In July, 1793, the heat again became intolerable. Vegetables were burned furniture and woodwork of dwelling houses cracked and split and meat became tainted in an hour. The French. revolution was then at the heigth of its bloody carnival and many superstitious people though that the heat following this mighty upheaval was the curse of God.

In 1800 Spain was visited by a sweltering temperature. Madrid and other cities were deserted and the streets became silent. Laborers died in the field.

Another disastrous heat wave swept over Europe in 1851. In the Champs de Mars, Paris, during a military review soldiers by scores fell victims to sun stroke, and at Aldershot, England. men dropped dead while at drill, compelling the officers to suspend the ex-

There are many living who recall the terrible experiences in 1853 in New York and elsewhere. In that year New Orleans was decimated by yellow fever. In New York it appeared as though the city was on fire. The thermometer ranged from 95 to 98 degrees for several days. In that summer the chrystal palace in reservoid square was opened. On the day of the opening the mercury rose to 96 degrees and people fainted in the crowd and fell dead on the street. During, the week 214 persons died from sunstroke in the city.

The summer of 1884 was another hot spell all over the country, but it appeared to have concentrated its fury to the southwest, particularly in the state of iMssouri. According to the statement of an old Missouri pioneer, after the 17th of June that year, not a drop of rain fell during the remainder of the twelve months.

SECOND LEGISLATURE

Re-districting of State and the Appropriation Bill Important Items to be Considered.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 25 .- This is political kite season in Texas, and many a queer craft can be seen floating in the breeze and, lest the grand stand forget, a sky rocket now and then illuminates the horizon; but the signs ablaze in the political skies point to rougher weather.

The investigation goes merrily on, and many a politician is playing hands with the Goddess of Justice by confessing the sins of others. Many antis refuse to recognize the authority of the committee, and a contest to determine its jurisdiction is now on. Three members of the house were arrested Friday and a jail sentence was imposed in one instance, but the committee rescinded the action. The life of the present committee will end on August 30, but a joint committee to continue the probing is contemplated.

The appropriation bill is about ready for the consideration of the governor. As a whole the bill is quite an improvement over any thing of the sort passed in recent years and an examination of its items reveal that our saloons tried to seize the swift horse of progress by the bridle as it passed. Of course there is human nature all through it, and many of the items have had bad light upon them, but the Legislature struck the trail of civilization occasionally. The house today spent the morning session discussing a resolution to bring before the bar of the house Capt. W. J. McDonald, former state ranger CALLED SESSION OF THIRTY. and now sergeant at arms of the Senate investigating committee, and have him adjudged in contempt for arresting members of the House.

Notwithstnding Gov. Colquitt's policy of "legislative peace and political rest," he has thus far submitted twenty subjects for consideration during the present session, and it is said that there are others coming, and this with just ten more working days for the law-makers to make laws.

Thus far not one law has been submitted to the governor for approval. with the exception of the contingent expense bill and the mileage and per diem bill.

The House has already passed the Representative and Senatorial Redistricting bills, but these measures have been given scant, if any, attention in

The Governor is on record as being decidedly opposed to extra sessions. Consequently there is little, if any, chance that he will call the lawmakers back, even if they fail to pass any of the measures submitted.

It is expected that at least a dozen bills will be introduced in the legislature providing for the reapportionment of the congressional districts.

Representative Terrell, of Cherokee county, is among those who have introduced bills on this subject. The two new distrcts are in north central Texas and in central west Texas. The basis of representation is one congressman to every 216,000 population, and nearly all of the districts in this bill come very close to the proper ba-

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


