LAND OWNERS GET 20 YEARS TO PAY

MORE MONEY FOR WORK IN WEST
Over \$2,500,000 Set Aside for Further Work on the Elephant Butte Project; Big Sum Also for Salt River, Hondo and Carlisbad Projects Farmers Have Five Years After Making First Payment

Washington, D. C. Jan. 31.—No payment to the government for five years after water is turned on, except an initial payment of 5 per cent, extension of the term of repayment to 20 years instead of 10 as now, these are the salient features of a measure to be introduced in both houses of congress simultaneously, under agreement between the house and senate leaders and the secretary of the interior. The passage of the bill in substantially the shape proposed is assured.

Millions for this Section at Once.
Further, secretary Lane today instructed the reclamation commission to hasten the construction of projects now under way, especially the Rio Grande project including the Elephant Butte storage works and distribution system from Elephant Butte, N. M., to Fabens, Tex., for which \$2,683,000 additional is ordered set aside; the Salt River project in Arizona \$99,846 additional; the Laguna project, near Yuma, Ariz. \$831,126, additional; the Carlisbad and Hondo projects near Carlisbad, N. M. \$304,000 additional.

Preliminary investigations and inauguration of new reclamation enterprises will involve an expenditure of \$10,000 on the Pecos river in Texas and New Mexico, and \$150,000 for exploration of the Colorado river basin as to water storage and diversion sites.

A more Liberal Policy.
Secretary Lane, after a series of conferences with chairman Smith of the house committee on reclamation, chairman Mark Smith, of the senate committee, and senators and representatives from irrigation states, announced that "a more liberal policy shall be pursued toward the settlers on reclamation projects than heretofore."

It is the declared policy of the administration to place the prosperity and development of the government reclamation projects beyond the possibility of failure or setback.

EMBARGO ON ARMS TO MEXICO WILL BE RAISED

PRESIDENT WILSON ARRIVES AT THIS DECISION TODAY

Order Has Been Sent to O'Shaughnessy—American Charge d'Affaires Told to Notify Huerta, Constitutional Agent at Washington Declare End of War in Sight.

Washington, Feb. 3.—President Wilson today decided to lift the embargo on the exportation of arms into Mexico and gives both factions the right to get from the United States whatever ammunition and arms they may need.

The proclamation barring the exportation was issued by former President Taft under authority of the Joint Congressional resolution, empowering the president to take such action whenever he found "in any American country conditions of violence to exist which are promoted by the use of munitions of war procured in the United States."

Convinced Partially Shown Huerta

It is believed that President Wilson finally decided to lift the embargo when he became convinced that the embargo was not showing neutrality, but partiality, as Huerta was able to get ammunition and supplies in abundance from abroad, while the Constitutionalists, having no seaports, could get them only from the United States by means of smuggling which had been prohibited and which had them open to serious danger of arrest.

End of War in Sight.

There was great rejoicing among the Constitutional agent here today when they were apprised of President Wilson's action. They declared that they could see the end of war in Mexico, and that it was their belief that the Rebels would soon have the Government into their hands. They believe that a constitutional government will be set up in Mexico within only a few months time, and that the country will again see prosperous times, and warfare forever ceased.

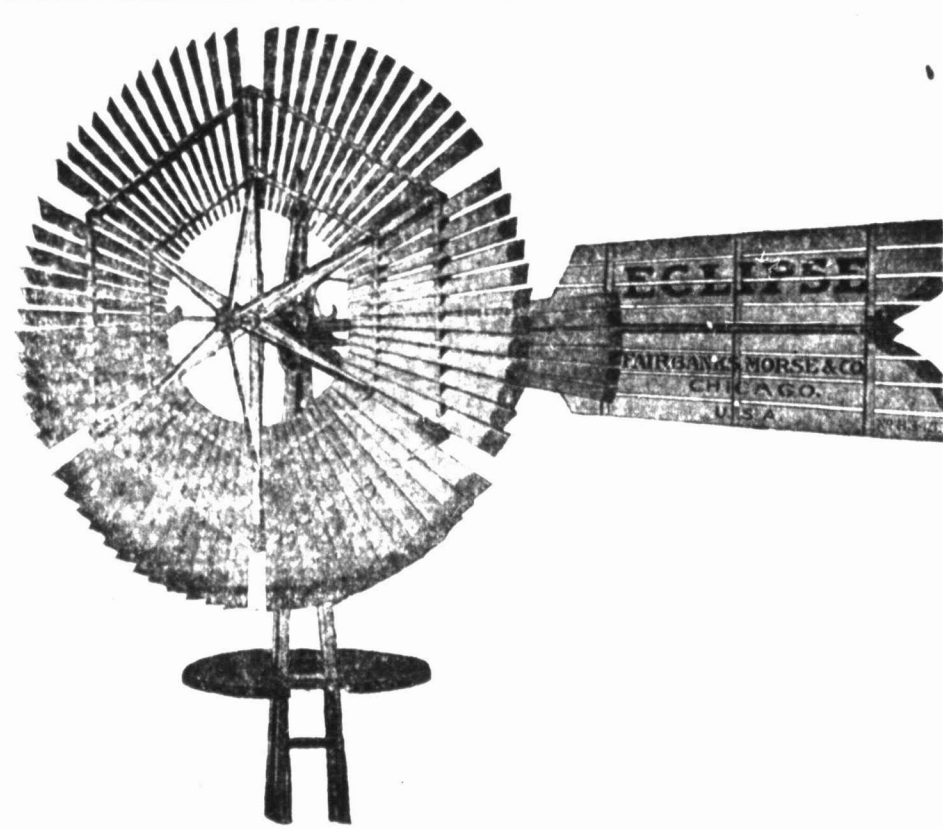
SURVEY FOR BRIDGE LOCATION

NEW BOOZE BILL FRAMED AS CURB TO MANUFACTURE

Washington, Jan. 31.—Representative Horace Vaughan today introduced a bill in the house which is calculated to start the prohibition agitation anew in congress, although he declares he has no intention of placing the Democratic party in an embarrassing position on the eve of a congressional campaign.

The bill is designated to prohibit the issuance of a federal liquor license in dry territory. It requires a specific description of the place where the liquor is to be sold and the applicant is required to prove that he is not forbidden by any law in force in the locality where the business is to be located from engaging in such business and must accompany his application with evidence that the local authorities have granted permission to engage in the liquor business.

PROHIBITION MASS MEETING

It now seems that the Prohibitionists of Texas will be successful in their elimination plans and that but one candidate will come before the July primaries who favors prohibition with any chance for success. The action of Lieutenant Governor Will H. Mayes in signifying his willingness to abide the results of the Fort Worth meeting virtually settled the question of the number of candidates who will be in the race who favor prohibition. Mr. Lane may hold out and continue in the race, but if he should in the face of the almost unanimous sentiment that now prevails in the ranks of the prohibition democrats, regarding the wisdom of the elimination plan, we believe he will receive a very small vote, for the vast majority of the Prohibitionists will endorse the action of the Fort Worth meeting.

The Mitchell county mass meeting is to be held in Colorado on Saturday Feb. 14th at the Court House and will likely be largely attended. Delegates to Fort Worth may be instructed or may be sent uninstructed. 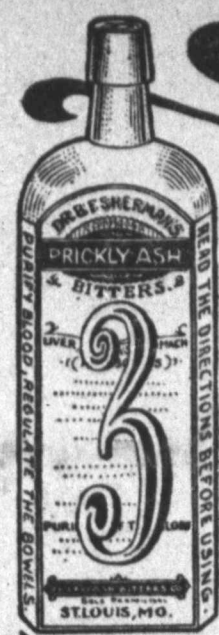

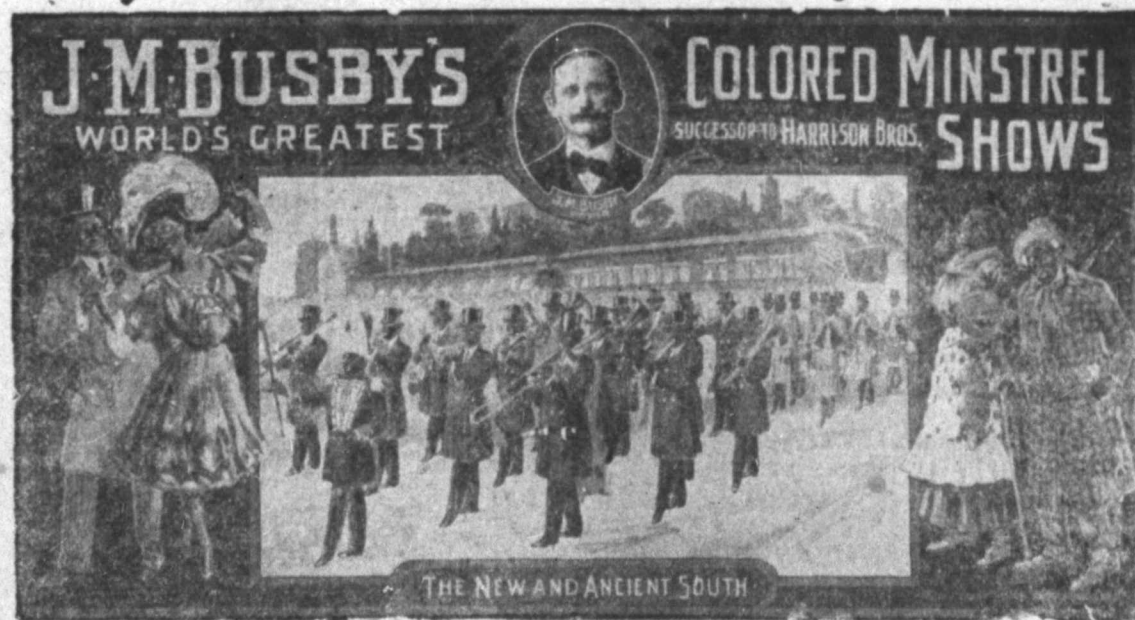

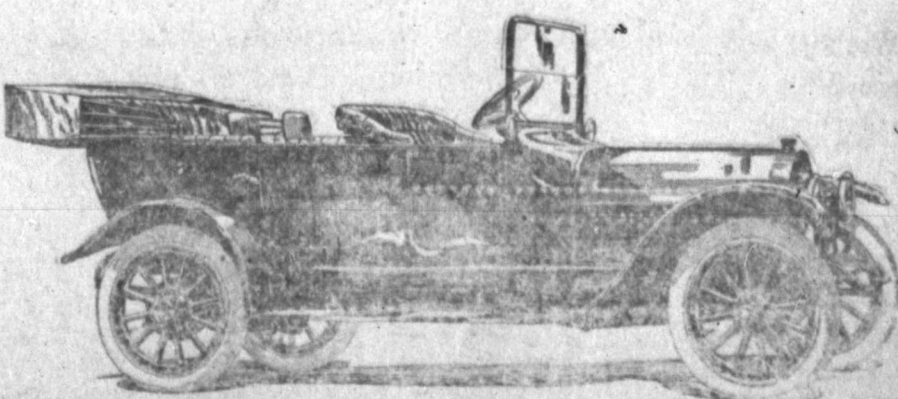

ELECTRIC POWER FOR ELM FARMS MAY BE PUT IN

Light Company Dallas Representative And Others Figure on Deal.

Efforts to interest farmers along Elm creek for a distance of eight or ten miles to take electricity for operation of irrigation pumps to be installed will be made at once by the General West Texas Irrigation Association in conjunction with the local electric company and J. A. Ritter of Dallas representing the Southwestern General Electric Company, who arrived in this city this morning.

A visit will be made by J. B. McCauley, a representative of the local electric company, J. A. Ritter and Fred T. Wood. Many of the farmers along the stream have already expressed themselves as desirous of using electricity in preference to gas engines on account of the economical cost of the former and its reliability in every instance. If a sufficient number of farmers can be induced to take electricity the local electric company will figure out the cost of construction of an electric power line and at once begin construction of same. If the committee is successful along Elm creek, an effort will be made to put in a line along Cedar creek where a number of farms will be irrigated during the year.

Mr. J. A. Ritter was in the city today on this particular business and will remain here until he learns conditions. His company is one of the largest in the state and has offices in Dallas, Houston, El Paso, Oklahoma City. He makes his headquarters in Dallas. The make of his motors is excellent and stand the test every where.

It is figured that if a sufficient number of farmers will take electricity a nominal rate can be made to them which will be cheaper than

could be afforded by gas engines—Ablene Reporter.

As soon as the high power cable is built into Colorado an effort will be made to run a line up and down the river and motor pumps installed for irrigation. Several farmers have already agreed to install motors, for their silos, lights and pumping purposes.

MISSIONARY COLUMN.

Beginning with this issue, the Record will furnish its readers, each week, a column of the latest Missionary news: This news will be concerning the Missionary work of all the different denominations, and from all the different countries where Christian Missionaries are at work, therefore should be read by every one, especially all the members of all the churches.

In Judson's Day.

When Adoniram and Ann Hasseltine Judson left their home to go as missionaries to Burma, things were very different from what missionaries find them now—Judson was considered a fanatic, and no woman had ever before left America to go as a missionary to the heathen.

The following account of their difficulties in learning the language is interesting:

"Those who have acquired a modern European language with the aid of grammars, dictionaries and other suitable books can scarcely estimate the labor of learning without such aids such a language as the Burman, Mrs. Judson took the whole management of family affairs on herself in order to leave her husband at liberty to prosecute his studies, and the consequence was that, being obliged constantly to use all the Burman she knew, in her intercourse with servants, traders and others her progress was more rapid than his.

"One cause of difficulty in learning their language was that their books were made of palm leaves, marked or engraved with an iron style or pen, without ink. We who are accustomed to clear characters on paper can hardly imagine the difficulty of tracing out these obscure scratches on the dried palm leaves. Another was that in writing their words are not fairly divided like ours, by breaks and points and capitals, but run together in a long, continuous line, a sentence or a paragraph seeming like one long word.

"Every day and all day they studied and studied, their only recreation being a walk in the garden or adjoining village, their only society found in each other. Not even did they, have the comfort that 'new missionaries' have in our day, of the home mail, of the joy that comes the day foreign mail is due, for it was two years and a half after leaving America before the first home letter was laid in their hands, and three years before they knew the Baptists in America had rallied to their support."

A Pioneer Missionary Dead.

The executive committee of foreign missions of the Southern Presbyterian church is in receipt of a letter which brings the news of the death of Rev. J. L. Stuart, which occurred in Hong Chow, China, recently. Mr. Stuart was the oldest missionary in the Southern Presbyterian church in point of service. He had been in the Chinese field forty-five years, and was one of the best known and beloved men of the church. His three sons were missionaries also, two of them—Revs. J. L. Stuart, Jr. and Warren Stuart—being in China at the present time, the other son having died. Mr. Stuart is also survived by his wife.

In Korea a great Sunday school rally was held, which was the largest meeting in the history of modern missions in the orient. This included 14,700 Sunday school scholars and workers, and four or five thousand visitors in addition.

Thirteen Baltimore men have contributed \$50,000 toward a new Y. M. C. A. building in Foo Chow, China. Already 800 members have been enrolled.

It is estimated that 1,000,000,000 people are still without Christ. By utmost exertion the present force of missionaries can reach only 375,000,000 in the next generation. Where does the responsibility rest for the 625,000,000.

A Baraca Sunday school class in the First Baptist church of Dallas, Tex., is reported as giving annually to missions the handsome sum of \$1,000.

This fact should be an inspiration to Sunday schools and Sunday school classes everywhere, and if the same proportion of generous giving were maintained throughout all of the Sunday schools of all denominations, what great things could be accomplished in non-Christian lands, as well as in our own country.

MORE TERRITORY FREED FROM CATTLE TICKS.

Over 17,000 Additional Square Miles In Eight Southern States To Be Released from Quarantine February 16th, Tennessee Entirely Free.

Washington, D. C.—The territory in the South freed from cattle ticks and released from quarantine has been increased by 17,000 square miles by an order issued by the Acting Secretary of Agriculture, effective February 16, 1914, releasing additional portions of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Texas. This action has been taken as a result of further progress made in the extermination of the ticks which spread splenic or Texas fever of cattle. The total area released since the beginning of the work in 1896 now aggregates 215,908 square miles and amounts to about 30 per cent of the territory infested at the time the work was undertaken.

Tennessee is the first of the States extensively infested by the ticks to be entirely freed from this pest and released from quarantine. In 1906 about one half of this state was under quarantine. The order just issued releases a portion of Marion County, which was the last remaining part of the state to be cleaned up and released. The success of the work in Tennessee has been achieved through hearty co-operation by state and county officers and cattle owners with the federal authorities. Several other states have also made rapid progress in getting rid of the ticks and now have large free areas.

The portions of the several states

to be released from quarantine on February 16th under the order mentioned are as follows:

In Virginia: The county of Sussex and the balance of the county of Greensville.

In North Carolina: The counties of Moore, Hoke, Scotland, Robeson, and New Hanover.

In Georgia: The counties of Morgan and Franklin.

In Tennessee: The remainder of Marion county.

In Alabama: Portions of the counties of Jackson and Sumter.

In Mississippi: The counties of Clay, Jasper, Smith, Scott, and Leflore, the remainder of the counties of Lowndes, Holmes, Madison, Attala, Rankin, Noxubee, Chickasaw, and portions of the counties of Claiborne, Warren, Yazoo, Sharkey, Bolivar, Newton, Granda, Leake, Monroe, Jones, and Lafayette.

In Oklahoma: The county of Cotton, and the remainder of the counties of Tillman, Grady, Craig and Ottawa, and portions of the counties of McClain, Osage and Delaware.

In Texas: The remainder of the counties of Foard, Knox, Haskell and Mitchell, and portions of the counties of Throckmorton and Wilbarger.

The order also provides for a feeding station for non-infested cattle at stockyards of the Fort Worth & Denver City Railway at Wichita Falls, Texas, in addition to the feeding stations already authorized at other points in the quarantined area.

Copies of the formal order issued by the Acting Secretary of Agriculture which also defines the territory remaining in quarantine, may be obtained upon application to the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. for B. A. I. order 207.
