found more effective if cow peas are planted in the corn ten days after corn planting. The moth producing the boll worm shows a decided preference for corn in the silk and tassel and will therefore deposit her eggs upon the corn and peas in preference to the cotton plant, and therein lies the protection of this method.

Third: By the timely and proper application of poisons, and this is by batting the boll worm. The opinion prevails to great extent among cotton farmers that the boll worm cannot be successfully poisoned because it to the interior of bolls and square and does not feed upon the exterior of the plant to any extent. Such a belief is true only of the latter stages of the larva or worm.

The average farmer seldom has his attention - attracted by so small a creature as a newly hatched boll worm and therefore the habits of the worm during the early stages of its larval existance is practically unknown to him. It is only during this stage that poison can be effectively used in boll worm control. 


