TIME BY WHICH DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES MUST FILE APPLICATIONS.

Candidates for State offices must file with the State Committee before June 1; for District offices, with the District Committee, before June 1, and candidates for County and Precinct offices must file their names with the County Chairman by June 13, to get their names on the official primary ballot.

Dallas County candidates for County and Precinct offices must file their application with County Chairman Claude M. McCallum not later than June 13, in the form prescribed by law; otherwise, their names will not appear on the ticket.

Every election year some candidate, generally for a precinct office neglects to file his application in time to get his name on the ticket.

CONVENTION FOR DALLAS.

The Convention Committee of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce is working upon the proposition to ask that the Democratic State Convention shall be held in Dallas in August.

MAY 5.37 RAINFALL.

For the month just past Colorado weather gage shows a rain fall of 5.37 inches. This is the greatest rainfall in May in the past ten years except in 1908 and 1906. In 1906 May received 6.01 inches and in May 1908 5.61 inches. In May 1911 only .67 inches fell in May. Now as to this month, June, last year there fell in June 2.77 inches of rain and 2.69 inches in July. Should this country be blessed with the same precipitation in June and July as last year we will have to borrow part of Howard county to get ground on which to store our crop.

TURNING TO TEXAS.

According to press reports, 1,400 of the best class of European immigrants landed at Galveston Sunday. They have money to invest in Texas farm lands. They are said to be the forerunners of a heavier immigration movement which will bring thousands of industrious and intelligent aliens to the Southern states. The announcement is significant. It shows that the tide is turning down the Northern to the Southern section of the United States, where cheaper lands and greater opportunities may be found. Texas has room and lands for all worthy immigrants, especially for those with money to invest and energy to apply. Millions of acres are still fallow, awaiting the quickening touch of the vitalizing plow. When much of the untilled area is peopled with intelligent farmers, increased production will hasten fulfillment of the state's high destiny, and make Texas the storehouse of the nation. The worthy immigrant should be accorded every opportunity and encouragement.

GENERAL VILLA LOOMS UP

General Villa is now the dominating character of the Mexican situation and it appears that he enjoys a much greater amount of respect from the present administration than any other

Mexican leader. It is true that he is spilling Mexican blood in large quantities and from the manner in which he is being criticized by the standpat press of this country he evidently must be doing a good and progressive work under the circumstances. The standpatters, (the privilege seeking class) in this country are asking the question, why President Wilson and his cabinet thing so much better of Gen. Villa than of Huerta. The answer is an easy one. Gen. Villa is only executing the Villians of Mexico, whereas Gen. Huerta executes the patriots. It is becoming clear to every impartial observer of Mexican events that Villa is fighting the battle of the common people and he is chopping off the heads of the Mexican feudal landlords and the ecclesiastical prelates because these classes are the despots and destroyers of Mexican liberty and Mexican prosperity. If the peace parley at Buffalo continues much longer without solving the problem, Villa himself will solve it, by overthrowing Huerta and all that Huerta stands for, as he is sweeping all before him and city after city has fallen before his victorious army.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Almost daily, lifelong and prohibitionists, who are not identified with the liquor business, are declaring their intention of supporting Ball for Governor, while Col. Ball in every speech he makes—in wet Houston and in Austin, as in dry Greenville, dry Denton and dry Waxahachie—declares his unwavering determination to write state wide prohibition into the constitution and drive liquor out of Texas.

Sincere Prohibition Democrats are amazed to see such antics as Clarence Ousley, Felix Robertson, Sam Sparks Joseph D. Sayres, Chas. Rogan, Rienz Johnston, John N. Simpson and others openly supporting a candidate for Governor of Texas who openly declares for submission and states wide prohibition, and breathes forth defiance of the liquor traffic in his every utterance.

They are asking: "What does it mean?"

It means that the break up has come, and that we are witnessing the beginning of the end of liquor in Texas.

It means that intelligent people realize that Governor Colquitt and the liquor crew have scuttled the liquor ship, and that it is rapidly going to pieces and is sure to sink, and that all who care, to be of any service or significance in public affairs in Texas must look out for other accommodations.

It means that Jim Ferguson got a gold brick when, with so much ostentation, he took over the support of Governor Colquitt and the liquor traffic organization and openly and solemnly pledged the liquor traffic that, if elected, he would veto any legislation affecting their interests that might be passed by the people's representatives.

It means that Tom Ball will be nominated and elected by an overwhelming majority.

It means that large numbers of these non liquor selling anti's who are taking the first step toward prohibition in supporting Mr. Ball, will go the whole route and permanently align themselves with the great body

of the friends of good government in Texas.

It means that submission which was carried in the Democratic primaries of 1910—the last time it was voted upon by more than 33,000 majority—will carry by a much larger margin in this year's primaries.

It means that the next legislature will submit a statewide prohibition amendment, and this whether or not the pros elect two-thirds of each house; for notice has already been duly served that if the people's will is not obeyed resort will be had to a prohibitive tax, and all the courts have always held that the power to tax liquor is "the power to destroy."

It means that the liquor issue before the legislature and before the people in Texas in 1915 will be between constitutional state wide prohibition, on the one side, and the quart law on the other.

It means that next year, 1915, the liquor traffic in Texas is going to get it "where the chicken got the axe."

The Record is just in receipt of a letter from Judge Thomas L. Blanton, in which he says:

"Why don't you fellows learn to play the game fair, and 'keep the record straight, while you are criticizing others."

"In one issue, you made two very material errors: viz: 'You stated that I am mailing Out Literature containing the number of organizations to which I belong. In this you erred. 'I have had some newspaper clippings published in papers, one 'of which was from the Merkel Mail,' and it was criticizing you for putting in an alleged editorial against me 'attributing it to the Roscoe Times, when your action was unauthorized, and it contained your article. I therefore request that, in fair justice to me, you publish the entire article from the Merkel Mail' which article I enclose you herewith.

"In the same edition, you attempted to give an editorial from the Midland Paper, stating 'And the Midland Reporter in referring to his speech, among other things said: and then you attempted to quote the Reporter, when in fact the excerpt was from an article written by Mr. Majors, who had been criticised by me for writing under an assumed name."

"It occurs to us, our dear Judge, that you should be the very last man in the world to demand fair play. You talk about material errors, because the Record stated 'mailing out literature' and purported to quote from the Midland Reporter. What was the material? Do you deny that you are mailing out literature containing the clipping from the Merkel Mail. Haven't you mailed any number of the clipping to people over the District and doesn't that clipping give your membership in the different organizations, including your church membership? Is that a material error? And you claim that it is material error because, in a previous issue, the Record purported to quote from the Midland Reporter, and you say that the quotation was from an article in the Midland Reporter written by Mr. Majors. Is this material? The matter that we used was published in the Midland Reporter. It isn't so very material, is it, just who wrote it? Why don't you criticise the subject matter of the articles? What was said in the Midland Reporter was evidently true: you didn't deny it; you are simply criticising the Record because we purported to quote from the Midland Reporter when, in fact, it was an article written by Mr. Majors in the Midland Reporter. Why didn't you answer the article that Mr. Majors wrote?"

In your original literature that you were supposed to have spent sufficient time on to have everything correct, you made quite a number of errors, one of which was to say that the population of this Congressional District was sufficient for more than two Congressmen. This you had to correct. In naming the Counties of the District you named one County that was in another District. These are errors, probably not very material, but just as material as the errors the Record made.

However, it is not the errors that amount to so much as it is the misrepresentations you have been going up and down this District for months making, about Judge Smith and his acts. Recently, in an open letter, he called your attention specifically to twelve direct misrepresentations and charged that each one was a specific misrepresentation; that open letter has been in your hands for as much as ten days; you have neither attempted to explain any of these misrepresentations, nor have you retracted them. In what purports to be an answer to these questions, you simply say you will withdraw the statements for the time being. Do you think this playing fair? Do you think, Judge Blanton, that, as an honest man, you have a right to make twelve misrepresentations against the Congressman from this district, and then, when called to your attention, and each and every one of them denounced as mis-

representations, to simply say you withdraw them for the time being? If you want fair play, as you claim you do, why don't you prove these assertions that you made, or retract them. It would be infinitely more honorable in you, as a candidate for Congress, when you found you have made misrepresentations—if it is conceivable to believe that you didn't know when you made them that they were misrepresentations—to retract each and every one of them.

You are asking for fair play. Why don't you give fair play? Why don't you be a man and back up what you said, or retract? Either course is honorable; any other course is dishonorable.

BEWARE OF THE SPECIAL INTERESTS.

(By W. J. Bryan.)

As the time approaches for the selection of candidates, the voters should beware of the Special Interests. Reform is making headway, but the victory has not been won everywhere, and even where it is won, it is not complete. Special Privilege is still contesting every inch of ground. The fight is on in every State and in the Nation, as well. Governors are to be chosen in many of the commonwealths and Legislators, Congressmen and Senators are to be selected. Any one of them may, on a close vote, become a deciding factor.

There are four Special Interests that need watching. First, the railroads, for they have a pecuniary interest in opposing effective regulation, whether it is attempted through the enactment of new legislation or through the enforcement of laws which now exist. The voters should see that men selected are not under obligations to the railroads, for every official who deals with the Special Interests is in the attitude of a judge or juror. He cannot be impartial if, either by general bias or because of some particular relation, he is connected with those of the railroads.

Second, the Trusts. They die hard. Some of them are showing a disposition to conform to the new public opinion, but others are still stubborn and are contending for "regulation," with the expectation of controlling the regulators.

Third, The Money Power. It is potent. Its claws have been drawn by the new currency, but it is still obsessed with the idea that business exists for it, and, therefore, should be controlled by it. Beware of the aspirant who puts the dollar above the man.

Fourth, the Liquor Interests. These wage their contests on the lowest level, and are most powerful; because of their ability to debauch those whom they control. No man is in a position to discharge his duties as he ought to who takes orders from them, and they can generally control those to whom they give office. The saloon is a nuisance; even its defenders cannot say more in its behalf than it is a necessary nuisance. It ought to be dealt with as a nuisance, and not as a thing to be respected, or feared. It is a horrible indictment against a community to say of it that it is not free to act on the liquor question as it pleases—that its officials can be bullied and intimidated by those who set man traps for young men and conspire against morality. There is scarcely a representative in any State Legislature who does not have to deal constantly with the liquor question. How can a representative of the brewery or distillery or saloon act with fairness and impartiality? Every member of Congress, every Senator, every Executive, has this question constantly before him; how can he be true to his conscience and to the public if he owes his elevation to those who despoil our citizenship and degrade our civilization?

As the citizens must decide this question at the polls, so the member of the party must decide it at the primary. Let every member of every party make it a matter of conscience. The Democrat has special reason to insist upon a high standard of individual virtue and independence; our party is on trial throughout the nation; it is bending to its great task with splendid energy and high purpose. Let not its hopes be frustrated by subservency to the Special Interests, that in one form or another prey upon the public. Only that which is good endures. Let the party lay the foundation for permanent success by showing that it can be trusted to measure up to its responsibilities.

Denton—Denton county sheep market 10,000 pounds of wool for 25 cents per pound.

Normange—Final arrangements completed for developing oil and gas fields in Leon County. Stock Company with \$100,000 capital organized.

MISSIONARY COLUMN.

The Congo Mission Established.

Friday, January 30, we reached the village of Wembo-Niama. We were met three days before the end of our journey by Wembo-Niama, the chief of the village where our work begins who hurried on ahead that he might receive us at his home in true African style.

When we arrived, he turned over his house to us and said that we might occupy it as long as we needed it: he allowed us the free use of his veranda to hold our services in; on one occasion he sent 130 women and 43 men to assist in clearing the concession. He has fulfilled every promise made to Bishop Lambuth, two years ago, and displayed a great desire to become acquainted with our message, showing this desire by the promise to put up a church and school house close to his own house. The plot of ground chosen for the mission is one half mile from the village, on a gentle slope, at the foot of which is a spring. The area is about twenty-two acres. The elevation above sea level is sufficient to temper very appreciably the fierce heat of the tropics.

On February 12, a church was organized, with C. C. Bush pastor in charge, Mr. Stockwell and Dr. Mumpower, local preachers, they having been granted licenses for this work; Mudimbi and Lufaka, native evangelists and fourteen other members.

On the afternoon of the same day the southeast corner of the concession was permanently fixed and identified by the driving down of a corner post, Bishop Lambuth striking the first blow. The first steps toward the erection of the church and hospital were also taken, with appropriate ceremonies in each case.

Mrs. Bush has organized a school for boys medical work is carried on in a small degree by Dr. Mumpower and religious services are held several times a week by Mr. Bush and the native evangelists. Mr. Stockwell will likely have several buildings completed by the time the board receives this report—D. L. Mumpower, Wembo-Niama, Central Africa.

A Dead-In-Earnest Campaign.

According to reliable information recently received the Chinese government has issued an edict to the effect that persons under forty years of age will be shot if found smoking opium at Chengtu, West China, after May 30. Those above the age of forty are to be sentenced to terms of penal servitude.

So strenuous is the campaign against opium smoking in Senchen that all persons addicted to the habit throughout the province are compelled to submit to a course of treatment.

A High Average of Giving.

The Baptist church at summer land, British Columbia, is located in a new community. Ten years ago the place was a cattle range, with two ranches in the whole territory. The returns from fruit until this year have been little or nothing. It has been practically all outgo; houses to be built, outbuildings to be put up; roads to be constructed, orchards to be planted, land cleared, boat landings built, and all the other necessities of a new settlement to be provided. The year book for 1912 gives the following facts regarding the little church in this community:

Membership, 141; pastor's salary and pulpit supply, \$1,625; building fund, \$800; other local purposes, \$979 total for current expenses, \$3,433. Contributed for home and foreign missions, \$1,862. Contributed for all purposes during the year, \$5,400. The average yearly per member for all purposes is \$38.23; the average per member for missions, \$13.20. To the above must be added individual contributions from church members to Okanagan college, totaling about \$1,000. Who can show a better record than this?

It is estimated that there are nearly one million lepers in India, China and Japan. Concerning them the Christian Worker says: "The great majority of these are miserable outcasts whose religion affords them neither help nor hope, and whose friends leave them to beg or starve." Twenty-five dollars a year will support one of these adult lepers in a mission asylum, and twenty dollars a leper child.

During the past quadrennium in the M. E. church, south in China, there was an increase of 80 per cent in church membership, 105 per cent in Sunday school pupils, 72 per cent in students in schools and colleges, 93 per cent in contributions.



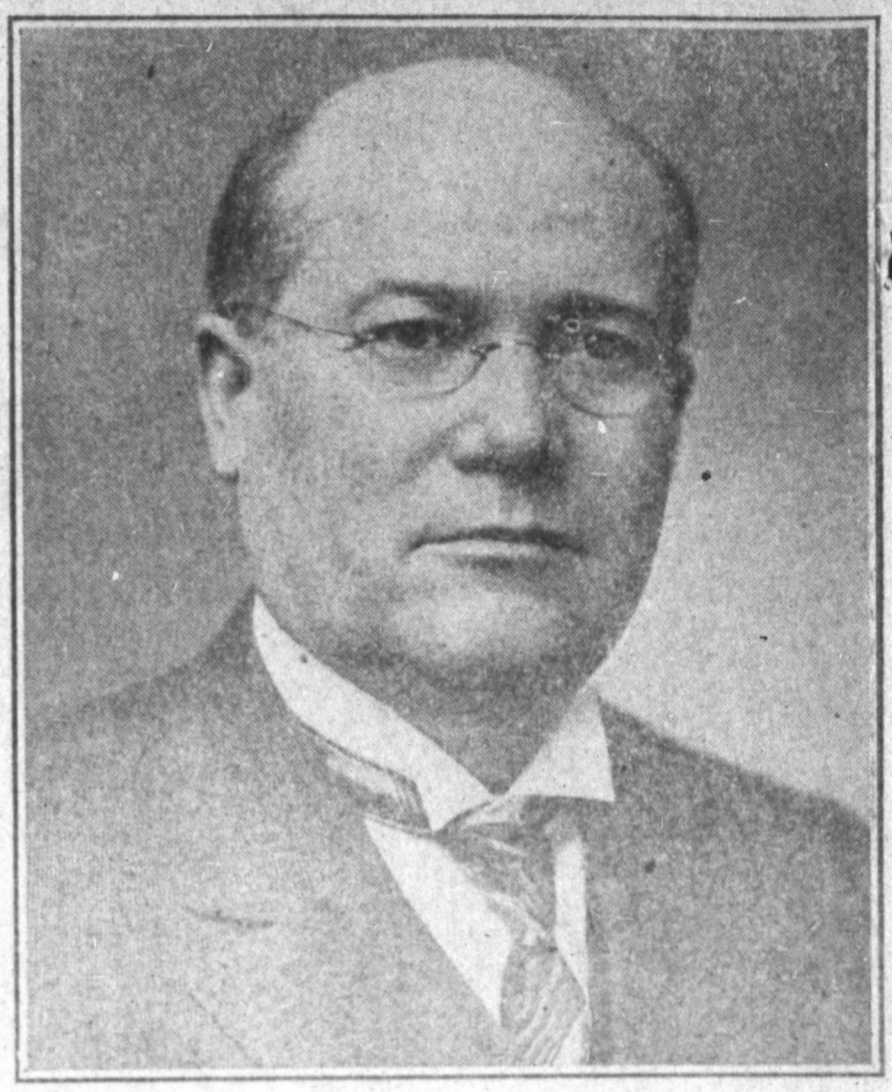
