#### E. MILLER SHOT TO DEATH BY POLICE CHIEF

ABILENE CHIEF OF POLICE JOHN J. CLINTON, SHOOTS TO DEATH E MILLER.

#### SURRENDERS AND GIVES BAIL

Hand to Hand Duel With Six Shooters, Which Resulted Fatally for Miller-Clinton Uniturt.

E. Miller, a sign-painter about sixty-five years of age, is dead. Chief of Police John J. Clinton has waived examining trial and has been released under bail for \$1,000 to await action of grand jury.

A statement from Chief Clinton and testimony from witnesses show conclusively that the death of Miller followed a spectular hand to hand pistol duel in which both parties were firing with the rapidity or lightning. In Miller's revolver, a 38-caliber Smith & Wesson, were found three empty chambers and two cartridges that had snapped. Chief Clinton stated that he fired thrice, once in the air to frighten Miller and twice pointblank at the man.

Chief Clinton came through the duel without a scratch. This was attributed partly to the fact that Miller was not a good marksman and was in a state of intoxication and that the chief, when the firing began, was standing on the second step in the doorway, a good distance below his assailant.

After firing his third shot the chief rushed in and grappled with Miller, bearing him to the floor. Miller's pistol dropped from his grip; he was dy-

After the shooting Chief Clinton requested one of the spectators to telephone for a doctor. Dr. C. M. Cash was summoned and viewed Miller's body. Chief Clinton was then taken Keeble. He was represented by Hardwick & Hardwick, and on the advice of his counsel waived examining trial Justice Keeble fixed his bond at \$1,000 which he readily gave.

Miller was about sixty-five years of age and had been a resident of Abilene for two years, all the time doing sign painting. He was born in Germany, and after serving in the Gershortly before the Civil War. served in the Federal army, and up to the time of his death, drew a pension from the government. He was a widower, but had two sons, Edward and William. "I will begin at the beginning," he said. I had made my usual nightly rounds up-town and had returned to heard noises in the house occupied by Miller, the rear of which is some thirty feet from my house. Mr. Gabaner also heard the noises, and said. 'Our neighbor is using bad language tonight.' I thought that Miller would be come quiet pretty soon, but he kept up his cursing so loud that I could hear him distinctly in my room. I then heard a shot from the building. I thought, Miller is neither hurting himself or firing on someone,' and then I phoned Ben Lasseter and Newton to come to the fire station. When they arrived we walked to the front of Miller's place and rapped on the door. There was no reply. We walked around the building and I hammered on the wall. There was another shot. I jumped to the front door, pulled open the screen and called to him. I heard him coming toward the front of the building firing. I kicked open the door and the shooting commenced. He was within a few feet of me and advancing steadily. I have never seen a more courageous man. I fired once in the air in order to stop him ,but he came on, firing straight at me. I returned the fire, shooting twice, and then grappled with him, bearing him to the floor. He had missed me and I thought I had not touched him, but when I looked at his face I could tell that he was dying. So I told the boys to call a doctor, and later Dr. Cash

The philosophy of the remedies submitted is substantial, but it is going to take hard and personal effort to brign the farmer to a realization of the necessity for changing the system he has fol-

lowed for a lifetime, as did his father before him. If the government will give figures on the consumption of cotton as well as on the production, the farmer who mixes common sense with his seed can profit thereby, and this should be a great help. If, in addition to the benefits from the government figures, he will secure the added advantage of diversification, and hold his cotton after it is baled, eight-cent cotton will no longer be possible.







THE PRICE OF COTTON AND THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

Significant Relation Between Tariff Activity and Lesses of Cotton Growers Arouses the South.

In the appointment of a delegation of cotton growers at the North Caroline state fair recently, with instruc tions to attend the meeting in New Orleans having for its purpose the holding by farmers and others of a considerable proportion of this year's cotton crop and the curtailment of next year's acreage, is to be found one of many indications of dissatisfaction existing over the present political rela tionship to the price of cotton

It is said that President Taft's reci procity campaign and the Underwood tariff bills not only adversely affected general business during the year 1911. but specificall; caused the cotton manufacturers to lose, by shrinkage and decreased volume of trade, between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

Crippled and with a prospect of more tariff agitation in 1912, cotton manufacturers have naturally been unable to make purchases of cotton in the usual way, with the result that, with a full crop, political agitation has created a decline in the price of the staple thus far from 14 cents per pound to 9 cents per pound, with many predictions from well posted quarters that a much lower range will be experienced.

It is further claimed that without the extra session for the discussion of reciprecity the Underwood tariff measures would not have been introduced and in consequence there would have been but little probability that cotton would have declined under the force of a full crop lower than 11 cents per pound instead of registering in price the low water mark for years, as it does today.

The farmers in the south and the manufacturers of cotton generally are charging up a foes on this year's crop of not less than \$175,000,000, which loss they claim is directly traceable to political influence.
