FARMERS GET IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM ASCS

Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, has made the following important announcements:

Compliance determinations on peanuts, feed grain, cotton and diverted acres will begin in the near future. The ASCS office will appreciate your cooperation when the reporter calls at your farm to measure you crops.

If you have diverted acreage, be ready to show the reporter the designated area. Please notify this office at your earliest convenience and identify the area if you do not plan to be at your farm.

Producers participating in the 1966 cotton and feed grain programs who plant cotton and feed grain are reminded that the crop must be planted and treated in a workmanlike manner to be eligible for price support payments.

Cotton producers are reminded that this will be a definite factor in the protection of 1966 cotton history.

Eastland County cotton producers voted 123 to 33 in favor of transferring cotton allot-

ments outside the county for 1967, 1968 and 1969. Transfers may be initiated from June 1 to December 31; however, the 1967 allotments and yields will not be available until September or October.

If you have any questions on how to protect your 1966 history you should contact this office immediately.

Producers who have cotton production records for the years 1963 through 1965 should bring them to this office in order that they may be filed for future production data.

Final date to file an application for a new grower wheat allotment for 1967 is July 1, 1966. To be eligible, a producer must have at least

two years wheat growing experience out of the past five years. He must also receive 50 per cent or more of his current years income from the farm on which the request is made.

Producers who plant other crops in peanuts in less than four row patterns are reminded that the other crop must

be competitive during the entire growing period to be eligible for full deduction.

Third Planted, 6.59 Inches Rain to Date

About one-third of Eastland County's peanut acreage has been planted and the crop is in various stages of progress, including some blooming vines. Everett Martin, Field-man for the ASCS office, reported this week.

The ASCS office presently has six men in the fields measuring planted acreage.

A total of 6.59 inches of rain has watered the land throughout Eastland County during the past week, according to Weather Observer James K. Smith.

Bringing the most rain was Monday, June 13, with 3.80 inches.

Rain vanished Tuesday and Wednesday and began falling again Thursday, with .67 being the days total amount, Mr. Smith said.

Again on Friday, June 17, the clouds opened and began pouring. Total inches for the day was 2.12.

More rain was falling Saturday morning.
