"2. New states of convenient size not to exceed four in number, in ad-W. W. Tubb an dfamily have re- mother, Mrs. A. S. Dees, presented her dition to said state of Texas, and havter, by consent of said state, be formed out of the territory thereof, which shall be entitled to admission under the provisions of the Federal Constitution."

This guaranty was included inthe articles of annexation at the instance of the leading men of the Republic of Texas, nearly all of whom had perticipated in the war of independence. Among the leaders in this respect were Thomas J. Rusk, John Hemphfill, Abner S. Lipscomb, J. Pinkney Henderson, H. G. Runnels, Geo. T. Wood, W. B. Ochiltree and others. These patriotic statesmen found that when the vast territory of over 276,000 square miles included in the state became settled up the diverse and antagonistic interests might render it necessary to form compact and homogeneous states out of the territory of Texas.
