The constitution wisely forbids the legislature granting relief to school land purchasers; hence, the law relating to forfeitures should be so amended as to make less hazardous the risk of the poor man losing his home from calamity or misfortune.

The depository law should be so amended as to require interest from school land sales deposited in the county depositors where the land is situated and paid out in proportionate installments as used.

This will prevent withdrawing all actual cash from these counties at one time, make interest payments easier and prevent many forfeitures.


