an edged tool in the hands of a child. It is a blessing only to those who are capable of self-government and strict control of appetites and passions. In the hand of all others, liberty is mere license, which forge the chains of indulgence and habit, that hold him a helpless victim of his boasted freedom.

The Record was favored last week with an offer from a press syndicate to furnish weekly, a thousand words of editorial paragraphs, which will be "safely satirical, curiously critical and devilish good," for the trifle of \$1 per week. "They will be your own, neither cribbed or credited," the promoter says, and in sober truth, about the only evidence of authorship many brilliant paragraphs have, is the lack of credit. The fellow who fishes a page from the letters of Junius and prints it as his own, shows a higher degree of literary ability than the chap who pays 50 cents or a dollar for a weekly editorial service like the above.

The initiated understand why it is that none but "among the most brilliant and successful newspaper men on the state or southwest" ever have dealings with the paper and supply houses. An order of 150 five column patents from the editor of the "Weekly Bunchhole" carries with it a complimentary notice in the next issue of the house's journal, that even the country editor himself is ashamed to copy. It seems that the standard of ability and success is determined more by the toll paid into the supply house's till, than by intellectual and financial achievement.

The habit many editors have of publishing an article from another paper and crediting it to "X" when they know perfectly well where they cribbed it, is more contemptible than stealing it out of hand and trying to palm it off as their own. It not only shows plagiarism of the worst kind but cowardice as well. It confesses not only the intent to steal, but to rob the writer of the credit due him. It is an acknowledgment of not only jealousy, but inferiority. If you are not manly enough to give the proper credit, don't try to rob the other fellow of it. To credit an article "X" when you know where it came from, is withholding from another the credit you should like to have yourself, but haven't nerve to claim.

No other section of the United States is developing as fast as the southwest, but its greatest handicap is a lack of immigration. Here in Texas is room for a population of fifty million—equal to that of the German empire—with land as fertile as can be found in the world, where millions can find homes. If the great army of native and foreign laborers who crowd the cities, eke out a hand-to-mouth existence, and who are continually at war with the monopolies, could be induced to come to Texas and acquire homes, or work for others, the labor problem would soon be settled and the state developed.

Old "Tom Cat" Platt, for many years a national figure in politics and a former Federal senator from New York state, died a few days ago at the age of 68. He was the "me too" target of the humorist, on account of his resigning from the senate at the same time Conklin did. No man had such a ridicule to live down. No man faced greater humiliation. No man had reason to harbor more bitter resentments. No man had more implacable enemies. He lived the ridicule down; he faced the humiliation with a brave face. He kept alive or stifled his resentments as it suited him, but he punished his enemies when the time or the opportunity came.

A stolen cake will taste just as good as one bought with money; stolen money will buy as much as that honestly earned; a stolen horse will ride as well and far as one's own; but the fruits of a stolen mental effort turns to dead sea apples on the lips. The very praise others give stolen literature mocks the thief and instead of honest pride in an honest effort, that spurs him to greater things, he realizes that he is more impotent than before he appropriated the product of another's brain. The plagiarist can take no pride in what he does; he can make no improvement in his work because it is not creative but artificial. After years of work, conscious of his own inferiority and lack of ability, he remains what he was at the beginning—a fraud and a dwarf.

The greatest advantage, is the satisfaction and pleasure it gives personally to the possessor, though it cannot be turned into dollars and cents. The ability to amuse and entertain oneself, is the ultimate advantage of a college education. It multiplies the powers and media of enjoyment of the best things of life and widens the field and enlarges the sources of our pleasures. If a college education did not add a dollar to ones income, it is well worth in the higher enjoyments and walks of life, all that it may cost.

Turkey has undertaken the most gigantic irrigation enterprise in the world, which looks to the putting under irrigation and cultivation twelve million acres of land in northern Mesopotamia. It will cost about \$19 per acre to inaugurate this great work, but the Turkish government will sell to the farmers at an average of \$150 per acre. This scheme if only partially successful will change trade relations and shift the balance of trade to that country. Wheat, barley and other grains will be raised.
