Filing at last minute? CPAs advise an extension

To anyone who is scrambling to file an income tax return now: The Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants recommends filing for an extension.

CPAs point out that in most cases, taxpayers will benefit more from applying for an automatic extension than by submitting a hastily

prepared return that may contain errors. There is no stigma attached to requesting an extension of time to

file a return. In fact, about 5 million taxpayers file for an extension every April.

Filing an extension does not increase the chances of an IRS audit, either. The IRS is primarily concerned that each filer is paying the correct amount of tax, regardless of whether an extension is filed.

Requesting an automatic extension is relatively simple. The taxpayer must complete Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return, and file it by April 17, along with payment of any tax estimated to be due for the year.

There is no requirement to provide the IRS with any reasons for requesting the extension, and the filing will automatically extend the tax-filing deadline for four months to Aug. 15.



The form must be sent to the IRS Center where the return is to be filed.

If, for some reason, the extended deadline of Aug. 15 for cannot be met, the taxpayer can request an additional extension.

Unlike the request for the initial extension, though, this request must include a good reason for an extension.

The reason must be stated in a letter to the IRS or in Form 2688. CPAs point out that taxpayers must file Form 4868 before either filing Form 2688 or writing a letter seeking more time, except in cases of undue to pay the taxes. hardship.

An important fact to remember when filing for an extension is that taxes still must be paid by the original April 17 deadline. If they are not paid by this deadline, the taxpayer will owe interest on the unpaid tax

and may be charged penalties.

The IRS charges a latepayment penalty of .5 percent per month or part of a month on any tax not paid by the regular due date.

Anyone who cannot afford to pay the taxes due by April 17 you request a reasonable extension of time to pay the tax by submitting Form 1127 to the IRS along with documentation that demonstrates why the tax liability cannot be met on time.

The taxpayer must show a lack of cash, assets or the financial ability to get a loan

If one of the taxpayer's assets is a home, there must be evidence to show that the sale of the house would be at a sacrifice price and cause a financial hardship.

Even if the taxes cannot be paid, do not delay filing the return. A late-filing penalty is usually charged if your return is filed after the due date. It is usually 5 percent of the tax not paid by the regular due date for each month or part of a month that the return is late.

The is late. The penalty for filing late is 10 times as great as the penalty for paying late.







SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL HOUSTON - The chromosome that houses a gene responsible for sudden death has been identified, bringing physicians closer to developing a tool for early diagnosis.

Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston recently narrowed down the location of the gene responsible for arrhythmogenic right-ventricular dysplasia to Chromosome 10.

"Making a genetic diagnosis of this disease is particularly helpful because often the first and only event is sudden death," said Dr. Robert Roberts, Baylor professor of cardiology and the study's principal investigator. 



M ost of us have had occasion to chuckle a bit about the childish misimpressions we once had about some church music.

Did you ever as a child sing the chorus of "Blessed Hour of Prayer" where prayer is called a "balm for the weary" and wonder what was wrong with the weary that a bombing would really help? Perhaps your kids have sung



"Count Your Blessings" and have wondered, what is so tough about being tossed around on "life's pillows"? ("Billows" are tougher!)

My funny bone may be somewhat weird, but I still can't sing "Let angels prostrate fall . . ." without reminding myself that, properly spelled, those words don't refer to a medical condition.

The funniest anecdote I've heard lately actually happened recently in a Muleshoe church (and, believe me, I'm not poking fun; it could have happened at any of our churches!) when, following an excellent sermon against premarital sex, the invitation song was "Oh, Why Not Tonight?"

Yes, as a child I had some musical misimpressions, but I knew what I liked. In my child's

mind there was no theological problem with the words of a song, no shoddiness in poetry, that a good bass or alto lead wouldn't cure. My favorite songs were "I Know That My Redeemer Lives" (the version with the bass booming in at the second measure) and "Watching You" which pictured God as an "all-seeing eye watching you." I wasn't old enough yet to have tried smoking a sooty old pipe behind the house or that thought would have been less comforting! (Some kids smoked dry leaves; my little brother and I tried pencil shavings. It was a truly hot smoke-and a truly stupid idea!) In any case, my parents have told of my parading through the house loudly intoning, "Otching ooh!"

High on my list was the old spiritual, "On the Jericho Road." Remember how it went? On the Jericho Road, / There's room for just two, / No more and no less, / Just Jesus and you . . .

I remembered that old song when I read author Vernon C. Grounds' comment, "If that song is right, we had better get off the Jericho Road. That is not the highway to glory because, as the New Testament repeatedly discloses, the glory highway is broad enough to allow all of God's people to march along together. Side by side."

Cornyn is seeking a court order to compel the school district to release certain public information "without any editing."

Cornyn's office earlier had ruled that the information was public. The lawsuit alleges that the school district intentionally violated the ruling.

The case began when a citizen requested a copy of some of the school district's legal bills. The district wanted to withhold the information under exceptions to the Texas Public Information Act, including the attorney-client privilege.

Under the act, the district had the right to appeal the ruling within 30 days but chose not to do so.

The lawsuit alleges that instead of appealing the ruling, the school district chose to black out some of the names and other key terms in the bills before releasing the documents.

"The newspapers of Texas strongly support the attorney general's effort to hold governmental bodies accountable to the people of Texas," said Donnis Baggett, chairman of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association/Texas Press Association Legislative Advisory Committee.

"Too many of our governmental bodies have taken the position that they are the owners of the information they possess.

"It's refreshing to see the attorney general take the position that the citizen, not the government, is the rightful owner of this information," Baggett said.

Hearing set

The U.S. Supreme Court will hear the school-prayer case, Doe v. Santa Fe Independent School District on March 29.

"I believe allowing the state of Texas to present arguments will strengthen and add to those presented by the Santa Fe ISD, said Attorney General Cornyn, who will represent the school district.

"Asking the government to supervise religious speech is clearly unconstitutional, and I will protect Texas' position in this case," he added.

The school district's policy allows the student body to choose by secret ballot whether to have a student message during pregame ceremonies at home varsity football games. That message may or may not include a prayer in the discretion of the student.

In February 1999, the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans held that the school district's policy violated the establishment clause of the First Amendment.

Although the Fifth Circuit held that the schools could allow students to deliver prayers at graduation as long as they are nonsectarian and nonproselytizing, the court ruled that student-initiated prayers are never permissible at school-sponsored football games.



Texas Independence Day continues to resonate today

March 2 was a special day for Texans. It is a day that fills our hearts with pride, and it is a day for remembering what we owe to those who went before us.

On that day, 162 years ago, a solemn convention of 54 men met in the small settlement of Washington-on-the-Brazos to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence.

The declaration stated:

"We, therefore . . . do hereby resolve and declare . . . that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic . . ."

At the time, Texas was a remote territory of Mexico, hospitable only to the bravest and most determined of settlers. After declaring their independence, the founding delegates quickly wrote a constitution for the newborn republic and organized an interim government.

My great-great grandfather, Charles S. Taylor, was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

As was the case when the American Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776, our declaration only pointed the way toward a goal, the price of which was enormous effort and great sacrifice.

While the convention sat in Washington-on-the-Brazos, 6,000 Mexican troops were marching on the Alamo to challenge the new republic.

Several days earlier, from the Alamo, Col. William Travis sent his immortal letter to the people



of Texas - and to all Americans. He knew the Mexican Army was approaching, and he knew that he had only a very few men at arms to help defend the San Antonio fortress.

Travis wrote:

"Fellow citizens and compatriots: I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna - I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man - the enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion; otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken -I have answered the demands with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the wall - I shall never surrender or the horizon at last. retreat.

"Then, I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch.

"The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier

who never forget what is due to his own honor and that of his country --- Victory or Death. William Barret Travis, Lt.

Col., Commander.

What American, Texan or otherwise, can fail to be stirred by Travis' resolve?

In the battle that followed, 184 brave men died in the heroic but vain attempt to fend off Santa Anna's overwhelming army.

But the Alamo was crucial. Because those heroes at the Alamo held out for so long. Santa Anna's forces were battered and diminished.

Gen. Sam Houston gained the time he needed to muster his forces and devise a strategy to defeat Santa Anna at the Battle of San Jacinto on April 21, 1836.

The Lone Star was visible on

We Texans continue to commemorate the heroic times during which we won our independence, existed as a republic and finally joined the Union.

Each year on March 2, I read Travis' letter to my colleagues in the U.S. Senate to remind them — and all of us — of the pride Texans share in their history, and in being the only state that came into the Union as a republic.
