Did you ever see a stalk of oats come up in the middle of the road on the public highway where the horses and as hard as brick? I did, and it was in the spring of, 1910, which was the dryest springs I ever saw.

This stalk grew to be about 21-2 feet high with a head about 15 inches long. It was perfectly green until time for maturity. I had a small patch of oats on my farm the same year.
