





DOCTOR JOEL WESTERN PEARSON.

Died, at Hot Springs, Ark., October 24th, 1913, Dr. Joel Western Pearson. at the age of 71 years.

Dr. Pearson was born at the Manor House at Bunker Hill, in Fairfield county, South Carolina, close to the little village of Monticello, where he rew to manhood, being educated at the old Jefferson Academy, an institution of learning founded by his grandfather, Phillip P. Pearson and Thomas Jefferson. On the completion of his education at the Academy, he was appointed to the naval academy at Anapolis, Md., where he had presented himself to enter upon his duties, when his native state, South Carolina, passed the ordinance of secession, when he went home and enlisted in Company I commanded by John Bunyan Davis, which was attached to the first South Carolina regiment, commanded by Col. Maxey Gregg, who was afterwards killed near Hamilton Crossing, near

Dr. Pearson was later elected lieutenant of his company and served as such till the close of the war, when he studied medicine, graduating at Philadelphia. After his graduation in medicine, Dr. Pearson returned to Fairfield, S. C. having married Miss Georgia Anna Mann of Gordonsville, Va., in the meantime, where he began the practice of his profession, and later moved to Saluta, S. C., where he farmed and practiced medicine until 1876. when he came to Texas, locating at Richmond, Fort Bend county. Later he came to West Texas, then the western frontier, and located at Buffalo Gap in Taylor county, about the year 1878, where he built up a good practice; later still, he came on west with the building of the Texas & Pacific rail road, and located in Colorado.
