Where's the pork?

A Deming, N.M., woman who went looking for her family's missing pet pig says she found it — as the main course at a neighborhood barbecue.

Sadie Emerson said she and her 3-year-old son drove up and down their neighborhood streets looking for the Vietnamese potbellied pig, Tiny Boo.

They spotted a group of people having a party near a mobile home, and on the table was a mound of meat that turned out to be Tiny Boo.

The mobile-home owner told sheriff's deputies he shot the pig with a rifle after the animal tried to attack him. He has been accused of cruelty to animals and is scheduled to appear in court.

Some-bunny's in trouble

One man's overwhelming desire for a chocolate bunny could cost him much more than the confection's price.

Forest Acres, S.C., police (near Columbia) arrested a man and charged him with shoplifting at a mall department store after store employees accused him of taking a Godiva chocolate Easter bunny into a dressing room and eating it. Store officials said they found an empty wrapper.

If convicted, the 18-year-old man could be fined \$895 for the theft of the \$9 treat.

Warning potential speeders

Curtis Ketcher of Watts, Okla., says the police go too far when it comes to stopping speeders.

April 10 — In 1722, the Spaniards establish one of their earliest Texas outposts, Mission Nuestra Señora del Espíritu Santo, near the presidio of Nuestra Señora de Loreto on Matagorda Bay. Four years later, it is moved 25 miles inland to Victoria, and 23 years after that to Goliad, where it figures prominently in Texas history for many years.

Filing at last minute? CPAs advise an extension

To anyone who is scrambling to file an income tax return now: The Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants recommends filing for an extension.

CPAs point out that in most cases, taxpayers will benefit more from applying for an automatic extension than by submitting a hastily

prepared return that may contain errors.

There is no stigma attached to requesting an extension of time to file a return. In fact, about 5 million taxpayers file for an extension every April.

Filing an extension does not increase the chances of an IRS audit, either. The IRS is primarily con-

cerned that each filer is paying the correct amount of tax, regardless of whether an extension is filed.

Requesting an automatic extension is relatively simple. The taxpayer must complete Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return, and file it by April 17, along with pay-

ment of any tax estimated to be due for the year.

There is no requirement to provide the IRS with any reasons for requesting the extension, and the filing will automatically extend the tax-filing deadline for four months to Aug. 15.

The form must be sent to the IRS Center where the return is to be filed.

If, for some reason, the extended deadline of Aug. 15 for cannot be met, the taxpayer can request an additional extension.

Unlike the request for the initial extension, though, this request must include a good reason for an extension.

The reason must be stated in a letter to the IRS or in Form 2688. CPAs point out that taxpayers must file Form 4868 before either filing Form 2688 or writing a letter seeking more time, except in cases of undue hardship.

An important fact to remember when filing for an extension is that taxes still must be paid by the original April 17 deadline. If they are not paid by this deadline, the taxpayer will owe interest on the unpaid tax

and may be charged penalties.

The IRS charges a late-payment penalty of .5 percent per month or part of a month on any tax not paid by the regular due date.

Anyone who cannot afford to pay the taxes due by April 17 you request a reasonable extension of time to pay the tax by submitting Form 1127 to the IRS along with documentation that demonstrates why the tax liability cannot be met on time.

The taxpayer must show a lack of cash, assets or the financial ability to get a loan to pay the taxes.

If one of the taxpayer's assets is a home, there must be evidence to show that the sale of the house would be at a sacrifice price and cause a financial hardship.

Even if the taxes cannot be paid, do not delay filing the return. A late-filing penalty

is usually charged if your return is filed after the due date. It is usually 5 percent of the tax not paid by the regular due date for each month or part of a month that the return is late.

The is late. The penalty for filing late is 10 times as great as the penalty for paying late.

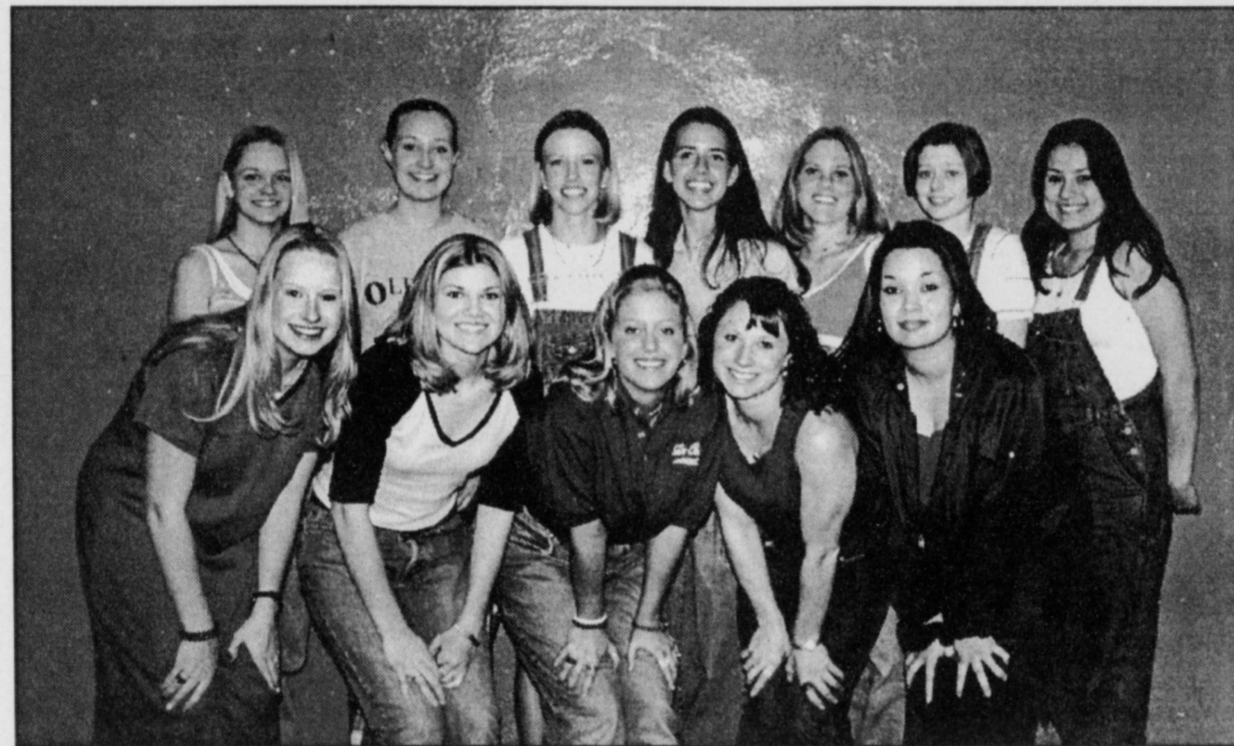

"Doc, I've got a calvy heifer in need of your veterinary expertise."

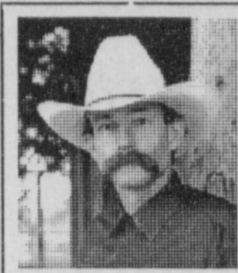
Roger looked out the exam room window at the dark clouds on that chilly Kansas afternoon.

Members approved a proposal to buy a ticket to the chamber banquet for President Peggie Bruton.

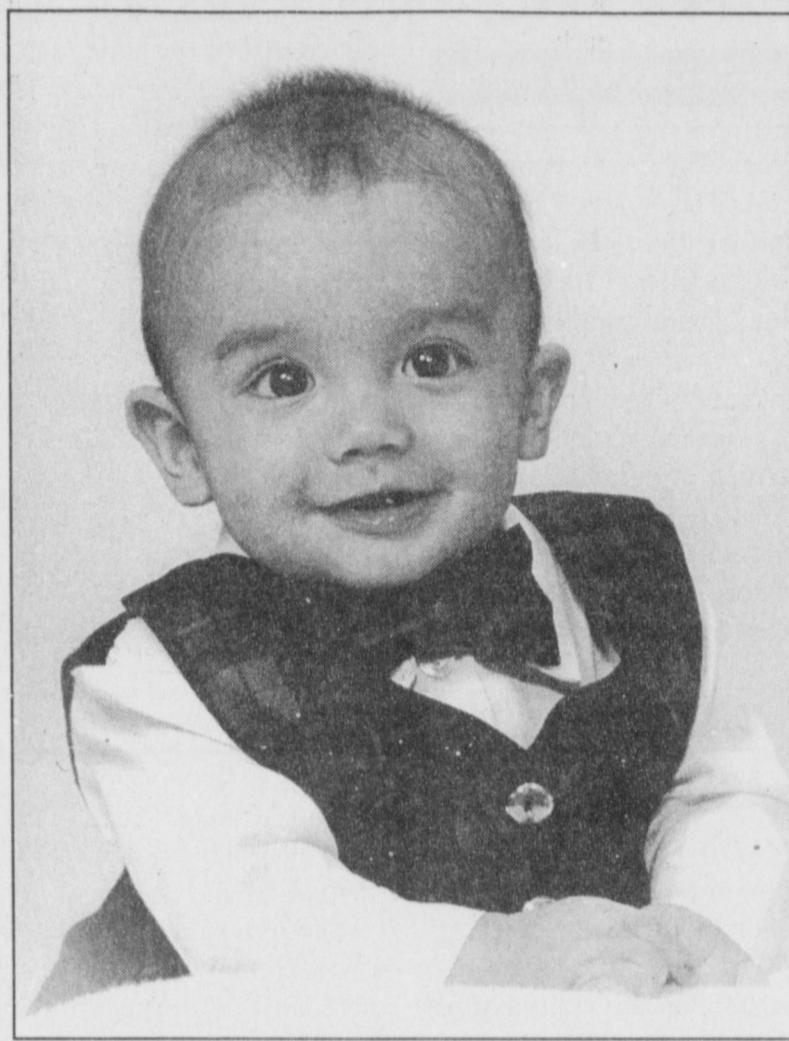

Africanized bees reach Fort Worth

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL COLLEGE STATION — Tarrant County (Fort Worth) has been added to the state quarantine restricting the movement of commercial bee operations.

The move follows the detection of Africanized honey bees in the county.

The addition makes 120 counties (out of 254) in Texas now quarantined for Africanized honey bees, according to Paul Jackson, chief inspector for the Texas Apiary Inspection Service, a unit of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Bees were collected from a tree by a Girl Scout camp near Pelican Bay in the northwestern part of Tarrant

County. The hive apparently had been there several months.

"Samples were collected and sent to Texas A&M's Honey Bee Identification Lab where they were confirmed as Africanized," Jackson said.

"Apiary inspectors were sent . . . to investigate the circumstances, and to determine whether the Africanized honey bees had gotten to those counties through natural migration or through some type of human-assisted action," he added.

In both cases, it was determined that the bees had arrived on their own, Jackson explained, so the quarantine was expanded.

Chromosome responsible for cardiac disease found

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL HOUSTON — The chromosome that houses a gene responsible for sudden death has been identified, bringing physicians closer to developing a tool for early diagnosis.

Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston recently narrowed down the location of the gene responsible for arrhythmogenic right-ventricular dysplasia to Chromosome 10.

"Making a genetic diagnosis of this disease is particularly helpful because often the first and only event is sudden death," said Dr. Robert Roberts, Baylor professor of cardiology and the study's principal investigator. "Conventional diagnostic techniques, such as echocardiograms and cardiac catheterization, are very insensitive and extremely inadequate."

In patients with ARVD,

healthy heart tissue in the right ventricle is replaced by fatty tissue and scar tissue. The disease accounts for more than 17 percent of sudden death cases in young people in the United States.

The Baylor study examined a 47-member, five-generation family with a history of ARVD. DNA was extracted from 40 living individuals. Postmortem exams were also conducted. Researchers then genotyped DNA markers and analyzed them for a genetic link. The results traced the gene responsible for the disease to Chromosome 10.

"In order to perform genetic screening or to develop better therapies, you must locate the gene and clone it," Roberts said.

Through the genetic samples and clinical evaluations, researchers diagnosed ARVD in 10 of the living individuals. ARVD was confirmed in two deceased family members who had died suddenly.

Researchers also determined that ARVD is autosomal-dominant. That means only one bad

copy of the gene, which is not on a sex chromosome, is needed to inherit the disease. In the family studied, eight of the 12 affected individuals were male.

Once the gene is located, it will be possible for physicians to screen family members for ARVD with a single blood sample.

The Africanized bee was first detected entering the United States near Brownsville in October 1990. Since then, the bee has spread through much of the state, along a line roughly from south of Houston to south of Lubbock to El Paso.

Africanized honey bees also have been found in Arizona, California and New Mexico.

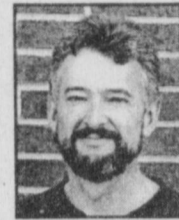
We Really Shouldn't "Bomb the Weary"!

State suing Stephenville School Board

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General John Cornyn filed suit last month against Stephenville Independent School District for violating the Texas Public Information Act.

Cornyn is seeking a court order to compel the school district to release certain public information "without any editing."

Cornyn's office earlier had ruled that the information was public. The lawsuit alleges that the school district intentionally violated the ruling.

The case began when a citizen requested a copy of some of the school district's legal bills. The district wanted to withhold the information under exceptions to the Texas Public Information Act, including the attorney-client privilege.

Under the act, the district had the right to appeal the ruling within 30 days but chose not to do so.

The lawsuit alleges that instead of appealing the ruling, the school district chose to black out some of the names and other key terms in the bills before releasing the documents.

"The newspapers of Texas strongly support the attorney general's effort to hold governmental bodies accountable to the people of Texas," said Donniss Baggett, chairman of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association/Texas Press Association Legislative Advisory Committee.

"Too many of our governmental bodies have taken the position that they are the owners of the information they possess.

"It's refreshing to see the attorney general take the position that the citizen, not the government, is the rightful owner of this information," Baggett said.

Hearing set



The U.S. Supreme Court will hear the school-prayer case, *Doe v. Santa Fe Independent School District* on March 29.

"I believe allowing the state of Texas to present arguments will strengthen and add to those presented by the Santa Fe ISD, said Attorney General Cornyn, who will represent the school district.

"Asking the government to supervise religious speech is clearly unconstitutional, and I will protect Texas' position in this case," he added.

The school district's policy allows the student body to choose by secret ballot whether to have a student message during pregame ceremonies at home varsity football games. That message may or may not include a prayer in the discretion of the student.

In February 1999, the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans held that the school district's policy violated the establishment clause of the First Amendment.

Although the Fifth Circuit held that the schools could allow students to deliver prayers at graduation as long as they are nonsectarian and nonproselytizing, the court ruled that student-initiated prayers are never permissible at school-sponsored football games.

Cornyn filed a "friend of the court" brief with the U.S. Su-

preme Court supporting the rights of students to gather in prayer, and now the high court is hearing the case.

Other highlights

- Byron M. Tunnell, 64th speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, died March 7 at his Lake Palestine home after a long battle with cancer. He was 74.

A Democrat, Tunnell was elected in 1957 to represent Smith and Gregg counties in the House. In 1963 he was elected speaker during his fourth consecutive term. He was re-elected in 1964, but before the Legislature convened, then-Gov. John Connally appointed him to a vacancy on the Texas Railroad Commission.

- Gov. George W. Bush is studying a request to remove

an image of the Confederate battle flag from the Texas Supreme Court building.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has called for its removal, saying the plaque bearing the flag is offensive to minorities and does not belong in the state's highest courts.

- The Texas Department of Health will award almost \$500,000 in tobacco settlement money to schools and community groups throughout the state, to pay for projects to prevent or reduce tobacco use or protect the public from secondhand smoke. The agency expects to award 100 grants through a competitive selection process. The maximum amount of each grant will be \$4,999.

Texas Independence Day continues to resonate today

March 2 was a special day for Texans. It is a day that fills our hearts with pride, and it is a day for remembering what we owe to those who went before us.

On that day, 162 years ago, a solemn convention of 54 men met in the small settlement of Washington-on-the-Brazos to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence.

The declaration stated: "We, therefore . . . do hereby resolve and declare . . . that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic . . ."

At the time, Texas was a remote territory of Mexico, hospitable only to the bravest and most determined of settlers. After declaring their independence, the founding delegates quickly wrote a constitution for the newborn republic and organized an interim government.

My great-great grandfather, Charles S. Taylor, was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

As was the case when the American Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776, our declaration only pointed the way toward a goal, the price of which was enormous effort and great sacrifice.

While the convention sat in Washington-on-the-Brazos, 6,000 Mexican troops were marching on the Alamo to challenge the new republic.

Several days earlier, from the Alamo, Col. William Travis sent his immortal letter to the people

who never forget what is due to his own honor and that of his country — Victory or Death. William Barret Travis, Lt. Col., Commander."

of Texas — and to all Americans. He knew the Mexican Army was approaching, and he knew that he had only a very few men at arms to help defend the San Antonio fortress.

Travis wrote: "Fellow citizens and compatriots: I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna — I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man — the enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion; otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken — I have answered the demands with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the wall — I shall never surrender or retreat.

"Then, I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch.

"The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier

What American, Texan or otherwise, can fail to be stirred by Travis' resolve?

In the battle that followed, 184 brave men died in the heroic but vain attempt to fend off Santa Anna's overwhelming army.

But the Alamo was crucial. Because those heroes at the Alamo held out for so long, Santa Anna's forces were battered and diminished.

Gen. Sam Houston gained the time he needed to muster his forces and devise a strategy to defeat Santa Anna at the Battle of San Jacinto on April 21, 1836.

The Lone Star was visible on the horizon at last.

We Texans continue to commemorate the heroic times during which we won our independence, existed as a republic and finally joined the Union.

Each year on March 2, I read Travis' letter to my colleagues in the U.S. Senate to remind them — and all of us — of the pride Texans share in their history, and in being the only state that came into the Union as a republic.

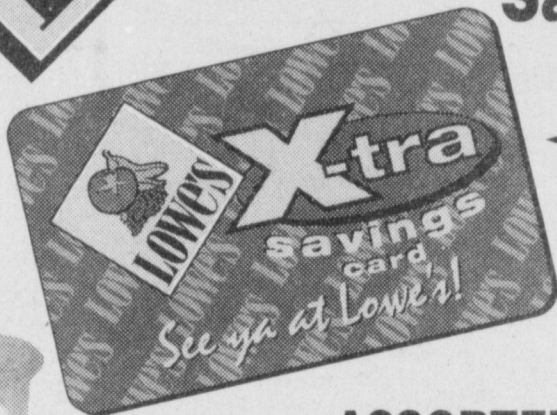

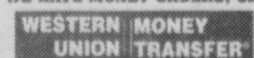
