EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE.

Postmaster, J. W. Person informs us that extensive and much needed improvements will soon be made in the equipment and arrangement of the postoffice. Just as soon as the new lease has been approved by the Department, this work will begin. The entire south half of the building has been secured and the partition will be torn out and a hallway will extend from near the front, to the back wall. Four hundred combination lock boxes of the latest design and of the greatest safety will be installed along this hallway or lobby, and the working quarters of the office will be on the south side of the building, giving the force much more room and light than they now enjoy.

When all these improvements have been made, Colorado will have an up-to-date postoffice in all the name implies. Mr. Person and his force of assistants have gotten the work and routine of the office at their fingers' end, and everything proceeds as smoothly and as satisfactorily as if they had always been incumbents. By the new arrangement, one great source of vexation and annoyance to both postmaster and box-renter, will be eliminated. There will be no lost keys or requests to "please open my box from the inside; I left my postoffice key at home or lost it."

MITCHELL COUNTY CASES PASSED UPON.

In the court of criminal appeals at Austin, last week, the case of Jim Dawson and W. T. King were passed upon. A motion for rehearing in the Jim Dawson case was overruled while the case of W. T. King was disposed of "on brief for the state." The King case was taken up from Howard county, to which county it was changed from Mitchell. The presumption now is, that both of these defendants will accept this finding of the superior court and begin serving their respective terms. In his first trial in this county, King was given eight years in the penitentiary, but on second trial in Howard county, he was given only 3. Jim Dawson's last sentence was for three which he will likely now have to serve.

A TRAGIC EXAMPLE.

Hardly had last week's issue of the Record been distributed to its readers, warning parents against giving their boys target rifles and pistols for Christmas presents, as well as containing an account of the shooting of the Hanley boy with a target rifle in the hands of his brother, when another and far more deplorable and tragic warning occurred at the Hammond home in the Union community.

As nearly as the Record has been able to learn of the accident, two of the Hammond children—one aged about nine years and the other older, were together near their home playing with a target rifle. The rifle was in the hands of the older boy when discharged, the bullet striking the little fellow.

Drs. Rathoff and Smith were immediately summoned and did all that surgical and medical skill could do, to save the little fellow's life, but the target rifle had done its deadly work, he was beyond relief. He died soon after the arrival of the doctors.

Thus, another life is snuffed out, another home saddened by placing death-dealing fire arms in the hands of young boys.
