| Business and Crop Outlook for Tex. <br> REPPORTS GENERALLY SHOW A GOOD HEALTHY CONDITION. <br> Farmers Claim Brightest Prospects in Several Years-Industrial and Financial Aüairs Are Excellent. <br> The outlook for a business and crop year in Texas appears never to have been brighter than for 1911, according to the various reports. <br> Good stands of corn and cotton in the black-land section about Ennis, industrial and trade conditions fine at Paris; grain crop in Bell county heading out finely; all crops very promising in Harrison; Comanche expects a banner year; bumper crops looked for around Ballinger; hay crop around Brownwood being harvested with big yields; outlook most promising in years in Brady section; brightest in history of Taylor County for years; crops rapidly being freed of weeds and grass in Consicana territory; 150.000 acres of cotton planted this week in Georgetown country; bumper crop outlook around Waco-these about sum up the reports and give the impression generally that conditions were never better. Money seems to be plentiful everywhere, at least for all reasonable business and industrial purposes, and some banks report that the farmers appear to be debt free and are not borrowing much, while others say they are using money to better equip their farms. <br> Comanche, May 12-The merchants all report good trade, the credit merchants all they desire, to handle, and the cash merchants a satisfactory patronage. An up to date dairy has been added to the enterprises of the town. Cement side walks are being laid all over town, probably 20,000 lineal feet having been put dowa, with uniform curb, in the last month, and as much more is under way. Backing up this business spirit in town are crop prospects of the very best. Oate were never better, many flelds belng estimated to yield from 80 to 100 bushels per acre. J. M. McCrary brought in a sample of his oats on the Leon River over five feet high and unusually large heads. Corn is looking fine and cotton is a good stand. $\qquad$ <br> Brownwood, May 12.-Perhaps never in the history of Brown county was the prospect for a good crop year better Wheat and oats will make large yields without more rains and are now headed out good. Alfalfa and Johnson grass are befng harvested now and are producing enormous crops. Corn is doing as nicely as could be wanted, but cotton is just a little backward, owing to the recent cold spells and so much rain. As soon as the wheat and oats be experienced and money will be more plentiful and building will take on new life. <br> Ballinger. May 12.-With the splen- | crops around Marshall is very promising, except cotton is a little backward owing to the unusual cool weather that has prevalled the pest two weeks. The berry crop is abundant and the finest for several years. Truck of all sorts is abundant and of excellent quality. While the peach crop is very short, owing to late freezes, there will be enough for home consumption and some to spare., In fact everything looks good in Harris county. <br> Paris, May 12.-Industrial trade conditions are in a fine shape in this city, and the oulook is as promising, both to the business and farming interests as could be reasonably desired. The farmers are more independent as a class than they have ever been. The banks say there is very little demand from them for money. Crops as a whole are a little backward on account of unfavorable weather at the beginning of the season. This applies to cotton. Those who didn't plant early were delayed by rain. Cotton chopping has just begun. The acreage of all crops has been fncreased some. Cotton about 10 per cent. The dand is in fine shape and stands are good. Alfalfa is very fine. It will be ready to cut next week. Oats are as fine as have ever been grown in Lamar county. Everybody is in good spirits and working with a vim. <br> Abilene, May 12.-The year 1911 is regarded so far as offering the brightest prospect for Taylor county that has appeared to the people for several years. The raintall since January first has been 7.17 inches, about half the amount of the entire year 1910. The rainfall since last October has been to date 13.22 inches. This rainfall has made possible the best small grain crop both of oats and wheat in the hisfory of the country. At present fall oats and wheat are the finest known in this section. The grain is hardy and beginning to head out well. The indications are for a very large yield. The spring eats are good. Fine spectmens are brought in every day. If hes heep estimated that 15,000 acres are in mheatand probably 25,000 acres In natc. There is some complaint of rust but from careful investigation there seems to be no marked damage irom this source. The greatest part of the cotton crop of the county has been planted. A large part of this new crop is now up and growing finely. The present season in the ground will give this crop an excellent start. A much larger crop of feed stuffs have been planted in the Abilene territory than last year. $\qquad$ <br> Belton. On the whole prospects are excellent for a bumper crop year. <br> Coleman, May 12.-The Increase in acreage of cocton in this country is about 10 per cent over last year,most of the cotton is up and doing well, chopping has just commenced and up to date the crop outlook is good. Wheat. oats. and all kinds of feodstuff are increased about 30 per cent. Wheat andyats are for the miost part looking well. <br> Georgetown, May 13 -After the $\delta 1 / 2$ inches of rain in April there was a general rush for cotton planting and about 150,000 acres of cotton were planted this week. The oat crop will be harvested next week if it remains dry. While the rust hurt during the rain, it is estimated that $50^{\prime}$ or 60 bushels of oats will be made to the acre. The corn crop stood the continuous rains remarkably well. Crop prospects are equal to 1900 , when WIIliamson county made its record crop, 138,000 bales. <br> Corsicana, May 12.-Until a heavy rain fell. Thursday, farm work was under good headway. Corn was being freed of weeds and grass and cotton planted. The open weather of ten days or two weeks was of great benefit to the farmers and corn and early planted cotton shows great improvement. A great deal of cotton was planted in the time mentioned and this will be benefitted by the rain, which has temporarily stopped work. <br> Ennis, May 12-Crop prospects were never before better here at this season of the year, according to many farmers. They practically all have good stands of corn and cotton, and most of the crops are clean. <br> Brady. May 12 -Outlook is the most promising in three years. Have had good rains. Eighty-five per cent of cotton planted. Cold weather has been a drawback. Oats and wheat good.
