STRIKE MEDIATION OFFER ACCEPTED

COMMISSIONER NEILL AND CHAIR MAN KNAPP HAVE TAKEN A HAND.

FIREMEN SEEK QUICK ACTION

Union Officials Declare Men Will Promptly Strike If Delay

Chicago, Ill., March 16.-Danger of an imminent strike of 27,000 locomotive firement, the throwing out of employment of more than 125,000 other employes and the temporary suspension of business on practically every railroad system between Chicago and the Pacific Coast, was averted yesterday through the acceptance of offers of mediation from the Federal authorities at Washington.

Asked by Managers.

At the request of the general managers of the forty-seven Western railroads involved, Chairman Martin A. Knapp of the Interstate Commerce Commission and Commissioner of Labor Charles P. Neill telegraphed an offer of Federal mediation to the union officials. This offer was accepted. W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, stipulating that action must begin without delay.

At Eleventh Hour. The appeal to Washington was taken as an eleventh hour move to prevent a walkout, which, it was declared, threatened the greatest railroad strike since that of 1894. Thirty-seven members of the Western Federated Board of the Brotherhood, have formally voted for a strike. The hour for striking had been set for next Monday morning, and the members were prepared to start for their homes, some of them as far as the Pacific coast. to put the strike into action, when the mediation steps were taken.

Coming to Chicago. It is stipulated that the mediators will come to Chicago. According to Mr. Carter, their function will be, not to arbitrate the matters in dispute, but to determine what shall be arbitrated. the question involves wages, which both sides have agreed upon as arbitral, and two other technical points, involving promotion and representation of the union, which the Brotherhood contends are, but which the railroads claim are not, arbitrable.

"If the mediation falls through, the strike will go right on as planned,"

One bold correspondent received a Roosevelt smile only when he asked if the colonel will be a candidate for the presidency in 1912. Questions about his friend Gifford Pinchot's row with Secretary Bailinger and President Taft were likewise turned aside unanswered.

The final fight for the disoslution of the Standard Oil began before the Supreme Court of the United States of New York spoke for three hours in its defense.

The town of Khartum is a mass of color. Flags of Egypt, England and America are everywhere, and the expresident has probably appreciated nothing more than the opportunity of

Khartum Historical Spot.

Khartum is virtually built around the grave of "Chinese" Gordon. The city itself is a gigantic monument to that soldier's deeds and his heroic death. In the center of it stands his animals killed by his party, is as foleffigy in bronze, mounted on a camel, lows: gazing with fixed eyes out toward the desert which mocked him during the terrible year that he lay there waiting for relief. Behind the statue stands the British governor's palace, an imposing structure in the Gothic style, typical of British power and

Not far away is the Gordon Memorial college, a school built with funds raised by Gen. Kitchener by subscription throughout Great Britain, in which the Sudanese newer generation is trained for service in the government which conquered its fathers. Everywhere throughout the city the name Gordon appears. There is the Gordon hotel, the Gordon drive and up the White Nile the Gordon tree. Gordon's memory will live so long as Khartum exists. The British have transformed the city of his death into memorial to his glory that can

laugh at time. Khartum stands at the confluence of the White and Blue Niles, and some day with the development of the wilderness south of it will become a metropolis as important to the commerce of Africa as Chicago is to the commerce of North America. Properly speaking, however, the city itself does not extend beyond the banks of the Blue Nile. 

This keeps the cost down, for it is the towers and angles, bay-windows and fancy porches, complicated roofs, etc., that run into money into building-without making any reasonable return in the way of conveniences or utility.

This house is almost square in its general outline, being 22 feet 8 inches wide by 28 feet 8 inches. It has a simple gable roof, the slope of the roof being toward the front. A low dormer window breaks the line of this roof. A simple square porch projects in front. The concrete block wall from grade to the second floor is designed to have one of these attractive surface finishes. The second story harmonizes with this, yet is lighter in effect. Cement plaster on wood lath, divided into panels in English half-timber style, is used for the second story. The whole building has the appearance of durability and comfort. It would certainly be a desirable addition to any neighborhood.




