### COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Met in regular session Monday Apr. 13th. All Commissioners present, County Judge Coe presiding. Quite a number of bills came before the court all of which were allowed. The biggest item of expense being the bounty on rabbit scalps. \$558.31 was paid for scalps. In the lot was 13511 Jacks and 8082 cotton tails.

G. W. Lee having brought in more than 3000 received \$101.66.

Rufus McComus tendered his resignation as County Surveyor which was accepted and Thomas R. Smith was appointed to fill the vacancy, he submitted his bond which was approved.

E. E. Everetts petitioned for a public road which was granted at a cost to the County of \$40.00.

G. B. Coughran was appointed as trustee to sell or transfer 31 7-10 acres of land from the County to W. R. Burros.

Then came up the matter of furnishing materials to place crossings along public roads at points where roads lead into private property. It was agreed that County furnish material

and parties owning the property to furnish all labor in putting in such crossings under the supervision of his Commissioner, property owners to keep up such crossings.

J. H. Airhart et al petitioned for a road and was passed until next term.

F. M. Taylor et al petitioned for a 2nd class road. The petition was granted.

Messrs. Taylor and Goodwin to furnish all labor and material and deed the road bed to the County for \$60.00.

W. S. Thomas et al petitioned for a public road which was granted at a cost to the County of \$30.00.

The canvassing of the vote for the County School trustees and the different trustees in the 22 precincts was then taken up. The five County trustees elected were as follows:

D. T. Bozeman, E. L. Wulfjen, C. P. Conaway, A. C. Gist and E. Brown.

Certain trustees were then declared elected in the 22 districts except District Nos. 5, 21, No vote and in District No. 17 no returns.

### HIGH POWSR CABLE FOR COLORADO

**HIGH VOLTAGE CURRENT FOR LIGHTS AND POWER**

Day Current For Colorado, West Texas Electric Co. To Give Us More and Better Service

Mr. E. O. Wedge general Western manager of the West Texas Electric Co. was here on Wednesday of this week and informed the Record that the High Power Cable would reach Colorado, not later than the 20th of this month and that the current would be turned on May 1st, barring all accidents.

A large force of men have been and are now at work putting up the massive poles and rewiring the town.

All the old poles and wire in the town will be replaced with new material and the entire system put in new and in first class condition.

There will be a new and complete street lighting system installed.

The High power cable coming as it does from Sweetwater insures us a much better service and there will be no more going out of lights or trouble in any way. The West Texas Electric Co. is spending lots of money on this new system and will endeavor to give first class service.

As soon as the new system is installed May 1st a new schedule of rates, will go into effect which will be a reduction on the present rates as follows:

**Residential Lighting—Meter Rate**  
Residents having a connected lighting load of one kilowatt or less:

First 20 KWH per month 18c per KWH.  
All in excess of 20 KWH per month 10c per KWH.

Residents having a connected lighting load of over one kilowatt:

First 40 KWH per month, 18c per KWH.  
All in excess of 40 KWH per month, 10c per KWH.

Less 10 per cent discount if paid within ten days after date of billing.  
Minimum monthly charge, \$1.50.

Flat Irons, Toasters, chaffing dish, sewing machine motors or any other Electric domestic appliance can be used without increasing the rate based on connected lighting load only.

No discount allowed on minimum bills.

**Commercial Lighting—Meter Rates**  
Fixed charges based upon consumer's monthly maximum demand.

### R. B. HUMPHREYS PLATFORM.

In asking for a Democratic nomination for the office of congressman at large, it is not improper to state at the outset that I have been a life-long Democrat and have never scratched the ticket. I can properly claim to be a Wilson democrat because I helped organize the original Woodrow Wilson League at Austin in 1911 and devoted much time to his interest before and after his nomination.

Representation in congress is based on population as disclosed by federal census, which in 1910 showed Texas entitled to eighteen members instead of sixteen as under the census of 1900. The legislature failing to re-district, two must be elected from the state at large. Having the two at large because of the increase in population, and a considerable part of this increase being in the western half of the state, it would seem only fair to elect one of them from the western half. At this time it seems certain that I am to be the only candidate from the western half of the state. Of course no candidate should be elected merely because he lives in a certain place, but each section of the state should be fairly treated in the election of federal officers, and the west has never had a United States senator or congressman at large.

In certain quarters it is insisted that I am too young a man for this distinguished position. I am thirty-two and that ought to be enough. Indeed, I may be excused for calling attention to the fact that the leaders in congress at this time or any other time are men who went there early in life. The fact that I am the only young man in the race should not operate against me, and I do not believe that it will.

### Platform.

Lack of space here forbids detailed discussion of every national problem, but a more extended statement has been issued in circular form and is now being distributed.

### Irrigation and Drainage.

1st. No more important subject can engage the attention of those charged with the duties of government than that of providing homes for the people. With irrigation and drainage vast areas may be reclaimed from waste and made to blossom into homes. I will earnestly support every legitimate irrigation and drainage on-

terprise, as well as every effort to conserve our rapidly depleting natural resources.

### The Tariff.

2nd. With a new Democratic tariff law in effect, no tariff legislation is likely within the next few years. However, not wishing to evade the subject, I am in favor of a tariff for revenue only; levied on luxuries rather than necessities. I am opposed to a protective tariff in any form.

### Capital and Labor.

3rd. I am in favor of all legislation designed to protect the health, safety, comfort and legal rights of those who toil. I particularly favor a uniform child labor law.

### Unhampered Service.

4th. Members of congress should be prohibited from accepting fees or employment from persons interested in national legislation, to the end that their constituents may have the benefit of their undivided services. Also, members should not needlessly absent themselves from attendance upon sessions, and needless absences should be penalized in some way.

### Taxation.

5th. I heartily endorse the new income tax law, but would like to see it altered so as to lay a greater part of the burden on the larger incomes. In my judgment the additional tax does not increase as rapidly as it should.

### Direct Government.

6th. The government is the creature and servant of the people and ought at all times to be responsive to their will; it derives its just powers from the consent of the governed and it should exercise no others. The whole tendency of governmental reform in recent years has been to bring its machinery back closer to the people, as witness the provision for direct election of federal senators and the income tax—and this tendency must not be checked.

### The Civil Service.

7th. The safety and the perpetuity of our government must rest upon the honesty and efficiency of those charged with administration of the laws. Thus it necessarily follows that appointments to office should be based upon merit, not political favoritism. I heartily favor the extension and improvement of the civil service, where ever possible.

### The Pension Grant.

8th. The annual appropriation for the federal pension list has increased six hundred per cent within the last forty years and is growing all the time. Thousands of wealthy people are carried on the rolls. The fact that nearly all of the pension money goes to northern and eastern states rather than to the south is not the objectionable feature, but it is that the whole system is used as a political machine. I am in favor of overhauling the entire list and dropping all but worthy cases.

### The Mexican Situation.

9th. It is likely that the Mexican troubles will be adjusted in some way before another congress convenes, yet if it is expected that a candidate declare himself, I have every confidence in the ability of the Democratic administration to take care of the problem. If intervention and war become necessary, at least they will have been postponed as long as possible.

### International Peace.

10th. I heartily endorse the efforts of the present administration toward the accomplishment of international peace. War is not only something that General Sherman said it is, but it is also very expensive, both in money and in human life. The army, the navy, the pension list, interest on the public debt and other things incident

to or growing out of war cost the taxpayers of this nation more than five hundred million dollars per annum, even in those days of piping peace. The principle need in this day is a reduction in taxes and governmental expenditures. The people are burdened with a load of taxes, and nowhere can we more wisely begin the reduction than by cutting down the army and the navy and trying for international peace.

### The Liquor Question.

11th. I am in favor of the Volstead bill and other similar regulatory measures indeed I believe the federal government should be forbidden to issue liquor licenses.

### Finally.

Finally, I believe in the utmost simplicity and economy in the administration of the affairs of government. If our government is destroyed it will not be destroyed from without, for our people are too strong and brave; it will not be destroyed from within because our people are too wise and vigilant—if it is destroyed it will be crushed by its own weight because our people have built too much law.

Born and raised on a Texas farm; understanding her needs from service within her borders as farm laborer, cowpuncher, clerk, letter carrier county editor; educated in Texas schools, trained as a lawyer in her courts and as a statesman in her legislature; loving her welfare as I love my own life and honor, and ambitious for her great future, I submit my candidacy to the liberty loving, free and independent Democracy of Texas confident of the result and all grateful for their generous kindness.

### AUTO INFORMATION.

A Few Words Descriptive of Rear Axles, Floating and Otherwise.

The rear axle is that part of an automobile in which power is transformed into progress.

In many types of automobile it is also that part which wears out first.

To impress on your mind the one type of axle construction which we deem worthy of installing in Studebaker cars is the purpose of this article.

### Get Posted—Its Easy.

Rear axle function and construction are really very simple.

An automobile motor delivers its power, through the transmission and shafting, to the differential which is housed on the rear axle midway between the wheels. This differential is merely an ingenious arrangement for permitting one wheel to turn faster than the other without interfering with the steady application of power.

Axle shafts gear into each side of the differential and connect it with the wheels. The differential gears turn the shafts; the shafts turn the wheels.

There are many varieties of rear axles but only two broad general types—axles that are full floating and axles that are not. Contrary to general impression it is perfectly easy to tell the difference.

### Here's The Acid Test.

If the shaft breaks will the wheel fall off?

This is the acid test.

In the floating axle the rear wheels

are independent of the shafts for their connections with the car. Full floating axles do not break. Broken axle shafts occur only in non-floating types of construction in which, when a shaft breaks, a wheel loses its moorings.

In the primitive, semi-floating type the axle shafts are asked for a wide range of service. In addition to turning the wheels, the shafts must support them and the entire weight of the car which rests upon these wheels. Each shaft is locked rigidly at both ends and supported with bearings of various types.

### When Tired Steel Breaks.

Even steel has an endurance limit. When, to the twisting strain, is added a heavy lateral weight and a series of road shocks that pound like a sledge hammer, the axle shaft eventually crystallizes and breaks.

And the wheels fall off.

This is the axle typical of all cheap automobiles.

In the so-called three-quarter floating axle the wheel has one bearing of its own, and turns around the rear axle housing which accordingly supports the weight of the car, relieving the shaft of that function. But the shaft still holds the wheel in place on the bearing and is called on to absorb a great deal of sidetrain and shock.

And, when the shaft breaks, the wheel falls off.

### The Correct Kind of Axle Design.

The most durable and the most expensive type of rear axle construction is the full floating, of which the Studebaker axle is a fine example. In a full floating axle, the shaft "floats"—is, in other words, free from all strains either "up-and-down" or "front-and-back," it does nothing but turn.

The Studebaker wheel is mounted independently on the housing. Its double row of Timken roller bearings absorbs all strain and shock from weight or blow.

It is the simplest sort of a task to take such a construction apart for inspection or adjustment, for the axle shaft slides out through the wheel hub. Yet both axle shafts can be removed without disturbing in the least the stability of either wheel.

### How Studebaker Shaft "Floats"

The chrome-nickel steel shaft slides into the differential which it engages by long splines or gears.

The opposite end of the shaft is the mushroom which is riveted rigidly to the flange. The shaft is simply suspended at both ends and floats, relieved of all except turning strain. Loosening of these bolts permits flange and axle to be removed.

The pressed steel housing forms the base for the true axle on which the wheels revolve. The Timken roller bearings are attached to the housing. The nut locks the wheel to housing.

"THE DEPARTED FRIEND."

An Appreciation of The Life and Character of Judge J. E. Hooper.

"Though he that ever kind and true  
Kept stoutly step by step with you,  
Your whole long busy lifetime through  
Be gone a while before—  
Be now a moment gone before,  
Yet, doubt not soon the seasons shall  
restore  
Your friend to you.

He pushes on with right good will  
Through swamp and mire, by vale and hill  
That selfsame hopeful, upward way  
That he and you through many a doubtful day  
Attempted still.

He is not dead—this friend—not dead—  
But in the paths we mortals tread  
Got some few trifling steps ahead  
And nearer to the end.  
So that you too, once past the bend  
Shall meet again as face to face this friend  
You fancied dead.

Push bravely on, strong heart, the while  
You travel onward mile by mile  
He lingers with a backward smile  
Till you can overtake  
And strains his eyes to search the wake  
Or, whistling as he sees you through the brake,  
Wait of still."

The sentiment of the above beautiful lines of Robert Louis Stevenson fitly express our feelings regarding the death of Judge Hooper, whose soul is just a little way above our heads." We can realize now that he is gone from among us; that we shall never again in this life feel the hearty clasp of his hand, hear his kindly voice, see his genial smile nor listen to his wise counsel. Yet we know that time and the cares of our daily life will soften our present grief, and sanctify his memory as a veritable benediction. Nor can we feel but that his gentle spirit participates still in the affairs and concerns of those who were dear to him in this transitory life, and that but "thinly the veil intervenes" between his immortal soul and us. So let us think and even the tears his transition wake, will still be blest for their high nature's sake.

In every aspect of his citizenship, Judge Hooper was an ideal man; in every relation of life he was honest and steadfast. Though in his stewardship, he may not have been given ten talents, he so diligently and wisely used those with which the Master entrusted him, that he received His "well done, thou good and faithful servant." In the civic relations of life Judge Hooper always took a keen and active interest, standing at all times for clean politics and strict honesty in their administration. By choice of his fellow citizens, he served them in public office for sixteen years, and then refused further election to engage in more lucrative employment; yet he retained to the time of his death a lively and influential concern in the affairs of the nation, state and county. He was, in truth, a civic and moral force, and put the impress of his personality upon all things he touched. Upon organization of the City National Bank in 1900, Judge Hooper

was selected its cashier, which position of honor, trust and responsibility he held continually till the day of his death, with ever increasing public confidence and appreciation by the officers and directors of that institution. His business policies were safe, successful, yet broad and accommodating. His daily intimacy with the conservation of values and the strict methods of the banking business, did not, as in many instances it does, dwarf his moral growth or affect his liberality—he never became commercialized. He never took to the pawn shop of temporal prosperity a single virtue, conviction or principle; but stood foursquare to every adverse wind that blew."

As a churchman, Judge Hooper was loyal, active and generous to a great degree. His religious convictions were deep and unwavering, and though not of an openly aggressive nature in his church activities, he was always a pillar of strength and encouragement to the pastor, superintendent and congregation. Every cause fostered by his church received his generous support. His beneficence, however, was even broader than his church demands. His ear was ever attuned to the cry for help and his heart responsive to human suffering. In all his convictions, he cheerfully accorded to others the rights he claimed for himself.

But it was in the social aspects of life that Judge Hooper shone as a star of the first magnitude. Those who never had the pleasure of an outing with him, can not claim to have truly known the man. He seemed to put off all business cares and responsibilities, as easily and quickly as he could shed his cloak, and the real "El" Hooper became at once the life, inspiration, but at all times, the balance wheel of the company. Not only did he strictly observe the biblical injunction to walk circumspectly before all men, but daily bore in mind the admonition, "Thou God seest me."

The one constant diversion from his business cares, was his devotion to Masonry, yet in no feature of the craft did he ever "exalt the handmaiden of the church above her mistress." He found in the principles and teachings of the lodge, not a substitute for the Words of Life, but a propaedeutic for the brotherhood of man. The beautiful ritualism of the order appealed to his temperament, and a remarkably retentive memory soon mastered it "letter perfect." He rose to high official position in the state organization, and at the time of his death was Grand scribe of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Texas.

This feeble tribute to the memory of our departed friend, makes no attempt at a biographical sketch. It is but a chaplet offered for his tomb by one who had come to know Judge Hooper's sterling qualities as a citizen, business man, Christian and friend. "He was gentle and the elements so mixed in him, that nature might stand up and say to all the world, 'This was a man.'" WESTON.

NAVY ORDERED TO MAKE DEMONSTRATION

UNITED STATES ADOPTS DEFINITE POLICY—WILL ENFORCE THE DEMAND

Mexican Gunboats Progresso and Zaragoza Sailed Quietly Out of Tampico Last Night—President Wilson Disturbed Over Affairs.

Washington, April 15.—3:30 P. M.—The Navy Department this afternoon announced that a naval demonstration was ordered for the Pacific Coast of Mexico.

Washington, April 15.—The Mexican gunboats Progresso and Zaragoza sailed quietly from Tampico last night. President Wilson said that it was very clear that Mexico did not offer other nations such indignities as it did to the United States.

The cruiser Cleveland was ordered today to sail from San Francisco to Mazatlan on the west coast.

President Wilson today announces that he will seize Tampico and Vera Cruz unless President Huerta salutes the American flag. What happens after this act on the part of the United States depends upon Huerta.

Unpublished Indignities cause Action.

A long series of hitherto unpublished indignities caused this action. The blue jackets at Tampico were actually arrested out of their own boat. President Wilson said that he stands for peace, but that he will force Huerta to recognize the dignity of the United States.

May Bombard Tampico.

If he does not possibilities include a peaceful blockade of the Mexican ports, bombardment of Tampico, seizure of Mexican gunboats, or intervention. A rebel victory and a demand to salute the American flag, if published in Mexico City, would probably produce a crisis.

Official Statement.

An official statement representing President Wilson's views, says that the Huerta government seems to think mere apologies are sufficient when the rights of the American citizens and dignity of the government of the United States are involved and that Mexico has made no real attempt to punish its officers, who are guilty of these offenses.

Message Undelivered.

O'Shaughnessy's messages were not only repeatedly censored, but he found out that one message was never delivered to him from his government.

"It cannot but strike any one who has watched the course of events in Mexico as significant that incidents such as these have not occurred in any case where the representatives of other governments were involved."

Aboard Battleship Arkansas, At Sea.

April 15.—Rear Admiral Badger, commanding the Atlantic fleet, sailed from Hampton Roads at noon today with four Superdreadnoughts. They will reach Tampico in one week.

Troops on Hike.

Houston, April 15.—Ten thousand troops from Galveston began their hike to Houston today. They will remain in sight of the railroad tracks all the time in readiness for possible orders to go to Mexico.

He will live in deeds of kindness to the poor and needy, and in the years to come they will stand by his grave with uncovered heads, and call him blessed.

Ah, my brother Masons, he is gone from your circle, the gavel of death tapped, and he responded. No more will it be our pleasure to meet with him around our common altar of prayer on which rests the Book of the Law, which he loved so much, and the principles of which were exemplified in his useful life. No more will it be ours to hear that peculiar tremulous voice in our halls of counsel, no more shall we stand with him around the grave of a fallen brother, but Brother Hooper will live on and on in the halls of memory. A good woman in Colorado, who has known him for years wrote my wife the following words: "Mr. Hooper died yesterday, and we all thought of the strong ties of friendship which bound him and Brother Nichols together. All Colorado is bowed in sorrow. I do not know how our church can get along without him, but it is God's will, and He will care for us in our deep sorrow." Ah, Lord, what Thou doest now, we know not, but we shall know hereafter. The death of our friend is one more golden link in the chain of Thy providence which binds us closer to Thee and closer, yet still closer, in bonds of fraternity with each other.

Bowing in mind and heart with his weeping wife, and devoted daughter at the altar in their once happy and unbroken, but now sad home; at the altar of dear old church, which he loved so much, and with my masonic brethren at the altar of prayer, and with all whose hearts are sad because of the passing away of this chaste companion, faithful father, firm but friend and clean citizen, I look up thru my tears to the tearless land, and again read my text for my next Sabbath: "THY WILL BE DONE."

We find comfort in the thought that

today he is at peace. He escapes sin and sorrow, trial and temptation, for there the weary are at rest, and the wicked cease from troubling. Ah, it is not night, it is light. It is not the end, it is the beginning. It is not extinction, it is eternity. here are no mistakes in God's dealings with us.
