By SCS SERVICE "What are you doing?" This is the question most often asked of a soil scientist. His usual reply is "Making a soil survey."

Land

Start

What is a soil survey? A soil survey is an inventory of land resources. It tells us the kinds of soils, the acreage of each soil and where it is located.

Why are they made?

Soil is our most important natural resuorce. The more we know about it the better we can use and protect it. If your house burns or is blown away, you can build another and possibly better one.

But, if the soil is washed away or is blown away there is no more. The soil that we have now is all there is. No more is being made.

There are some fields that once produced one and onehalf bales of cotton per acre. Some of these same fields now produce only a weak stand of needle grass.

Why is a soil survey being made? It is to help the land owner plan the use of each piece of ground so that it will produce as much for his grandchildren as it does for him.

How is a survey made?

Surveys are made by trained soil scientists. The soil scientist examines the soil by digging holes. He notes the texture, thickness, permeability, color and structure of each layer of soil and the type of material below the soil. When he finds a change in the soil characteristics, he draws a line on an aerial photograph and plots the extent of each soil.

EASTLAND CO. REPRESENTED AT DISTRICT CANCER SOCIETY MEET

The annual meeting of the 21st. District, Texas Division of American Cancer Society was held in the Sands Motel, Abilene, on Thursday, June 16, with state president, Felix Eastland County has more than 60 soils that have been identified. Soils are named for a town, county, stream or a community near the place where the soil was first found. Nimrod and Chaney soils were named in Eastland County.

Who uses Soil Surveys? Soil surveys have many users. In addition to farmers and ranchers, pipeliners can use them to locate the most economical routes. Some soils are deep and easily dug, others are shallow, stony and require blasting.

Highway Department Engineers can use them to locate road gravel and fill material.

City planners can use them in determining size of storm sewers or in zoning for use of septic tanks. Industry uses them to locate building stone and brick material. These jobs can be done without the aid of a soil survey, but by using the survey much time and money can be saved.

Everyone uses or is effected by the use of a soil survey.

A soil survey is now in progress in Eastland County. It is being done on a farm to farm basis when requested. It is being done on larger blocks as time permits. At present, block surveys are being made on the South Fork of the Leon River Watershed.

When the survey of the county is completed it will be published in a book entitled "Soil Survey of Eastland County, Texas". While the survey is in progress, all information that has been collected will be available at the Soil Conservation Service office in Eastland.




Browsing with Bev

To store honey — Keep liquid honey in a dry place. Freezing does not injure the color or flavor but may hasten granulation. Avoid damp places for storing honey as it has the property of absorbing and retaining moisture. Do not put honey in the refrigerator. Crystallized honey is just as good as liquid honey.

To dry the air in closets and other small areas, keep a small electric light burning. The heat from the lamp will be enough to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. Or you can place a small electric heater in a large closet. Use with extreme care and be sure that the heater is a sufficient distance from anything that will burn.


A much safer way to keep a closet dry is with silica gel or activated alumina. These chemicals will absorb the moisture in the air. Hang them in a cloth bag from the closet rod, or put them of a shelf or floor. The chemicals can be used repeatedly. Simply dry them in a vented oven at 300 degrees F. for several hours.

Browsing With Bev IT'S TIME TO STORE

WINTER CLOTHES Now that spring is here, it's

time to store winter clothes. Special attention should be given to your wol and mohair garments.

Store only clean garments. Spots and stains will be harder to remove — or they may not come out at all — a year later. Moth larvae are at-tracted more to soiled clothing. Send the soiled garments to a good dry cleaner and call his attention to any spots and stains.

Besides dry cleaning brush-ing and sunning garments will also help rid clothing of moths including their eggs and lar-vae. Brush thoroughly, es-pecially in seams, folds and pockets. For added protection, store your clothing with "moth balls," - paradichlorobenzene crystals, or naphthalene flakes or crystals. Directions on the container suggest the amount to use.

It is a good idea to remove plastic buttons, buckles and other plastic ornaments before storing. Avoid using plastic hangers, which may cause a stain or melt into the fabric. If space is available, store hangable garments in garment bags on rust-proof hangars.

Put sweaters and other knitted garments in bags or boxes. Tightly-wrapped paper packages, air-tight boxes or chests, or garment bags are the best storage places. Cedar chests are old favorites for winter clothing storage, but all garments must be mothfree before they are put into a cedar chest. Cedar oil va-por does kill small moth lar-

vae but not older, larger ones. As a cedar chest gets older, however, there is less cedar oil vapor. Therefore, a cedar chest that is several years old may give no more protection than any other air-tight conainer.
