Three County Hospitals Okay For Medicare

Congressman oma- Burleson has announced that three hospitals in Eastland County have been certified by the Bureau of Health Insurance of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore for the Medicare program. These are Blackwell Hospital, Gorman; Graham Hospital, Cisco; and Eastland Memorial Hospital, Eastland. Some 3,668 persons in Eastland County are eligible for Medicare Mr. Burleson said.

Congressman Burleson said that approximately 95 per cent of all hospital beds in the country have been or will be certified for participation in the Medicare Program, which

went into effect July 1. Certification by Social Security is based upon recom-mendation by the U.S. Public Health Service and the state health departments.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the conall tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock means the raising of livestock during such time.

ELECTION TO BE HELD on NOVEMBER 8, 1986.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII.
Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned to provide that all land to provi

means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

"(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section as designated for agricultural use, the local tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise. otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the pro-visions of this Section.

"(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

100th anniversary as an oil-producing state, Eastland County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the No. 1 energy source for a booming American civilization.

Eastland County ranks 142nd among the Texas counties producing oil and gas.

In 1866 Lyne T. Barret a man most history books forgot - drilled the first Texas oil well near Nacogdoches at a depth of 106 feet. In the one hundred years that followed, the search for oil and gas spread to every county in Texas, and today Eastland County is one of 210 which produce oil or gas. Barret and other pioneer

Texas oil men left a legacy for Eastland County that can be measured at approximately \$2.4 milloin a year, based on statistics compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Asso-

During Texas' first century of oil production (29 billion barrels), Eastland County has contributed approximately 120.4 million barrels, its rec-

ord dating from 1917. The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Eastland County produced more than 551,000 barrels of crude oil valued at \$1.6 million; and 6 billion cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$747,000. The 1965 output would be approximately the same, preliminary estimates

Payrolls, distribution of royalty checks to local landowners, new drilling ventures and tax payments are some of the ways by which oil and gas revenues are injected into the Eastland County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers and other landowners is the royalty interest from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate of approximately \$297,000 a year in Eastland County. Many more thousands a year are paid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators, hope will

some day yield oil or gas. In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty some \$127,000 a year to the State Treasury in severance taxes. Oil taxes ac-
